SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That: In this section, "County board" means the Prince George's County Board of (a) Education. The Before entering into a new long-term lease, the County board shall hire an independent consultant to complete a comprehensive study on the feasibility of relocating the County board headquarters.
