### The Commonwealth of Alassachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-Second General Court (2021-2022)

An Act banning pretextual traffic stops.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 90 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2018 Official Edition,
- 2 is hereby amended by inserting after section 62, the following new section:-
- 3 Section 63.
- 4 A) The following words shall have the following meanings:
- 5 "Pretextual traffic stop" A traffic stop in which a reasonable law enforcement officer
- 6 would not have made a stop without a pretextual motivation.
- 7 "Law enforcement officer", a law enforcement officer as defined in section 220 of
- 8 chapter 6.
- B) No law enforcement officer shall engage in a pretextual traffic stop.
- 10 C) No law enforcement officer shall ask questions during a traffic stop that are not
- reasonably related to the purpose of the stop without independent justification.

- D) No law enforcement officer shall search a vehicle or a person during a traffic stop
- unless that search is reasonably related to the purpose of the stop, without independent
- 14 justification.
