A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Primary and Secondary Education – Expansion of Mental Health Services and**
3 **Prohibition of School Resource Officers**
4 **(Police-Free Schools Act)**

5 FOR the purpose of repealing certain provisions of law relating to the establishment of the
6 Baltimore City School Police Force; prohibiting a local school system from
7 contracting with certain law enforcement agencies for a certain purpose; prohibiting
8 a local school system from establishing its own police force; altering certain functions
9 and duties of the Maryland Center for School Safety to require the Center to analyze
10 certain data, certify certain law enforcement coverage, and submit a certain report;
11 altering a certain provision of law to require the School Safety Subcabinet to promote
12 interagency efforts in a certain manner; altering the requirements of a certain report
13 by the Subcabinet to include data collected on school security employees; altering the
14 membership of the School Safety Subcabinet Advisory Board; requiring the
15 President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House jointly to appoint a chair of
16 the Advisory Board; providing that a member appointed by the Governor or jointly
17 by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House serves at the pleasure of
18 the appointing official or officials; requiring each local school system to designate a
19 security coordinator; altering the training required to be a school security employee
20 at a public school in the State; requiring the Center to collect certain data regarding
21 school security employees; altering the issues for which the Center, in collaboration
22 with local law enforcement agencies and local school systems, is required to develop
23 certain guidelines; altering the school years during which each local school system is
24 required to file a certain report; repealing a requirement that each local school
25 system post certain information on its website; requiring the Center to collect data
26 on all incidents of restraint by certain persons against a student under certain
27 circumstances; altering the fiscal years for which the Governor is required to include
28 in the annual budget bill a certain appropriation to the Safe Schools Fund to be used
29 for certain purposes related to expanding the availability of school-based mental
30 health services, restorative approaches, wraparound services, and trauma-informed
31 schools; requiring a local school system, to the extent practicable, to use certain

1 grants to contract with certain professionals who reflect the diversity of the student
2 population of the local school system; requiring the grants to be distributed to each
3 local school system based on a certain calculation; authorizing the Subcabinet to
4 deny a local school system a certain grant if the local school system previously used
5 grant funds for purposes outside the purposes of the grant; requiring the Subcabinet
6 to adopt regulations establishing a process to withhold or reinstate certain grants;
7 requiring each local school system that receives a certain grant to provide the Center
8 with evidence of how external funding will be maximized to provide students with
9 behavioral health and wraparound services; requiring each local school system, on
10 or before a certain date each year, to submit a report to the Center that includes
11 certain information; expanding the uses of the Safe Schools Fund; requiring the
12 State Board of Education to adopt regulations to carry out this Act; altering the
13 permissible uses for which the Fund is authorized to make grants; altering the fiscal
14 years during which a certain amount of money in the Fund may be used for a certain
15 purpose; requiring, in certain fiscal years, a certain amount of money in the Fund to
16 be used for a certain purpose; repealing local law enforcement agencies from the
17 entities to which the Subcabinet may make grants from the Fund and for which the
18 Subcabinet is required to establish certain procedures; making conforming changes;
19 defining certain terms; altering certain definitions; and generally relating to mental
20 health services and school safety in public schools in the State.

5 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
6 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

7 **Article – Education**

8 [4–318.

9 (a) In this section, “Baltimore City school police officer” means any person who,
10 when acting in an official capacity, is authorized by law to make arrests and who is a
11 member of the Baltimore City School Police Force.

12 (b) There is a Baltimore City School Police Force.

13 (c) The members of the Baltimore City School Police Force shall be employees of
14 and be appointed by the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners.

15 (d) (1) Except as provided in paragraph (3) of this subsection, a Baltimore City
16 school police officer has all the powers of a law enforcement officer in the State.

17 (2) (i) A Baltimore City school police officer may act in an official
18 capacity only on the premises of schools and any other property used for educational
19 purposes owned, leased, or operated by, or under the control of the Baltimore City Board of
20 School Commissioners.

21 (ii) A Baltimore City school police officer may not act in an official
22 capacity on any other property unless:

- 23 1. Engaged in fresh pursuit of a suspected offender;
- 24 2. Requested or authorized to do so by the Police
25 Commissioner of Baltimore City;
- 26 3. The exercise of power is necessary to facilitate the orderly
27 flow of traffic to and from property owned, leased, operated by, or under the control of the
28 Baltimore City School System; or
- 29 4. Ordered to do so by the Mayor of Baltimore City.

