#### The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court (2015-2016)

An Act relative to the practice of acupuncture.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 111 of the General Laws is hereby amended by adding the
- 2 following section:-
- 3 Section 233. There shall be a commission on acupuncture and wellness within the
- 4 department. The commission shall consist of: the commissioner of public health or the
- 5 commissioner's designee, who shall chair the commission; the commissioner of insurance or the
- 6 commissioner's designee; the director of MassHealth or the director's designee; the director of
- 7 the board of registration in medicine or the director's designee; the senate chair of the joint
- 8 committee on public health; the house chair of the joint committee on public health; a member
- 9 representing a statewide organization of licensed acupuncturists; a member representing a

- 10 statewide organization of medical acupuncturists; a member representing the Massachusetts
- 11 Public Health Association; and 5 members to be selected by the Governor including: no fewer
- 12 than 2 acupuncturists, licensed and practicing in the state of Massachusetts; a member
- 13 representing one of the top five health insurance companies in Massachusetts according to
- 14 market share, a member representing a health care consumer organization, and a member
- 15 currently practicing as a licensed physician in Massachusetts.
- The commission acupuncture and wellness shall make an investigation and
- 17 comprehensive study of the potential for better integrated use of acupuncture services to expand
- 18 access, reduce health care costs, and provide improved quality of care to Massachusetts
- 19 residents. The commission shall:
- 20 (1) Consider strategies to evaluate and implement effective integration of
- 21 acupuncture services in health care delivery in Massachusetts with specific focus on
- 22 interventions in pain management, substance abuse treatment, and wellness promotion.
- 23 (2) Consider strategies to effectively integrate acupuncture treatment modalities into
- 24 alternative payment models, including, but not limited to, accountable care organizations,
- 25 workplace wellness programs and provider organizations established under chapter 224 of the
- 26 acts of 2012.
- 27 (3) Consider strategies regarding reimbursement of licensed acupuncturists via third
- 28 party payors or otherwise to facilitate a stable and sustainable integration of acupuncture services
- 29 into the broader system of health care delivery.
- The commission on acupuncture and wellness shall submit to the secretary of health and
- human services and the joint committee public health, six months after the effective date of this

- act and annually thereafter, a report that includes findings from the commission's review along
- 33 with recommendations and any suggested legislation to implement those recommendations.
- 34 SECTION 2. Chapter 175 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
- 35 section 47GG, as inserted by section 21 of chapter 258 of the acts of 2014, the following
- 36 section:-
- 37 Section 47HH. (a) All individual or group accident and health insurance policies and
- 38 health service contracts delivered, issued or renewed by an insurer or nonprofit health service
- 39 corporation which provide benefits to individual subscribers and members within the
- 40 commonwealth or to all group members having a principal place of employment within the
- 41 commonwealth shall provide benefits for acupuncture and oriental medicine based diagnosis and
- treatment in the areas of pain management, post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse
- 43 treatment, and nausea.
- SECTION 3. Said chapter 175 is hereby further amended by inserting after section 205,
- 45 as appearing in the 2012 Official Edition, the following section:-
- Section 205A. (a) The commissioner shall not approve a policy under section 205 that
- 47 does not provide benefits for acupuncture and oriental medicine based diagnosis and treatment in
- 48 the areas of pain management, post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse treatment, and
- 49 nausea.
- SECTION 4. Chapter 176A of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
- 51 section 8II, as inserted by section 23 of chapter 258 of the acts of 2014, the following section:-

- Section 8JJ. (a) Any contract between a subscriber and the corporation under an
- 53 individual or group hospital service plan delivered, issued or renewed in the commonwealth shall
- 54 provide as benefits to all individual subscribers and members within the commonwealth and to
- 55 all group members having a principal place of employment within the commonwealth
- 56 acupuncture and oriental medicine based diagnosis and treatment in the areas of pain
- 57 management, post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse treatment, and nausea.
- 58 SECTION 5. Chapter 176B of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
- 59 section 4II, as inserted by section 25 of chapter 258 of the acts of 2014, the following section:-
- Section 4JJ. (a) Any subscription certificate under an individual or group medical service
- 61 agreement delivered, issued or renewed in the commonwealth shall provide benefits to all
- 62 individual subscribers and members within the commonwealth and to all group members having
- 63 a principal place of employment within the commonwealth for acupuncture and oriental
- 64 medicine based diagnosis and treatment in the areas of pain management, post-traumatic stress
- 65 disorder, substance abuse treatment, and nausea.
- SECTION 6. Chapter 176G of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
- 67 section 4AA, as inserted by section 27 of chapter 258 of the acts of 2014, the following section:
- Section 4BB. (a) Any group health maintenance contract shall provide coverage for
- 69 acupuncture and oriental medicine based diagnosis and treatment in the areas of pain
- 70 management, post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse treatment, and nausea.
- 71 SECTION 7. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, no third party
- 72 payer of health care services shall differentiate reimbursement rates for acupuncture services by

- 73 provider type. Only licensed acupuncturists or medical doctors shall be reimbursed for
- 74 acupuncture services.
