1.7	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.8	Section 1. [196.081] VETERANS STABLE HOUSING INITIATIVE; DATA.
1.9	(a) The commissioner may establish a veterans stable housing initiative. If the
1.10	commissioner establishes a veterans stable housing initiative under this section, the
1.11	commissioner must provide resources and support to assist veterans experiencing
1.12	homelessness in obtaining or maintaining stable housing.
1.13	(b) Data on individuals maintained by the commissioner in the Homeless Veteran Registry
1.14	for purposes of the veterans stable housing initiative is private data on individuals as defined
1.15	in section 13.02, subdivision 12, and must not be disclosed or shared except for coordinating
1.16	homelessness prevention efforts with:
1.17	(1) members of the Minnesota Interagency Council on Homelessness; and
1.18	(2) Homeless Veteran Registry partners to address a veteran's episode of homelessness
1.19	or maintain a veteran's housing plan through Department of Veterans Affairs funded
1.20	programs.
1.21	(c) For purposes of this section, "homelessness" means that a veteran lacks a fixed,
1.22	nighttime residence.

(c) To determine eligibility, the commissioner may require official documentation,
including the person's federal form DD-214 or other official military discharge papers;
correspondence from the United States Veterans Administration; birth certificate; marriage
certificate; proof of enrollment at an eligible institution; signed affidavits; proof of residency;
proof of identity; or any other official documentation the commissioner considers necessary
to determine eligibility.

(d) The commissioner may deny eligibility or terminate benefits under this section to 3.10 any person who has not provided sufficient documentation to determine eligibility for the 3.11 program. An applicant may appeal the commissioner's eligibility determination or termination 3.12 of benefits in writing to the commissioner at any time. The commissioner must rule on any 3.13 application or appeal within 30 days of receipt of all documentation that the commissioner 3.14 requires. The decision of the commissioner regarding an appeal is final. However, an 3.15 applicant whose appeal of an eligibility determination has been rejected by the commissioner 3.16 may submit an additional appeal of that determination in writing to the commissioner at 3.17 any time that the applicant is able to provide substantively significant additional information 3.18 regarding the applicant's eligibility for the program. An approval of an applicant's eligibility 3.19 by the commissioner following an appeal by the applicant is not retroactively effective for 3.20 more than one year or the semester of the person's original application, whichever is later. 3.21

(e) Upon receiving an application with insufficient documentation to determine eligibility,
the commissioner must notify the applicant within 30 days of receipt of the application that
the application is being suspended pending receipt by the commissioner of sufficient
documentation from the applicant to determine eligibility.

 level of care available.