30 (3) (i) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a Baltimore City
31 school police officer whose permanent or temporary assignment is at a school or on school
32 property may carry a firearm on the premises of the school to which the officer is assigned
33 before or after regular school hours on school days and on days other than school days.

1 (ii) The Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners shall
2 establish policies to implement the provisions of subparagraph (i) of this paragraph.

3 (e) (1) In consultation with the Maryland Police Training and Standards
4 Commission, the Civil Service Commission of Baltimore City shall adopt:

5 (i) Requirements for education, training, human and public
6 relations skills, and moral character that an applicant must meet to qualify for employment
7 as a Baltimore City school police officer; and

8 (ii) Standards for the performance of duties.

9 (2) Any requirements adopted by the Civil Service Commission on or after
10 July 1, 1991 may not affect the status of any individual who is a qualified Baltimore City
11 school police officer on that date.

12 (f) The Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners shall adopt regulations
13 governing the:

14 (1) Operation of the Baltimore City School Police Force; and

15 (2) Conduct of each Baltimore City school police officer.

16 (g) This section does not:

17 (1) Make a Baltimore City school police officer a member of the Baltimore
18 City Police Department; or

19 (2) Affect the salary, benefits, or retirement program of an employee of
20 Baltimore City or the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners.

21 (h) Beginning July 1, 2017, and every 2 years thereafter, the Baltimore City
22 School Police Force shall submit a report to the members of the Baltimore City Delegation
23 to the General Assembly, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, on:

24 (1) The condition of vehicles and firearms of the Baltimore City School
25 Police Force; and

26 (2) The anticipated needs of the Baltimore City School Police Force for
27 vehicles and firearms for the following 2 years.]

29 **(A) A LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM MAY NOT CONTRACT WITH A CITY, COUNTY,**
30 **OR STATE LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY TO STATION POLICE OFFICERS OR OTHER**

1 LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL WITH ARREST AUTHORITY IN SCHOOLS OR ON
2 SCHOOL PROPERTY.

3 (B) A LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM MAY NOT ESTABLISH ITS OWN POLICE FORCE.

5 (a) In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated.

6 (b) “Advisory Board” means the School Safety Subcabinet Advisory Board.

7 (c) (1) “Behaviors of concern” means behaviors or threats that indicate a
8 student may pose a risk of self-harm or harm to others.

9 (2) “Behaviors of concern” includes:

10 (i) Expressions of hopelessness;

11 (ii) Known drug use;

12 (iii) Suicidal gestures or statements; and

13 (iv) Known gang activity.

14 (d) “Center” means the Maryland Center for School Safety.

15 (E) “COMMUNITY SCHOOL” HAS THE MEANING STATED IN § 9.9-101 OF THIS
16 ARTICLE.

17 [(e)] (F) “Drill” means a formalized exercise by which school system personnel,
18 staff, or students rehearse a school emergency plan.

19 [(f)] (G) “Fund” means the Safe Schools Fund.

20 [(g)] (H) “Local law enforcement agency” means:

21 (1) A police department of a county or municipal corporation in the State;
22 or

23 (2) A sheriff’s office that provides a law enforcement function in a county
24 or municipal corporation in the State.

25 (I) “RESTORATIVE APPROACHES” HAS THE MEANING STATED IN § 7-306 OF
26 THIS TITLE.

27 [(h)] (J) “Safety evaluation” means a written assessment of the safety conditions

1 in each public school, including ingress, egress, and access to areas of refuge for all
2 students.

3 **(K) “SCHOOL COUNSELOR” MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO HAS BEEN**
4 **CERTIFIED AS A SCHOOL COUNSELOR IN ACCORDANCE WITH REGULATIONS**
5 **ADOPTED BY THE STATE BOARD.**

6 **[(i)] (L)** “School emergency plan” means a plan for each local school system and
7 each public school within the school system that addresses mitigation of, preparedness for,
8 response to, and recovery from emergencies, including:

9 (1) Violent or traumatic events on school grounds during regular school
10 hours or during school-sponsored activities; and

11 (2) Events in the community that affect school operations.

12 **(M) “SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGIST” MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS CERTIFIED TO**
13 **PROVIDE PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES TO CHILDREN IN A PUBLIC OR**
14 **STATE-APPROVED NONPUBLIC SCHOOL SETTING, IN ACCORDANCE WITH**
15 **REGULATIONS ADOPTED BY THE STATE BOARD.**

16 **[(j)] (N)** “School resource officer” means:

17 (1) A law enforcement officer as defined under § 3-101(e) of the Public
18 Safety Article who has been assigned to a school in accordance with a memorandum of
19 understanding between the chief of a law enforcement agency as defined under § 3-101(b)
20 of the Public Safety Article and the local education agency; or

21 (2) A Baltimore City school police officer[, as defined in § 4-318 of this
22 article].

