1 AN ACT concerning 2 Task Force to Study Aggressive and Reckless Driving 3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force to Study Aggressive and Reckless Driving 4 to study data, research, initiatives, and policies regarding aggressive and reckless driving; and generally relating to the Task Force to Study Aggressive and Reckless 5 6 Driving. 7 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 8 That: 9 (a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated. "Aggressive driving" means driving a motor vehicle in a manner 10 11 intended to provoke or challenge other drivers. 12 "Aggressive driving" includes: (ii) 13 1. tailgating or driving too close to another motor vehicle in a manner intended to intimidate the other driver: 14 2. 15 changing lanes abruptly to cut off another motor vehicle; 16 3. ignoring the right-of-way; passing on the shoulder unless the passage is allowed by 17 4. 18 law or clear signage; and 19 5. spontaneously racing another motor vehicle.



1 "COVID-19" means, interchangeably and collectively, the coronavirus (3)2 known as COVID-19 or 2019-nCoV and the SARS-CoV-2 virus. "Reckless driving" means driving a motor vehicle: 3 **(4)** 4 (i) in wanton or willful disregard for the safety of persons or 5 property; or 6 in a manner that indicates a wanton or willful disregard for the (ii) 7 safety of persons or property. 8 (b) There is a Task Force to Study Aggressive and Reckless Driving. 9 The Task Force consists of the following members: (c) 10 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of 11 the Senate; 12 (2) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the 13 House: the Secretary of Transportation, or the Secretary's designee: 14 (3)15 the Administrator of the Motor Vehicle Administration, or the 16 Administrator's designee; 17 the Administrator of the State Highway Administration, or the (5)Administrator's designee; 18 19 (6)Superintendent of the Maryland State Police, the the 20Superintendent's designee; 21 the Secretary of Health, or the Secretary's designee; and (7)22 the following members, appointed by the Governor: (8)23 three representatives of the Maryland Association of Counties, representing the geographic and population density diversity of the State; 2425three representatives of the Maryland Municipal League, (ii) 26 representing the geographic and population density diversity of the State; 27 one representative of the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association; (iii) 28 one mental health professional with expertise in road rage; (iv) 29 one mental health professional with expertise in the impacts of (v)

COVID-19 on mental health; 1 2 (vi) one neuroscience expert with expertise in the effects of 3 COVID-19 on the brain; 4 (vii) one individual with professional expertise in the planning and development of roads and highways, including expertise in the State's Complete Streets 5 Program; and 6 7 professional (viii) one individual with expertise traffic in 8 management. 9 The Governor shall designate the chair of the Task Force. (d) The Motor Vehicle Administration shall provide staff for the Task Force. 10 (e) 11 (f) A member of the Task Force: 12 may not receive compensation as a member of the Task Force; but (1) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State 13 14 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget. The Task Force shall: 15 (g) 16 conduct a survey to determine the availability of data to study aggressive and reckless driving, including conducting a survey of: 17 18 (i) State police records; 19 (ii) records from county and municipal police departments; 20 reported traffic fatalities; (iii) 21 civil and criminal citations; (iv) 22 data from traffic control signal monitoring systems and speed (v) 23monitoring systems; 24Motor Vehicle Administration records on driver's license points. (vi) 25suspensions, and revocations; 26 State Highway Administration traffic data; (vii) 27 (viii) data from other states if considered relevant by the Task Force; 28 and
