Senate, July 2, 2020 -- Text of the Senate amendment to the House Bill making appropriations for the fiscal year 2020 to authorize certain COVID-19 spending in anticipation of federal reimbursement (House, No. 4808) (being the text of Senate, No. 2789, printed as amended)

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court
(2019-2020)

1 SECTION 1. To provide for certain unanticipated obligations of the commonwealth, to
2 provide for an alteration of purpose for current appropriations and to meet certain requirements
3 of law, the sums set forth in section 2A are hereby appropriated from the General Fund unless
4 specifically designated otherwise in this section for the several purposes and subject to the
5 conditions specified in this section and subject to the laws regulating the disbursement of public
6 funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. Except as otherwise stated, the sums made
7 available in item 1599-1231 shall be made available until June 30, 2020 and the sums made
8 available in item 1599-1232 shall be made available until June 30, 2021. The secretary of
9 administration and finance may transfer funds between said items 1599-1231 and 1599-1232 to
10 ensure the timely distribution of funds as set forth in these items.

11 SECTION 2A.

12 EXECUTIVE OFFICE FOR ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

13 Reserves

14 1599-1231 For a reserve to support the commonwealth’s monitoring, treatment,
15 containment, public awareness and prevention efforts against the 2019 novel coronavirus, also
16 known as COVID-19, by the department of public health, regional and local boards of health and
17 other public instrumentalities; provided, that the secretary of administration and finance may
18 transfer from this item to other items amounts that are necessary to meet these costs where the
19 amounts otherwise available are insufficient for the purpose; provided further, that not less than
20 \$350,000,000 shall be expended for personal protective equipment; provided further, that not
21 less than \$139,000,000 shall be expended for rate add-ons to providers of congregate care and
22 other essential human services; provided further, that not less than \$93,000,000 shall be
23 expended for incentive pay for state employees at facilities that are in operation 24-hours a day,
24 including, but not limited to, residential facilities in the human services sector; provided further,
25 that not less than \$85,000,000 shall be expended for field hospitals and shelters; provided
26 further, that not less than \$44,000,000 shall be expended for the Community Tracing
27 Collaborative; provided further, that not less than \$36,000,000 shall be expended for emergency
28 child care for essential workers, covering parent fees for state-subsidized providers and operating
29 emergency residential school isolation sites; provided further, that not less than \$13,500,000
30 shall be transferred to item 7004-9005 and expended for local housing authorities to help
31 address additional costs incurred in addressing the challenges of the 2019 novel coronavirus;
32 provided further, that not less than \$2,500,000 shall be transferred to items 7004-0101 and 7004-
33 0102, and expended for the increased pandemic-related costs of the family and individual shelter
34 system; provided further, that not less than \$45,600,000 shall be expended for funds on behalf of
35 programs that provide early education services to at least 1 child who is subsidized through
36 funding from items 3000-3060 and 3000-4060 or who is the child of an essential worker through

37 the 2019 novel coronavirus state of emergency; provided further, that the department of early
38 education and care shall seek reimbursement for these costs from the one-time, discretionary
39 funding available through the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act
40 included in the Child Care and Development Block Grant related to the 2019 novel coronavirus
41 remediation; provided further, that notwithstanding any general or special law or regulation to
42 contrary, not later than June 30, 2020, the executive office for administration and finance shall
43 transfer not less than \$30,000,000 to the Health Safety Net Trust Fund established in section 66
44 of chapter 118E of the General Laws; provided further, that such funds shall be distributed not
45 later than August 1, 2020 by the executive office of health and human services as direct
46 payments to each federally-qualified community health center that receives grant funding under
47 section 330 of the federal Public Health Service Act; provided further, that said funds shall be
48 allocated in direct proportion to the number of uninsured patients treated by each such health
49 center in fiscal year 2018 as reported to the center for health information and analysis in the
50 health center cost reports; provided further, that at least 10 calendar days prior to the expected
51 payment date to each such health center, the executive office of health and human services shall
52 provide a schedule listing the total number of uninsured treated by each such health center in
53 2018, each such health center's per cent of the aggregate number of uninsured treated by all such
54 health centers combined and the proposed payment amount to each such health center; provided
55 further, that not less than \$15,000,000 shall be expended for essential behavioral health services,
56 including children's mental health and trauma services, across the commonwealth to ensure
57 continued and stable accessibility during the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further,
58 that not less than \$15,000,000 shall be expended on services and workforce supports under the
59 department of elder affairs, including direct wage supplements for home care workers and elder