23 **[(k)] (O)** “School security employee” means an individual, as defined in
24 regulations adopted by the Subcabinet, who:

25 (1) Is not a school resource officer; [and]

26 (2) Is employed by a local school system to provide safety and
27 security-related services at a public school;

28 **(3) DOES NOT CARRY A FIREARM; AND**

29 **(4) DOES NOT HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO ARREST STUDENTS.**

30 **(P) “SCHOOL SOCIAL WORKER” MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS LICENSED BY**
31 **THE MARYLAND STATE BOARD OF SOCIAL WORK EXAMINERS AS:**

1 **(1) A MASTERS SOCIAL WORKER OR BACHELORS SOCIAL WORKER;**

2 **(2) A CERTIFIED SOCIAL WORKER; OR**

3 **(3) A CERTIFIED CLINICAL SOCIAL WORKER.**

4 **[(l)] (Q)** “Subcabinet” means the School Safety Subcabinet.

5 **(R) “TRAUMA-INFORMED SCHOOL” HAS THE MEANING STATED IN § 7-427.1**
6 **OF THIS TITLE.**

7 **[(m)] (S)** “Wraparound services” means services provided to students, and their
8 families as appropriate, including:

9 (1) Mentoring;

10 (2) Tutoring;

11 (3) Child care services;

12 (4) Housing referrals;

13 (5) Transportation;

14 (6) Crisis intervention;

15 (7) Substance abuse prevention and treatment;

16 (8) Legal aid;

17 (9) Academic counseling; and

18 (10) Career counseling.

20 (a) There is a Maryland Center for School Safety.

21 (g) The Center shall perform the following functions and duties:

22 (16) Analyze data on school **[resource officers] SECURITY EMPLOYEES** and
23 develop guidelines and training for local school systems as required under § 7-1508 of this
24 subtitle;

25 (17) Certify **[school safety coordinators] ADEQUATE LOCAL LAW**

1 **ENFORCEMENT COVERAGE** as required under § 7–1508 of this subtitle;

2 (18) Submit to the General Assembly and the Governor a summary of
3 reports on school [resource officer] **SECURITY EMPLOYEE** and local law enforcement
4 agency coverage in public schools as required under § 7–1508 of this subtitle;

6 (a) There is a School Safety Subcabinet.

7 (g) The Subcabinet shall:

8 (2) In partnership with the Advisory Board and other stakeholders:

9 (i) Disseminate information on best practices, programs, and
10 resources;

11 (ii) Provide technical assistance and training to local jurisdictions
12 and local school systems;

13 (iii) Collaborate on collection, analysis, and integration of statewide
14 data; and

15 (iv) Promote interagency efforts that support safe schools for all
16 students, school staff, parents, and community members **IN A MANNER THAT MINIMIZES**
17 **SCHOOL EXCLUSION AND JUSTICE SYSTEM INVOLVEMENT FOR STUDENTS**;

18 (h) (1) The Subcabinet shall report to the Governor and, in accordance with §
19 2–1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly on or before December 15
20 each year.

21 (2) The report shall include:

22 (i) A list of all the activities of the Center, including aggregate data
23 on the information collected from each local school system under [§] §§ 7–1510 AND
24 **7–1511.1** of this subtitle;

25 (ii) An update on the current status and effectiveness of the Center;

26 (iii) Data collected on school [resource officers] **SECURITY**
27 **EMPLOYEES** under § 7–1508 of this subtitle; and

28 (iv) Recommendations made by the Subcabinet for improving school
29 and student safety.

1 (a) There is a School Safety Subcabinet Advisory Board.

