1.13	Sec. 2. [256K.47] SAFE HARBOR SHELTER AND HOUSING.
1.14	Subdivision 1. Grant program established. The commissioner of human services must
1.15	establish a safe harbor shelter and housing grant program. Under this grant program, the
1.16	commissioner must award grants to providers who are committed to serving sexually
1.17	exploited youth and youth at risk of sexual exploitation. Grantees must use grant money to
1.18	provide street and community outreach programs, emergency shelter programs, or supportive
1.19	housing programs consistent with the program descriptions in this section to address the
1.20	specialized outreach, shelter, and housing needs of sexually exploited youth and youth at
1.21	risk of sexual exploitation.