60 protective services, during the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less
61 than \$20,000,000 shall be expended on statewide efforts to address racial disparities in health
62 during the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than \$111,400,000
63 shall be expended for supplemental payments to hospitals and other health care providers and
64 other costs incurred in the response to the 2019 novel coronavirus for which federal
65 reimbursement may be available; provided further, that the secretary of administration and
66 finance shall seek to optimize federal funding available for essential costs of the
67 commonwealth's response to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that the secretary of
68 administration and finance shall seek federal reimbursement for spending incurred in this item
69 where appropriate and available; provided further, that the secretary of administration and
70 finance shall consider the availability and constraints both of direct funding sources and
71 reimbursement sources; provided further, that in the event that a direct funding source is more
72 appropriate for spending authorized in this item, the secretary of administration and finance may
73 spend from the other direct funding source and reduce spending from this item accordingly;
74 provided further, that if the secretary of administration and finance determines that the actual
75 need for a particular purpose is less than is authorized to be spent in this item for that purpose,
76 the secretary of administration and finance may reduce spending accordingly; provided further,
77 that no spending reductions shall be made below the amount authorized by this item for the
78 following purposes: (i) early education reopening grants funded by the federal Child Care and
79 Development Block Grant; (ii) the transfer to the Health Safety Net Trust Fund for community
80 hospitals; (iii) essential behavioral health services; (iv) services and workforce supports under
81 the department of elder affairs; and (v) statewide efforts to address racial disparities in health;
82 provided further, that funds made available in this item, including those made available through

83 identification of an alternative funding source or not needed for a particular purpose, may be
84 expended by public instrumentalities at the secretary's discretion to support the commonwealth's
85 monitoring, treatment, containment, public awareness and prevention efforts against the 2019
86 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not later than September 30, 2020 the secretary of
87 administration and finance shall provide a report to the house and senate committees on ways
88 and means on spending from this item, including the federal resources utilized or applied for, to
89 cover purposes supported by this item; provided further, that the secretary shall provide
90 subsequent updates, as necessary, on the federal resources utilized to cover purposes supported
91 by this item; and provided further, that funds shall be expended for the costs associated with
92 measures necessary to prevent the admission and readmission to licensed skilled nursing
93 facilities of persons who tested positive for the 2019 novel coronavirus, also known as COVID-
94 19, and to facilitate the segregation of such persons from other residents of skilled nursing
95 facilities to prevent or mitigate the transmission of the virus.....\$1,000,000,000

96 1599-1232 For a reserve to support the commonwealth's monitoring, treatment,
97 containment, public awareness and prevention efforts against the 2019 novel coronavirus by the
98 department of public health, regional and local boards of health and other public
99 instrumentalities; provided, that not less than \$8,000,000 shall be transferred to items 7004-0101
100 and 7004-0102 and expended for the increased pandemic-related costs of the family and
101 individual shelter system; provided further, that not less than \$20,000,000 shall be transferred to
102 item 7004-9316 for a COVID-19 Residential Assistance for Families in Transition Response, or
103 CRR, program to provide additional support through the residential assistance for families in
104 transition program in order to prevent homelessness among those at risk due to pandemic-related
105 economic insecurity; provided further, that for the purposes of the temporary CRR program, the

