1.6	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 122A.182, subdivision 1, is amended to read:
1.7	Subdivision 1. Requirements. (a) The Professional Educator Licensing and Standards
1.8	Board must approve a request from a district or charter school to issue a Tier 2 license in a
1.9	specified content area to a candidate if:
1.10	(1) the candidate meets the educational or professional requirements in paragraph (b)
1.11	or (c);
1.12	(2) the candidate:
1.13	(i) has completed the coursework required under subdivision 2 a state-approved teacher
1.14	preparation program;
1.15	(ii) is enrolled in a Minnesota-approved teacher preparation program; or
1.16	(iii) has a master's degree in the specified content area; and
1.17	(3) the district or charter school demonstrates that a criminal background check under
1.18	section 122A.18, subdivision 8, has been completed on the candidate.
1.19	(b) A candidate for a Tier 2 license must have a bachelor's degree to teach a class outside
1.20	a career and technical education or career pathways course of study.

#### APPENDIX Repealed Minnesota Statutes: 23-01588

### 122A.182 TIER 2 LICENSE.

Subd. 2. **Coursework.** (a) A candidate for a Tier 2 license must meet the coursework requirement by demonstrating completion of two of the following:

(1) at least eight upper division or graduate-level credits in the relevant content area;

(2) field-specific methods of training, including coursework;

(3) at least two years of teaching experience in a similar content area in any state, as determined by the board;

(4) a passing score on the pedagogy and content exams under section 122A.185; or

(5) completion of a state-approved teacher preparation program.

(b) For purposes of paragraph (a), "upper division" means classes normally taken at the junior or senior level of college which require substantial knowledge and skill in the field. Candidates must identify the upper division credits that fulfill the requirement in paragraph (a), clause (1).
