By Mr. Montigny, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1424) of Mark C. Montigny, Jack Patrick Lewis, John F. Keenan, Vanna Howard and other members of the General Court for legislation to promote humane cosmetics and other household products by limiting the use of animal testing. Public Health.

**In the One Hundred and Ninety-Third General Court
(2023-2024)**

An Act promoting humane cosmetics and other household products by limiting the use of animal testing.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 140 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2020 Official Edition,
2 is hereby amended by inserting after Section 174F the following new section:-

3 Section 174G. (a) As used in this section, the following words shall have the following
4 meanings unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

5 "Alternative test method", a process or procedure implemented to obtain information
6 regarding the biological effects of exposure to a chemical or agent that does not employ the use
7 of an animal and results in the gathering of valid information that would otherwise be acquired
8 through the use of a traditional animal test method, including, but not limited to, computational
9 toxicology, bioinformatics, high-throughput screening methods, chemical substances testing,
10 tiered testing methods, in vitro studies, and systems biology.

11 "Commissioner", the commissioner of the department of public health.

12 "Contract testing facility", a partnership, corporation, association, or other legal
13 relationship that tests cosmetics or other products, product formulations, chemicals, or
14 ingredients.

15 "Manufacturer", a partnership, corporation, association, or other legal relationship that
16 produces cosmetics or other products, product formulations, chemicals, or ingredients.

17 "Medical research", investigations, experiments, and studies to discover, develop, or
18 verify knowledge relating to the causes, diagnosis, treatment, prevention, or control of physical
19 or mental diseases and impairments of humans and animals or relating to the development of
20 biomedical products, devices, or pharmaceuticals.

21 "Traditional animal test method", a process or procedure using animals to obtain
22 information regarding the biological effects of exposure to a chemical or agent.

23 (b) When testing a cosmetic or other product, product formulation, chemical, or
24 ingredient in the Commonwealth, no manufacturer or contract testing facility shall use a
25 traditional animal test method for which a valid alternative test method exists. No provision of
26 this subsection shall be construed to apply to a test method conducted for the purposes of
27 medical research.

28 (c) The commissioner shall promulgate regulations to implement, enforce, and administer
29 this section and shall establish standards for alternative test methods to ensure safety and
30 comparable validity of results to traditional animal test methods. The commissioner shall

31 consider the Organization for Economic Co-Operation and Development's Guidelines for the
32 Testing of Chemicals when establishing said standards.

33 SECTION 2. The commissioner of public health shall promulgate regulations to
34 implement this act no later than 180 days following passage of this act.

35 SECTION 3. Section 1 shall take effect 6 months after the passage of this act and Section
36 2 shall take effect upon passage.