106 amount of financial assistance shall not exceed \$10,000 for the duration of the program;
107 provided further, that not less than 33 per cent of the CRR funds shall be provided to households
108 with an income that is not greater than 30 per cent of the area median income, subject to the
109 department of housing and community development's discretion based on data reflecting
110 program demand and usage; provided further, that in distributing 50 per cent of the funds, the
111 department of housing and community development shall prioritize those families most likely to
112 otherwise require shelter services under said item 7004-0101; provided further, that not less than
113 \$1,500,000 shall be transferred to item 7004-3036 and expended for the additional costs incurred
114 by housing consumer education centers in administering housing and homelessness prevention
115 resources and addressing increased volume of referrals of residents in need of housing and
116 homelessness prevention resources due to reduced or lost incomes caused by the 2019 novel
117 coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than \$5,800,000 shall be transferred to said
118 item 7004-0104 for costs incurred as a result of the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic and for the
119 support of organizations providing low-threshold permanent supportive housing in non-
120 congregate single-occupancy settings that provide a safer alternative to congregate shelter
121 settings for the homeless population; provided further, that not less than \$1,000,000 shall be
122 transferred to item 4000-0007 for increased housing and supportive services necessitated by the
123 2019 novel coronavirus for unaccompanied homeless youth under section 16X of chapter 6A of
124 the General Laws; provided further, that not less than \$12,300,000 shall be transferred to item
125 4513-1020 to provide for increased staffing costs, equipment, connectivity and other costs
126 associated with the implementation and expansion of early intervention services delivered via
127 telehealth to support access to critical early intervention services during the 2019 novel
128 coronavirus; provided further, the department of public health shall issue a 2019 novel

129 coronavirus retainer or sustainability payment to all early intervention vendors and such payment
130 shall be made on a proportional basis, calculated using the most recent early intervention child
131 counts of the department of public health; provided further, that not less than \$250,000 shall be
132 transferred to item 4400-1001 for additional support for the FoodSource Hotline run by Project
133 Bread – The Walk for Hunger, Inc. in order to meet additional demand generated by the 2019
134 novel coronavirus, to connect callers across the commonwealth to food resources in their
135 communities and to assist households with SNAP applications; provided further, that not less
136 than \$1,000,000 shall be transferred to said item 4400-1001 to enhance the SNAP Outreach
137 program administered by the department of transitional assistance to fund a range of
138 organizations providing SNAP application assistance to reduce food insecurity during the 2019
139 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than \$5,250,000 shall be transferred
140 to item 7053-1925 to fund outreach, technical support and emergency operational costs of the
141 school meal sites run by the Child Nutrition Outreach Program during the 2019 novel
142 coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than \$250,000 of this amount shall be for
143 proactive outreach and technical support to districts and partners in the Child Nutrition Outreach
144 Program, as well as promotional materials, including a statewide meal site map, signage and
145 posters for individual meal sites; provided further, that not less than \$9,000,000 shall be
146 transferred to item 2511-0105 for the purchase of supplemental foods for the emergency food
147 assistance program within the Feeding America nationally-certified food bank system for
148 extraordinary need due to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that the funds
149 appropriated in this item shall be consistent with the Feeding America allocation formula in
150 order to benefit the commonwealth’s 4 regional food banks in a manner that promotes
151 geographic equity; provided further, that funds may be made available for costs associated with

152 the distribution of foods for the emergency food assistance program as a result of increased
153 demand caused by the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$5,515,000
154 shall be transferred to item 7002-0012 for expansion of summer job programs and other youth-
155 at-risk employment programs in response to increased economic insecurity as a result of 2019
156 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$235,000 shall be transferred to item
157 1595-5819 for the purposes of funding Health Care For All, Inc. for the additional costs
158 associated with operating its free statewide non-profit consumer assistance helpline during the
159 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic in order to provide health coverage eligibility, enrollment and
160 navigation assistance and to operate an online support platform for enrollment assisters across
161 the commonwealth; provided further, that not less than \$400,000 shall be transferred to item
162 4510-0110 and expended on a statewide program of technical assistance to community health
163 centers engaged in critically important facets of the commonwealth's pandemic response to be
164 provided by a state primary care association qualified under section 330A(f)(1) of the federal
165 Public Health Service Act, 42 USC section 254c(f)(1); provided further, that not less than
166 \$10,000,000 shall be transferred to the Massachusetts Growth Capital Corporation established in
167 chapter 40W of the General Laws for grants to support small businesses negatively impacted by
168 the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that eligible grant applicants shall have not more
169 than 50 employees; provided further, that grants may be used for employee payroll and benefit
170 costs, mortgage interest, rent, utilities and interest on other debt obligations; provided further,
171 that priority in awarding grants shall be given to: (i) businesses that focus on reaching
172 underserved markets; (ii) socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, which may
173 include, but shall not limited to, minority-owned, women-owned and veteran-owned businesses;
174 and (iii) businesses that have not received aid from federal programs related to the 2019 novel

