10. Descrip	10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)						

40 West Assistance and Referral Center, Inc., a 501(c)(3) social service organization, has served West Baltimore for nearly 25 years. Its mission is to help individuals and families who need food and other necessities of life. Through its food pantry and state and federal emergency food programs, 40 West distributes food (84,055 pounds in 2017) to all those seeking help. It also provides clothing, bus tokens, prescription assistance, and help in applying for utility assistance and refers clients to other agencies providing counseling, shelter, or other assistance. For city residents in zip codes 21207 or 21229, it offers limited emergency financial assistance to prevent eviction or utility cutoff. The proposed project will allow more clients to be served, improve accessibility, provide expanded storage space, and enable significant program expansion.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The proposed project (1,994 sq ft) will provide a new handicapped-accessible entrance and remodeled, enlarged space. 40 West currently operates in crowded, damp, insufficiently private space, accessed by steep, outside steps. The organization lacks adequate storage space for food, some of which must be stored and distributed in a room used for client interviews. The new space will be less susceptible to flooding and feature an at-grade, handicapped-accessible entrance and enlarged waiting area, with individual offices for client assistance, larger storage areas for food, a handicapped-accessible bathroom, and space for computer terminals for clients. By providing 40 West with expanded, enhanced, and handicapped-accessible space, the proposed project will allow a greater number of clients to be served, provide access for potential clients with accessibility issues, offer space for commercial freezers/refrigerators, and allow for significant programmatic expansion.
