By Ms. Comerford, a petition (accompanied by resolve, Senate, No. 1053) of Joanne M. Comerford, José F. Tosado, Maria Duaine Robinson, Mike Connolly and other members of the General Court for legislation to establish a special commission to foster greater opportunities for skilled immigrants in the Commonwealth. Labor and Workforce Development.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

**In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court
(2019-2020)**

Resolve establishing a special commission to foster greater opportunities for skilled immigrants in the Commonwealth.

1 **Resolved**, that there shall be a special commission to research and make
2 recommendations to the governor and legislature on reducing unnecessary barriers to
3 professional licensure for qualified immigrants and promoting workforce training, education, and
4 business development in Massachusetts.

5 The commission shall undertake a study to: (1) identify barriers related to occupational
6 licensing; (2) examine the scope of underemployment of skilled foreign-born individuals and its
7 economic costs to the Commonwealth, including, lost tax revenues, and gaps in needed services;
8 and (3) research best practices for strengthening career pathways for skilled immigrants.

9 In conducting its work, the commission shall review efforts made by other states to
10 facilitate professional licensure, such as creating revised or limited licensing standards;
11 apprenticeships and partnerships with potential employers and professional associations;

12 educational equivalency and readiness programs; career pathway guides; and technical
13 assistance.

14 The commission shall be comprised of: the secretary of labor and workforce development
15 or a designee, who shall serve as chair; the director of the office of consumer affairs and
16 business regulation, or a designee; the commissioner of the Massachusetts Office of Refugees
17 and Immigrants, or a designee; the director of the division of professional licensure, or a
18 designee; the house and senate chairs of the joint committee on consumer protection &
19 professional licensure, or a designee; the house and senate chairs of the joint committee on
20 economic development and emerging technologies, or designees; 1 member of the senate to be
21 appointed by the senate minority leader; 1 member of the house of representatives to be
22 appointed by the house minority leader; and up to 10 members to be appointed by the Governor,
23 1 of whom shall represent community colleges in the commonwealth; 1 of whom shall be a
24 representative of the Immigrant Learning Center Public Education Institute; 1 of whom shall be a
25 representative from the Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition; 1 of whom
26 shall be a representative from Greater Boston Legal Services (GBLS) who specializes in
27 employment law; and up to 6 of whom who shall represent immigrant-led organizations
28 representing diverse communities, including those that provide employment assistance and
29 training to their members. To take action at a meeting, a majority of the members of the board
30 present and voting shall constitute a quorum.

31 The commission shall meet at least monthly, or as frequently as the chair recommends.
32 The commission shall monitor the implementation of its recommendations and update said
33 recommendations to reflect changes to federal and state immigration and licensing laws,
34 regulations and policies.

35 The chair may appoint subcommittees in order to expedite the work of the commission.

36 The commission shall file a report of its recommendations and proposed legislation or
37 regulatory changes, if any, with the clerks of the house and senate, the chairs of the joint
38 committee on consumer protection & professional licensure, and the chairs of the joint
39 committee on economic development and emerging technologies within one year of the effective
40 date of this act.