175 coronavirus; provided further, that not later than December 1, 2020, the Massachusetts Growth
176 Capital Corporation shall submit a report to the house and senate committees on ways and means
177 detailing: (a) grant recipients; (b) grant sizes by recipient; and (c) any additional criteria that
178 were considered in the awarding of these grants; provided further, that not less than \$10,000,000
179 shall be expended for wage and benefit supports to employees impacted by the 2019 novel
180 coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$10,000,000 shall be transferred to item 7002-
181 0010 for grants to community foundations to provide support to individuals and households
182 throughout the commonwealth who are experiencing severe economic hardships due to the 2019
183 novel coronavirus; provided further, that grants shall be distributed equitably among the
184 community foundations based on the following factors: (1) population of individuals living in
185 poverty in the area served by the foundation; (2) limited availability of federal pandemic-related
186 relief funds that provide direct emergency financial assistance to individuals or households
187 served by the foundation; (3) pandemic-related public health impact on the region served by the
188 foundation; (4) population of individuals with unmet economic needs resulting from the 2019
189 novel coronavirus; and (5) geographic area and the number of gateway municipalities as defined
190 in section 3A of chapter 23A of the General Laws or municipalities with high proportions of
191 low-income and non-English or limited English speaking populations served by the foundation;
192 provided further, that community foundations receiving grants shall issue requests for proposals
193 to community organizations to provide direct economic support for costs related to meeting basic
194 human needs, such as housing and utility support and food security, to low-income impacted
195 individuals and households with no, or very limited, access to sources of economic relief;
196 provided further, that community foundations receiving grants shall evaluate community
197 organizations applying based on the organization's: (A) history of serving low-income, non-

198 English or limited English speaking and historically underserved communities; (B) history of
199 serving populations whose economic hardship has been exacerbated by the 2019 novel
200 coronavirus; (C) ability to conduct outreach to identify individuals and households that qualify
201 for assistance; and (D) ability to establish a simplified application process; provided further, that
202 community foundations receiving grants shall work with the executive office of housing and
203 economic development and subgrantees to develop and implement a reporting process to ensure
204 that financial assistance is directed to the individuals and households most impacted by the 2019
205 novel coronavirus; provided further, that if an area, city or town is determined to be unserved by
206 a community foundation, the executive office shall work directly with community organizations
207 to distribute grants providing direct aid to individuals and households; provided further, that the
208 executive office shall, to the extent feasible, seek out philanthropic and other private funds
209 necessary to match contributions equal to \$1 for every \$1 contributed by this item; provided
210 further, that not less than \$5,000,000 shall be expended by the secretary of the commonwealth
211 for costs associated with expanded vote by mail made necessary by the 2019 novel coronavirus
212 for primary and other elections in calendar year 2020 including, but not limited, to postage and
213 application materials; provided further, that the secretary of administration and finance shall seek
214 federal reimbursement for spending incurred in this item where appropriate and available;
215 provided further, that the secretary of administration and finance shall consider the availability
216 and constraints both of direct funding sources and reimbursement sources; provided further, that
217 in the event that a direct funding source is more appropriate for spending authorized in this item,
218 the secretary of administration and finance may spend from the other direct funding source and
219 reduce spending from this item accordingly; provided further, that funds made available in this
220 item, including those made available through identification of an alternative funding source or

