The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court (2015-2016)

An Act providing for certain health insurance coverage.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 17A of chapter 32A of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2012
 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place
 thereof the following 4 sentences:-

4 The commission shall provide to any active or retired employee of the commonwealth 5 who is insured under the group insurance commission coverage for the cost of enteral formulas 6 for home use, whether administered orally or via tube feeding, for which a physician has issued a 7 written order. Such written order shall state that the enteral formula is clearly medically 8 necessary and has been proven effective as a disease-specific treatment regimen for those 9 individuals who are or will become malnourished or suffer from disorders, which if left 10 untreated, cause chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. Specific diseases for which 11 enteral formulas have been proven effective shall include, but are not limited to, inherited diseases of amino acid or organic acid metabolism; eosinophilic gastrointestinal disorders; 12 13 Crohn's Disease; gastroesophageal reflux with failure to thrive; disorders of gastrointestinal

motility such as chronic intestinal pseudo-obstruction; and multiple, severe food allergies, which
if left untreated will cause malnourishment, chronic physical or intellectual disability or death.
Enteral formulas which are medically necessary and taken under written order from a physician
for the treatment of specific diseases shall be distinguished from nutritional supplements taken
electively.

SECTION 2. Section 47I of chapter 175 of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
 amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 4
 sentences:-

22 Any individual policy of accident and sickness insurance issued pursuant to section 108, and any group blanket policy of accident and sickness insurance issued pursuant to section 110, 23 24 shall provide coverage for the cost of enteral formulas for home use, whether administered orally 25 or via tube feeding, for which a physician has issued a written order. Such written order shall state that the enteral formula is clearly medically necessary and has been proven effective as a 26 disease-specific treatment regimen for those individuals who are or will become malnourished or 27 suffer from disorders, which if left untreated, cause chronic physical or intellectual disability or 28 death. Specific diseases for which enteral formulas have been proven effective shall include, but 29 are not limited to, inherited diseases of amino acid or organic acid metabolism; eosinophilic 30 31 gastrointestinal disorders; Crohn's Disease; gastroesophageal reflux with failure to thrive; 32 disorders of gastrointestinal motility such as chronic intestinal pseudo-obstruction; and multiple, 33 severe food allergies, which if left untreated will cause malnourishment, chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. Enteral formulas which are medically necessary and taken under 34 35 written order from a physician for the treatment of specific diseases shall be distinguished from nutritional supplements taken electively. 36

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37 SECTION 3. Section 8L of chapter 176A of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
 38 amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 4
 39 sentences:-

40 Any contract between a subscriber and the corporation under an individual or group hospital service plan that shall be delivered, issued or renewed in the commonwealth shall 41 provide, as benefits to all individual subscribers and members within the commonwealth, 42 coverage for the cost of enteral formulas for home use, whether administered orally or via tube 43 feeding, for which a physician has issued a written order. Such written order shall state that the 44 enteral formula is clearly medically necessary and has been proven effective as a disease-specific 45 treatment regimen for those individuals who are or will become malnourished or suffer from 46 disorders, which if left untreated, cause chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. 47 48 Specific diseases for which enteral formulas have been proven effective shall include, but are not limited to, inherited diseases of amino acid or organic acid metabolism; eosinophilic 49 gastrointestinal disorders; Crohn's Disease; gastroesophageal reflux with failure to thrive; 50 disorders of gastrointestinal motility such as chronic intestinal pseudo-obstruction; and multiple, 51 52 severe food allergies, which if left untreated will cause malnourishment, chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. Enteral formulas which are medically necessary and taken under 53 54 written order from a physician for the treatment of specific diseases shall be distinguished from 55 nutritional supplements taken electively.

56 SECTION 4. Section 4K of chapter 176B of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby 57 amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 4 58 sentences:- 59 Any subscription certificate under an individual or group medical service agreement that shall be delivered, issued or renewed in the commonwealth shall provide, as benefits to all 60 individual subscribers and members within the commonwealth, all group members having a 61 principal place of employment within the commonwealth and all persons included in section 4C, 62 coverage for the cost of enteral formulas for home use, whether administered orally or via tube 63 64 feeding, for which a physician has issued a written order. Such written order shall state that the enteral formula is clearly medically necessary and has been proven effective as a disease-specific 65 treatment regimen for those individuals who are or will become malnourished or suffer from 66 67 disorders, which if left untreated, cause chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. Specific diseases for which enteral formulas have been proven effective shall include, but are not 68 limited to, inherited diseases of amino acid or organic acid metabolism; eosinophilic 69 70 gastrointestinal disorders; Crohn's Disease; gastroesophageal reflux with failure to thrive; disorders of gastrointestinal motility such as chronic intestinal pseudo-obstruction; and multiple, 71 72 severe food allergies, which if left untreated will cause malnourishment, chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. Enteral formulas which are medically necessary and taken under 73 written order from a physician for the treatment of specific diseases shall be distinguished from 74 nutritional supplements taken electively. 75

SECTION 5. Section 4D of chapter 176G of the General Laws, as so appearing, is hereby
 amended by striking out the first sentence and inserting in place thereof the following 4
 sentences:-

A group health maintenance contract shall provide coverage for the cost of enteral formulas for home use, whether administered orally or via tube feeding, for which a physician has issued a written order. Such written order shall state that the enteral formula is clearly

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medically necessary and has been proven effective as a disease-specific treatment regimen for 82 83 those individuals who are or will become malnourished or suffer from disorders, which if left untreated, cause chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. Specific diseases for which 84 enteral formulas have been proven effective shall include, but are not limited to, inherited 85 diseases of amino acid or organic acid metabolism; eosinophilic gastrointestinal disorders; 86 87 Crohn's Disease; gastroesophageal reflux with failure to thrive; disorders of gastrointestinal 88 motility such as chronic intestinal pseudo-obstruction; and multiple, severe food allergies, which if left untreated will cause malnourishment, chronic physical or intellectual disability or death. 89 90 Enteral formulas which are medically necessary and taken under written order from a physician for the treatment of specific diseases shall be distinguished from nutritional supplements taken 91 92 electively.
