BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA: 1.5 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2008, section 609.78, subdivision 2, is amended to read: 1.6 Subd. 2. Interference with an emergency call; gross misdemeanor offense. (a) A 1.7 person who intentionally interrupts, disrupts, impedes, or interferes with an emergency 1.8 call or who intentionally prevents or hinders another from placing an emergency call, 1.9 and whose conduct does not result in a violation of section 609.498, is guilty of a gross 1.10 misdemeanor and may be sentenced to imprisonment for not more than one year or to 1.11 payment of a fine of not more than \$3,000, or both. 1.12 (b) When a person is convicted of a violation of this subdivision against a family 1.13 or household member and is determined by the court to have used a firearm in any way 1.14 during the commission of the offense, the court may order that the person is prohibited 1.15 from possessing any type of firearm for any period longer than three years or for the 1.16 remainder of the person's life. A person who violates this paragraph is guilty of a gross 1.17 misdemeanor. At the time of the conviction, the court shall inform the defendant whether 1.18 and for how long the defendant is prohibited from possessing a firearm and that it is 1.19 a gross misdemeanor to violate this paragraph.