221 not needed for a particular purpose, may be expended by public instrumentalities at the
222 secretary's discretion to support the commonwealth's monitoring, treatment, containment, public
223 awareness and prevention efforts against the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not
224 later than September 30, 2020, the secretary of administration and finance shall provide a report
225 to the house and senate committees on ways and means on spending from this item, including the
226 federal resources utilized or applied for to cover purposes supported by this item; provided
227 further, that the secretary shall provide subsequent updates, as necessary, on the federal resources
228 utilized to cover purposes supported by this item; provided further, that not less than \$500,000
229 shall be expended for buy local organizations that supports local agriculture and farms; provided
230 further, that prospective buy local organizations shall have 2 or more years of experience
231 expanding consumer purchasing of locally grown food and 1 buy local organization shall be
232 funded in each of the following 9 geographic areas: (1) Berkshire county; (2) Connecticut river
233 valley and Hampden, Hampshire and Franklin counties; (3) Worcester county in central
234 Massachusetts; (4) greater Boston, including Suffolk and certain parts of Middlesex counties; (5)
235 North of Boston, including Essex county and certain parts of Middlesex county; (6) southeastern
236 Massachusetts, including Bristol, Plymouth, and Norfolk counties; (7) Cape Cod in Barnstable
237 county; (8) Martha's vineyard in the county of Dukes county; and (9) Nantucket in Nantucket
238 county; provided further, that not less than \$100,000 shall be provided to the city of Malden for
239 costs associated with monitoring, treatment, containment, public awareness of and prevention
240 efforts against the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than
241 \$125,000 shall be expended to the city of Boston's public health commission to administer
242 grants for violence prevention, intervention, trauma, mental health and recovery services for
243 communities disproportionately impacted by the 2019 novel coronavirus to address increased

244 need for services; provided further, that not less than \$125,000 shall be expended to the
245 department of elementary and secondary education for a grant program for quality out-of-school
246 and summer academic enrichment programs in historically underserved communities to support
247 the costs of health and safety improvements related to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided
248 further, that not less than \$75,000 shall be expended for Housing Families Inc. in the city of
249 Malden for housing assistance services provided during the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic;
250 provided further, that not less than \$75,000 shall be expended for Bread of Life, Inc. in the city
251 of Malden to address food insecurity due to the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided
252 further, that not less than \$250,000 shall be expended equally to Avon Coalition for Every
253 Student, Braintree Community Partnership on Substance Abuse, Canton Alliance Against
254 Substance Abuse, EB Hope, Inc., in the town of East Bridgewater, Easton Wings of Hope,
255 Milton Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition, Randolph County Substance Abuse Coalition,
256 Sharon Substance Prevention and Resource Coalition and Organizing Against Substances in
257 Stoughton to address increased demand for substance use prevention services caused by the 2019
258 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$175,000 shall be expended equally to the
259 towns of Auburn, Grafton, Leicester, Millbury, Northbridge, Shrewsbury and Upton for
260 technology, health and safety improvements in public schools related to the 2019 novel
261 coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than \$75,000 shall be expended for
262 technology and health and safety improvements relating to the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic
263 for public schools in the city of Worcester; provided further, that not less than \$250,000 shall be
264 expended equally to the towns of Avon, Braintree, Canton, East Bridgewater, Easton, Milton,
265 Randolph, Sharon, Stoughton and West Bridgewater for the prevention and mitigation of
266 COVID-19; provided further, that not less than \$250,000 shall be expended for the purchase of

