HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

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Assigned to: Rules and Executive Nominations

Maryland Sovereignty Under the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States

- FOR the purpose of demanding that the federal government halt its practice of assuming powers and imposing mandates on the states of the United States for purposes not enumerated under the Constitution of the United States.
- WHEREAS, The Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States reads as follows: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people"; and
- WHEREAS, The Tenth Amendment describes the scope of the federal power as being the power expressly granted by the Constitution of the United States and no more; and
- WHEREAS, The scope of the power described under the Tenth Amendment means that the federal government was created by the states specifically to be an agent of the states; and
- WHEREAS, In 2010 the states demonstrably are treated as agents of the federal government; and
- WHEREAS, Many of the powers assumed and mandates imposed on the states by the federal government are in direct violation of the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and
- WHEREAS, The United States Supreme Court ruled in New York v. United States, 112 S. Ct. 2408 (1992) that Congress may not simply commandeer the legislative and regulatory processes of the several states; and



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WHEREAS, A number of proposals from prior Executive Administrations of the United States and some now pending from the current Executive Administration and from the United States Congress may further violate the Constitution of the United States; now, therefore, be it

5 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the 6 House of Delegates and Senate in the 428th Session of the Maryland General 7 Assembly:

- (1) Affirm the sovereignty of Maryland under the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States over all powers not otherwise enumerated and granted to the federal government by the Constitution of the United States; and
- 11 (2) Demand that the federal government halt and reverse its practice 12 of assuming powers and imposing mandates on the states for purposes not 13 enumerated under the Constitution of the United States; and be it further
 - RESOLVED, That a Special Committee of Conference and Correspondence be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate of Maryland and that the Special Committee communicate this resolution to the legislatures of the several states to:
- 18 (1) Assure them that this State continues and values their esteemed 19 friendship;
- 20 (2) Call on them to participate in a joint working group among the 21 states to enumerate the abuses of authority by the federal government under the 22 Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and
- 23 (3) Seek repeal of the assumption of powers and mandates unlawfully 24 imposed on the states by the federal government; and be it further
