3.12 of a responsible governmental unit under this chapter to conduct environmental review
3.13 because of the potential for significant environmental effects resulting from a project's
3.14 greenhouse gas emissions.

3.15 (d) By November 1, 2009, the board shall develop a guidance document to aid

6.5 Subdivision 1. **Definition.** "Per capita vehicle miles driven" means nonfreight motor

6.7 Subd. 2. **Reduction goal.** To help achieve an overall reduction in greenhouse gas
6.8 emissions in Minnesota, the commissioner of transportation shall implement, and facilitate
6.9 the implementation by other public and private entities of, policies that have the goal of

12.28 **Subd. 3. University of Minnesota Center for Transportation Studies.** By July
12.29 1, 2013, the Metropolitan Council must transfer \$500,000 from the metropolitan livable
12.30 communities fund to the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota for the Center
12.31 for Transportation Studies to offer voluntary technical assistance to local government staff
12.32 who are interested in using the resources identified in subdivision 1 to help implement the
12.33 policy goal under Minnesota Statutes, section 473.146, subdivision 5, including assistance
12.34 to communities on their comprehensive plan. The Center for Transportation Studies is

13.1 encouraged to evaluate and enhance the resources identified in subdivision 1 based on input