2 (b) The Advisory Board shall include the following members:

3 (1) One member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of
4 the Senate;

5 (2) One member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the
6 House;

7 (3) A representative of local superintendents of schools, appointed by the
8 Public School Superintendents' Association of Maryland;

9 (4) A representative of the Maryland Association of Boards of Education,
10 appointed by the Association;

11 (5) A school psychologist [or licensed or clinical social worker], appointed
12 by the State Superintendent;

13 **(6) A LICENSED OR CLINICAL SOCIAL WORKER, APPOINTED BY THE**
14 **STATE SUPERINTENDENT;**

15 **(7) A SCHOOL COUNSELOR, APPOINTED BY THE STATE**
16 **SUPERINTENDENT;**

17 **(8) A RESTORATIVE APPROACHES PRACTITIONER, APPOINTED BY**
18 **THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT;**

19 **(9) A BEHAVIORAL SPECIALIST, APPOINTED BY THE STATE**
20 **SUPERINTENDENT;**

21 **(10) A COMMUNITY SCHOOL COORDINATOR, APPOINTED BY THE**
22 **STATE SUPERINTENDENT;**

23 **(11) ONE REPRESENTATIVE FROM A TRAUMA-INFORMED SCHOOL, OR**
24 **A SCHOOL WITH STRONG IMPLEMENTATION OF TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES,**
25 **APPOINTED BY THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT;**

26 **[(6)] (12)** A special education administrator, appointed by the State
27 Superintendent;

28 **[(7)] (13)** A classroom teacher, appointed jointly by the Maryland State
29 Education Association and the Baltimore Teachers Union;

1 **[(8)] (14)** A school principal, appointed by the State Superintendent;

2 **[(9)] (15)** One representative of the Department of Human Services,
3 appointed by the Secretary of Human Services;

4 **[(10)] (16)** One representative of the Department of Juvenile Services,
5 appointed by the Secretary of Juvenile Services;

6 **[(11)] (17)** A school resource officer, appointed by the Maryland Association
7 of School Resource Officers;

8 **[(12)] (18)** A sheriff, appointed by the Maryland Sheriffs' Association;

9 **[(13)] (19)** A chief of police, appointed by the Maryland Chiefs of Police
10 Association, Inc.;

11 **[(14)] (20)** An emergency medical, fire, or rescue services professional,
12 appointed by the Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services Systems;

13 **[(15)] (21)** The Director of the Maryland Coordination and Analysis Center,
14 or the Director's designee;

15 **[(16)] (22)** One representative of the Maryland Assembly on School-Based
16 Health Care, appointed by the Assembly;

17 **[(17)] (23)** One representative of the Maryland Association of Student
18 Councils, appointed by the Association;

19 **[(18)] (24)** One representative of the Center for School Mental Health at the
20 University of Maryland, Baltimore Campus, appointed by the Center for School Mental
21 Health;

22 **[(19)] (25)** One representative of Disability Rights Maryland, appointed by
23 Disability Rights Maryland; [and]

24 **(26) ONE REPRESENTATIVE FROM A COMMUNITY MEDIATION GROUP,**
25 **APPOINTED BY COMMUNITY MEDIATION MARYLAND; AND**

26 **[(20)] (27)** The following [five] **SIX** members of the public, appointed by the
27 Governor:

28 (i) A parent of a public school student in the State;

29 (ii) A parent of a child with disabilities who attends a school in the
30 State;

1 **(III) A PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENT IN THE STATE WHO HAS**
2 **EXPERIENCED SCHOOL-BASED ARREST, OR THE STUDENT'S PARENT;**

3 ~~[(iii)]~~ **(IV)** A representative of a nonpublic school in the State;

4 ~~[(iv)]~~ **(V)** A representative of school bus drivers; and

5 ~~[(v)]~~ **(VI)** A representative of a nonpublic special education school.

6 (c) The ~~[Governor]~~ **PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE**
7 **HOUSE JOINTLY** shall appoint a chair of the Advisory Board from among its members.

8 (d) A member appointed by the Governor **OR THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE**
9 **AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE:**

10 (1) Serves at the pleasure of the ~~[Governor]~~ **OFFICIAL OR OFFICIALS**
11 **WHO APPOINTED THE MEMBER;**

12 (2) Serves for a term of 3 years and until a successor is appointed and
13 qualifies; and

14 (3) May be reappointed but may not serve more than two consecutive
15 terms.

16 (e) A member of the Advisory Board:

25 (a) (1) Each local school system shall designate a ~~[school safety]~~ **SECURITY**
26 coordinator.

27 (2) A designated ~~[school safety]~~ **SECURITY** coordinator shall:

28 (i) Be certified by the Center; and

1 (ii) Serve as a liaison between the local school system, the local law
2 enforcement agency, and the Center.

3 (b) (1) (i) On or before September 1, [2018] **2021**, the Center, in
4 consultation with local school systems, shall:

5 1. Develop a specialized curriculum for use in training of
6 school [resource officers and school] security employees; and

7 2. Submit the curriculum to the Maryland Police Training
8 and Standards Commission for approval.

