An Act relative to promote referral to treatment.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1           SECTION 1. The secretary of public safety, in consultation with the secretary of health  
2 and human services and the Massachusetts district attorney association, shall develop, maintain,  
3 and promulgate guidance for referral to treatment by the department of state police and  
4 municipal police departments for individuals presenting at department facilities with a substance  
5 addiction, provided that they are not engaged in the illegal trafficking of controlled substances.

6           SECTION 2. The secretary of public safety, in consultation with the secretary of health  
7 and human services and the Massachusetts district attorney association, shall conduct a study of  
8 the mechanisms, resources, and legal and regulatory frameworks, if necessary, to implement a  
9 comprehensive system of referral to treatment for those with substance addictions presenting  
10 themselves at state or municipal police facilities. Said study shall include, but not be limited to,  
11 the resources and costs necessary to implement and maintain such a system, costs currently being  
12 sustained by local police departments engaged in such programs, the current availability of beds

13 and other treatment resources, and the projected need for such resources to implement a  
14 comprehensive statewide system, and any applicable laws, rules, and/or regulations necessary to  
15 such a system.

16           The results of said study, together with any legislative recommendations, shall be filed  
17 with the joint committee on public safety and homeland security, and the clerks of the house and  
18 senate, not later than twelve months following the passage of this act.
