7 8	(4) the deliverer and the individual receiving the delivery each endorse a delivery form that the Commission approves at the time of delivery certifying that:

14 15	(c) A holder of a manufacturer's license may directly ship alcohol to a consumer on request, if the Commission authorizes the direct shipment after determining that:		
16 17	(1) the shipment can be completed safely using a common carrier in accordance with other applicable laws; and		
18	(2) all applicable sales and excise taxes are paid.		
19 20	(d) A holder of a manufacturer's license may not directly ship to a consumer during a calendar year:		
21 22	(1) an amount of liquor that exceeds the equivalent of 18 standard size 750-milliliter bottles; or		
23	(2) an amount of beer that exceeds 3,456 ounces.		
24 25 26 27 28	(e) On or before December 1, 2023, and on or before June 1, 2024, each holder of a manufacturer's license that has sold and delivered a product produced under the holder's license to an individual located in the State in accordance with this section shall submit a report to the Alcohol and Tobacco Commission specifying the amount of liquor or beer shipped and delivered to individuals in the State in accordance with this section.
