### AN ACT RELATIVE TO VOTING BY THE INSTANT RUNOFF VOTING METHOD..

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           SECTION 1. Section 78 of chapter 54 of the General Laws as appearing in the 2000  
2 Official Edition is hereby amended by striking out the third sentence.

3           SECTION 2. Chapter 54 is hereby further amended by inserting after section 78A the following section  
4 78B:—

5 (a) Definitions.

6 The following terms as used in this section shall, unless the context requires otherwise, have the  
7 following meanings:—

8 “Instant Runoff Voting” means a method of casting and tabulating votes that simulates the ballot counts  
9 that would occur if all voters participated in a series of runoff elections with one candidate eliminated  
10 after each round of counting.

11 “Advancing candidate” means a candidate who has not been eliminated.

12 “Continuing ballot” means a ballot that is not an exhausted ballot.

13 “Exhausted ballot” means a ballot on which there are no choices marked other than choices for eliminated  
14 candidates.

15 (b) The purpose of this section shall be to require a majority of votes for election to the offices of  
16 governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of the commonwealth, state treasurer, state  
17 auditor, and representative and senator in general court.

18 (c) Instant Runoff Voting shall be the method used for all elections to the following offices when three or

19 more candidates have qualified to have their names printed on the ballot for those offices: governor,  
20 lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of the commonwealth, state treasurer, and state auditor.

21 (d) In elections using the Instant Runoff Voting method, voters may rank the candidates in order of  
22 preference. In all such elections, the count shall proceed in the following manner:

23 (1) The initial round of counting shall be a count of the first choices marked on each ballot. If any  
24 candidate receives a majority of the first choices, that candidate shall be deemed and declared elected.

25 (2) If no candidate receives a majority of first choices, there shall be a second round of counting. The last-  
26 place candidate shall be eliminated, and all the continuing ballots shall be recounted. Each continuing  
27 ballot shall be counted as one vote for that ballot's highest ranked advancing candidate.

28 (3) If no candidate receives a majority at the second round of counting, there shall be a third round of  
29 counting. The last-place candidate shall be eliminated, and all the continuing ballots shall be recounted.  
30 Each continuing ballot shall be counted as one vote for that ballot's highest ranked advancing candidate.

31 (4) The process of eliminating the last-place candidates and recounting all the continuing ballots shall  
32 continue until one candidate receives a majority of the votes in a round. The candidate who receives a  
33 majority of the votes in a round shall be deemed and declared to be elected.

34 (5) When a ballot becomes an exhausted ballot it shall not be counted in that round or any subsequent  
35 round.

36 (6) If there are not sufficient second and lower choices for any candidate to receive a majority, the  
37 candidate with the highest number of votes shall be deemed and declared to be elected.

38 (7) No candidate who has been eliminated can be elected, no matter how many second and lower ranked  
39 choices might otherwise have become votes for that candidate in a later round.

40 (e) Ballots shall allow the voter to mark the voter's first choice in the same manner as that for offices not  
41 elected by Instant Runoff Voting.

42 (f) Sample ballots illustrating voting procedures shall be posted in or near the voting booth, and shall be  
43 included in the instruction packet for absentee ballots. Directions to voters shall conform substantially to  
44 the following:

45 "Vote for your first-choice candidate by marking the number '1' next to that candidate's name. In  
46 addition to your first choice candidate, you may rank additional candidates in order of preference.  
47 Ranking additional candidates will not affect your first-choice candidate. Indicate your second choice by  
48 marking the number '2' by that candidate's name, your third choice by marking the number '3,' and so on  
49 for as many candidates as you wish. Do not mark the same number beside more than one candidate. Do  
50 not skip numbers."

51 (g) The secretary of the commonwealth shall adopt and promulgate regulations consistent with this  
52 section, which regulations shall ensure that ballots shall be simple and easy to understand. As soon as  
53 practicable, the secretary of the commonwealth shall ensure that all voting equipment in the  
54 commonwealth is capable of effecting Instant Runoff Voting. In addition, the secretary of the

55 commonwealth shall conduct a voter education campaign to familiarize voters with Instant Runoff  
56 Voting.
