The Commonwealth of Alassachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court (2021-2022)

An Act relative to celebrating and teaching Native American culture and history.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 The third paragraph of section 1D of chapter 69 of the General Laws, as appearing in the
- 2 2018 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting after the second sentence the following
- 3 sentence:- The standards shall provide for instruction in: (i) tribal history and current issues of
- 4 the Aquinnah Wampanoag, Mashpee Wampanoag and other Wampanoag tribes, the
- 5 Massachuset, the Nipmuc and other Native American tribes that exist within Massachusetts; (ii)
- 6 information about tribes and confederacies that have historic ties to Massachusetts, such as the
- Wabanaki Confederacy; (iii) tribal history of Native Americans throughout the United States;
- 8 (iv) tribal sovereignty and governance, treaty rights, genocide, Native American cultures,
- 9 languages and socioeconomic experiences; and (v) ongoing issues common to contemporary
- Native Americans throughout Massachusetts; provided, that the board shall consult with tribal
- 11 nations in developing these standards.
