## 10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (Limit Length to Visible area)

For nearly 75 years, Easter Seals has developed a wide range of programs to serve MD. Our mission is to provide exceptional services to ensure that all people with disabilities or special needs have equal opportunity to live, learn, work & play in their communities. Built on a strong reputation as an effective collaborator with local leaders, we design & offer intensive services for individuals with disabilities & their caregivers. From Center and home-based locations throughout the State, we provide best practice programs across the life span continuum to all of our clients, (e.g. children, seniors, veterans & their families) offering a holistic, person-centered approach. We provide community-based services in the following areas: 1) inclusive early childhood education for children with disabilities & typically developing children (many of whom have another special need, such as a risk of developmental delays due to low economic status), 2) family caregiver respite services, 3) support for wounded warriors, veterans & their families including veterans employment programs & caregiver training, & 4) senior medical day services. Additional services include assistive technology and rehabilitative services.

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit Length to Visible area)

Conceived and opened as a public private partnership with Montgomery County, the State of MD & the federal government, the Easter Seals Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Inter-Generational Center is, as designed, impacting the challenges of the community and the critical needs of its citizens. It is also internationally recognized for its innovative service delivery model & the excellence of its outcomes. This internal renovation of all three floors will allow us to (a) create six new early childhood classrooms to expand our capacity from 98 to 158 (60 additional children each year, including children with severe disabilities, low-income children, and the children of wounded warriors), (b) launch a new intensive early intervention autism program for children ages 18-48 months, (c) create additional space for our rapidly growing respite and veteran workforce development programs, and (d) include security, accessibility, and HVAC upgrades. Finally, it will provide additional space for administrative and program staff.

## 28. Comments: (Limit Length to Visible area)

The Easter Seals Child Development Center (CDC) provides inclusive early childhood education to children with disabilities and typically developing peers, 6 weeks to 5 years. We prepare children for kindergarten readiness, academic success and lifelong learning. Emphasizing both learning and caring, the CDC recognizes and respects individual needs, cultures and learning styles, providing an environment where children of all abilities can participate. Classrooms follow an inclusion model, based on research and best practices, demonstrating that children with disabilities benefit most when participating with their typically developing peers. It will soon include our new intensive intervention autism program for children ages 18-48 months, which is being designed to become a first-of-its-kind national model. Among the unique features of the CDC are: (1) the intergenerational program benefits children and seniors by enhancing the socialization/stimulation of both in a uniquely shared site; (2) the Little Warriors program offers children of wounded warriors the opportunity to enroll in the CDC, providing support to the family through the recovery process. The program allows children the healing benefit of regular interaction with people with disabilities, teaching respect and acceptance that will in turn help the Little Warriors to better adjust and emotionally manage their family's new circumstances; and (3) the In-Center and Community Respite Program offers children with special needs and their siblings (and Little Warriors) planned educational and social stimulation through group interaction, allowing caregivers a day of respite each month. When the Center was designed, we were not running many of the programs we offer today, including the veterans and homeless veterans workforce development programs, and our expanded respite activities; and we did not have such a waiting list for our CDC. The need is growing. We must provide more direct services to individuals of all ages living with disabilities, and their caregivers. Last year, 424 veterans enrolled in our workforce development and employment programs and we were able to place 287 veterans in living wage full-time positions; 919 individuals/caregivers were served by Respite; 189 children and families were served in our inclusive child development center; 68 individuals utilized our assistive technology program; and more than 250 clients/caregivers were served by our adult day services. Our clients include many of the most at risk populations in our community: children with autism and other special needs, seniors with Alzheimer's disease and other age related disabilities, wounded warriors and homeless veterans, family caregivers and others. We urgently need to build out and renovate to provide additional classrooms and office space for direct services, and create additional space for our rapidly growing respite and veteran workforce development programs.