9 (ii) The specialized curriculum developed under this subsection shall
10 include training in:

11 1. De-escalation;

12 2. Disability awareness;

13 3. Maintaining a positive school climate;

14 4. Constructive interactions with students; and

15 5. Implicit bias and disability and diversity awareness with
16 specific attention to racial and ethnic disparities.

17 (iii) 1. The specialized curriculum developed under this
18 subsection may not go into effect until it is approved by the Maryland Police Training and
19 Standards Commission.

20 2. If the Maryland Police Training and Standards
21 Commission does not initially approve the specialized curriculum, the Center shall amend
22 the curriculum until it meets with the Commission's approval.

23 (2) On or before March 1, [2019] **2022**, the Center shall develop and
24 submit to the Maryland Police Training and Standards Commission for approval a model
25 training program that meets the requirements of the curriculum approved under
26 paragraph (1) of this subsection.

27 (3) [Each local law enforcement agency shall:

28 (i) Enroll individuals assigned to be school resource officers in the
29 model training program developed by the Center under paragraph (2) of this subsection; or

30 (ii) 1. Submit to the Maryland Police Training and Standards
31 Commission for approval a training program that is consistent with the curriculum
32 developed under paragraph (1) of this subsection; and

1 resource officers, including supplemental coverage by local] **AND ADDRESSING ANY USE**
2 **OF RESTRAINT OR FORCE BY A SCHOOL SECURITY EMPLOYEE OR BY** law enforcement
3 **[agencies] OFFICERS CALLED TO A SCHOOL;** and

4 (ii) Collaborating and communicating with local law enforcement
5 agencies **ON THE APPROPRIATE CIRCUMSTANCES DURING WHICH A SCHOOL**

7 (2) On or before July 1, **[2019] 2022**, each local school system, in
8 consultation with local law enforcement agencies, shall:

9 (i) Develop a plan to implement the guidelines developed by the
10 Center; and

11 (ii) Submit the plan to the Center for review and comment.

12 (e) (1) Before the **[2018–2019] 2022–2023** school year begins, each local
13 school system shall file a report with the Center identifying[:

14 (i) The public high schools in the local school system’s jurisdiction
15 that have a school resource officer assigned to the school; and

16 (ii) If a public high school in the local school system’s jurisdiction is
17 not assigned a school resource officer,] the adequate local law enforcement coverage that
18 will be provided to **[the] EACH** public high school.

19 (2) Beginning with the **[2019–2020] 2022–2023** school year, and each
20 school year thereafter, before the school year begins, each local school system shall, in
21 accordance with the plan developed under subsection (d)(2) of this section, file a report
22 identifying:

23 (i) The public schools in the local school system’s jurisdiction that
24 have a school **[resource officer] SECURITY EMPLOYEE** assigned to the school; and

25 (ii) If a public school in the local school system’s jurisdiction is not
26 assigned a school **[resource officer] SECURITY EMPLOYEE**, the adequate local law
27 enforcement coverage that will be provided to the public school.

28 (3) On or before October 1, 2018, and each October 1 thereafter, the Center
29 shall submit a summary of the reports required under this subsection to the Governor and,
30 in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.

31 **[(f) Each local school system shall post on the school system’s website information**
32 **on the role and authority of school resource officers assigned to public schools within the**
33 **school system.]**

1 [(g)] (F) (1) For fiscal [year] YEARS 2020 [and each fiscal year thereafter]
2 **THROUGH 2022**, the Governor shall appropriate in the annual State budget \$10,000,000
3 to the Fund for the purpose of providing grants to local school systems and local law
4 enforcement agencies to assist in meeting the requirements of subsection (e) of this section.

5 (2) Grants provided under this subsection shall be made to each local
6 school system based on the number of schools in each school system in proportion to the
7 total number of public schools in the State in the prior year.

8 [(h)] (G) (1) The Center shall collect data on incidents of **RESTRAINT OR** use
9 of force [between] **BY**:

10 (i) [Any school resource officer and a student while a school resource
11 officer is carrying out the officer's duties; and

12 (ii)] Any school security employee [and] **AGAINST** a student while the
13 school security employee is carrying out the employee's duties; **AND**

14 **(II) ANY LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER WHO IS ON SCHOOL**
15 **GROUNDS AGAINST A STUDENT.**

16 (2) On or before December 1, 2020, and each December 1 thereafter, the
