Subdivision 1. Establishment. The healthy kids awards program is established to motivate kindergarten through grade 12 students to become active by rewarding them for their nutritional well-being and physical activity. The program is an effort to integrate physical activity into nonphysical education classes, recess, and extracurricular activities throughout the day in addition to the physical and nutritional education received in physical education classes. Schools joining the program must commit to participate from October through May of each school year.

- Subd. 2. Commissioner of education. The commissioner of education shall oversee the healthy kids awards program. The commissioner shall solicit letters of intent to participate in the healthy kids awards program from schools by September 15 of each school year. The commissioner shall award schools each month that have at least 75 percent of students reaching the goal of being physically active for 60 minutes each day. Any time spent in physical education classes counts toward the time requirements of this program.
- Subd. 3. Incentives. The commissioner shall seek outside sources of funding in order to create a monetary or other incentive to those schools being awarded.