267 personal protective equipment and other protective and safety materials, related to the
268 extraordinary costs of the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic suffered by public schools,
269 including vocational and technical schools, within the towns of Ashburnham, Athol, Barre,
270 Brookfield, Charlton, East Brookfield, Hardwick, Hubbardston, New Braintree, North
271 Brookfield, Oakham, Paxton, Petersham, Phillipston, Rutland, Spencer, Sturbridge, Templeton,
272 Warren, West Brookfield and Winchendon in the county of Worcester; the towns of Brimfield,
273 Holland, Monson, Palmer and Wales in the county of Hampden; the town of Ware in the county
274 of Hampshire; and the town of Ashby in the county of Middlesex; provided further, that not less
275 than \$100,000 shall be expended for the New England Center and Home for Veterans to address
276 additional costs incurred in addressing the challenges of the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided
277 further, that not less than \$20,000 shall be expended for Entrepreneurship for All, Inc., A
278 Nonprofit Corporation, in the city of New Bedford to support small businesses negatively
279 impacted by the 2019 novel coronavirus by providing e-commerce training and peer-to-peer
280 networking and support; provided further, that not less than \$40,000 shall be expended for the
281 Community Economic Development Center of Southeastern Massachusetts, Inc., in the city of
282 New Bedford to provide support to individuals and households who are experiencing severe
283 economic hardships due to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than
284 \$190,000 shall be expended for Southcoast Health System, Inc., in collaboration with the Greater
285 New Bedford Community Health Center, Inc., to provide increased access to testing and personal
286 protective equipment for residents vulnerable to the 2019 novel coronavirus in the city of New
287 Bedford, including, but not limited to, low-income, non-English or limited English speaking and
288 historically underserved populations; provided further, that not less than \$150,000 shall be
289 expended to the city of Lowell and the towns of Westford, Tyngsborough, Groton, Pepperell and

290 Dunstable for the costs incurred by public libraries to transition in-person youth programs to
291 accessible remote programming as a result of the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided
292 further, that funding shall be allocated based on the percentage of the population served;
293 provided further, that each community shall receive not less than \$15,000; provided further, that
294 not less than \$100,000 shall be expended to Entrepreneurship for All, Inc. in the city of Lowell
295 for small business technical assistance and relief for those impacted by the 2019 novel
296 coronavirus in the city of Lowell; provided further, that not less than \$125,000 shall be expended
297 to Harrington Memorial Hospital, Inc., in the town of Southbridge for the purchase of personal
298 protective equipment and other necessary expenses incurred due to the 2019 novel coronavirus
299 pandemic; provided further, that not less than \$250,000 shall be expended for Household Goods,
300 Inc. in the town of Acton for a facility expansion due to increased client need and enhanced
301 social distancing necessitated by the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not
302 less than \$125,000 shall be expended to Harrington Memorial Hospital, Inc., in the town of
303 Southbridge for the purchase of personal protective equipment and other necessary expenses
304 incurred due to the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than
305 \$250,000 shall be expended for water dispensing machines and other protective and safety
306 materials, related to the extraordinary costs of the 2019 novel coronavirus suffered by public
307 schools, including vocational and technical schools, within the cities of Fitchburg, Gardner and
308 Leominster and the towns of Berlin, Bolton, Clinton, precincts 1 and 2, Lancaster, Lunenburg,
309 Sterling and Westminster in the county of Worcester; and the town of Townsend in the county of
310 Middlesex; provided further, that not less than \$80,000 shall be expended to Food Link, Inc. to
311 address increased food insecurity resulting from COVID-19 in the towns of Arlington, Billerica,
312 Burlington and Lexington and in the city of Woburn; provided further, that not less than

313 \$125,000 shall be expended for the city of Quincy, \$50,000 for the town of Braintree and
314 \$25,000 each for the towns of Abington, Holbrook and Rockland for extraordinary costs
315 necessitated by the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less than
316 \$170,000 shall be expended to the Arlington Youth Counseling Center for increased mental
317 health service needs due to the 2019 novel coronavirus pandemic; provided further, that not less
318 than \$60,000 shall be expended for the city of Beverly for personal protective equipment to
319 respond to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$40,000 shall be
320 expended for the town of Danvers for personal protective equipment to respond to the 2019
321 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$80,000 shall be expended for the city of
322 Peabody for personal protective equipment to respond to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided
323 further, that not less than \$65,000 shall be expended for the city of Salem for personal protective
324 equipment to respond to the 2019 novel coronavirus; provided further, that not less than \$5,000
325 shall be expended for the town of Topsfield for personal protective equipment to respond to the

821 1599-1232 as reserved for continuing appropriation into fiscal year 2021. The secretary of
822 administration and finance shall identify federal revenue reimbursements or other federal funds
823 available in fiscal year 2020 in order to spend from item 1599-1231 in fiscal year 2020;
