AN ACT

To repeal sections 190.839, 198.439, 208.437, 208.480, 338.550, and 633.401, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof six new sections relating to reimbursement allowance taxes, with expiration dates.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 190.839, 198.439, 208.437, 208.480, 338.550, and 2 633.401, RSMo, are repealed and six new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be 3 known as sections 190.839, 198.439, 208.437, 208.480, 338.550, and 633.401, to 4 read as follows:

190.839. Sections 190.800 to 190.839 shall expire on September 30, [2016]

2 **2019**.

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198.439. Sections 198.401 to 198.436 shall expire on September 30, [2016] **2019**.

208.437. 1. A Medicaid managed care organization reimbursement allowance period as provided in sections 208.431 to 208.437 shall be from the first $\mathbf{2}$ 3 day of July to the thirtieth day of June. The department shall notify each Medicaid managed care organization with a balance due on the thirtieth day of 4 June of each year the amount of such balance due. If any managed care 5organization fails to pay its managed care organization reimbursement allowance 6 within thirty days of such notice, the reimbursement allowance shall be 7 8 delinquent. The reimbursement allowance may remain unpaid during an appeal. 9 2. Except as otherwise provided in this section, if any reimbursement allowance imposed under the provisions of sections 208.431 to 208.437 is unpaid 10 and delinquent, the department of social services may compel the payment of 11 12such reimbursement allowance in the circuit court having jurisdiction in the

13 county where the main offices of the Medicaid managed care organization are located. In addition, the director of the department of social services or the 14 director's designee may cancel or refuse to issue, extend or reinstate a Medicaid 15contract agreement to any Medicaid managed care organization which fails to pay 16such delinquent reimbursement allowance required by sections 208.431 to 208.437 17unless under appeal. 18

19 3. Except as otherwise provided in this section, failure to pay a delinquent 20reimbursement allowance imposed under sections 208.431 to 208.437 shall be 21grounds for denial, suspension or revocation of a license granted by the department of insurance, financial institutions and professional registration. The 22director of the department of insurance, financial institutions and professional 2324registration may deny, suspend or revoke the license of a Medicaid managed care 25organization with a contract under 42 U.S.C. Section 1396b(m) which fails to pay 26a managed care organization's delinquent reimbursement allowance unless under 27appeal.

284. Nothing in sections 208.431 to 208.437 shall be deemed to effect or in 29any way limit the tax-exempt or nonprofit status of any Medicaid managed care 30 organization with a contract under 42 U.S.C. Section 1396b(m) granted by state law. 31

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5. Sections 208.431 to 208.437 shall expire on September 30, [2016] 2019. 208.480. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 208.471 to the contrary, sections 208.453 to 208.480 shall expire on September 30, [2016] 2019. $\mathbf{2}$ 338.550. 1. The pharmacy tax required by sections 338.500 to 338.550 $\mathbf{2}$ shall expire ninety days after any one or more of the following conditions are met: 3 (1) The aggregate dispensing fee as appropriated by the general assembly paid to pharmacists per prescription is less than the fiscal year 2003 dispensing 4 fees reimbursement amount; or 5

(2) The formula used to calculate the reimbursement as appropriated by 6 the general assembly for products dispensed by pharmacies is changed resulting 7 in lower reimbursement to the pharmacist in the aggregate than provided in 8 9 fiscal year 2003; or

10 (3) September 30, [2016] 2019.

11 The director of the department of social services shall notify the revisor of 12statutes of the expiration date as provided in this subsection. The provisions of sections 338.500 to 338.550 shall not apply to pharmacies domiciled or 13 14headquartered outside this state which are engaged in prescription drug sales

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that are delivered directly to patients within this state via common carrier, mailor a carrier service.

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Sections 338.500 to 338.550 shall expire on September 30, [2016] 2019.
 633.401. 1. For purposes of this section, the following terms mean:

2 (1) "Engaging in the business of providing health benefit services",
3 accepting payment for health benefit services;

4 (2) "Intermediate care facility for the intellectually disabled", a private or 5 department of mental health facility which admits persons who are intellectually 6 disabled or developmentally disabled for residential habilitation and other 7 services pursuant to chapter 630. Such term shall include habilitation centers 8 and private or public intermediate care facilities for the intellectually disabled 9 that have been certified to meet the conditions of participation under 42 CFR, 10 Section 483, Subpart 1;

(3) "Net operating revenues from providing services of intermediate care facilities for the intellectually disabled" shall include, without limitation, all moneys received on account of such services pursuant to rates of reimbursement established and paid by the department of social services, but shall not include charitable contributions, grants, donations, bequests and income from nonservice related fund-raising activities and government deficit financing, contractual allowance, discounts or bad debt;

(4) "Services of intermediate care facilities for the intellectually disabled"
has the same meaning as the term "services of intermediate care facilities for the
mentally retarded", as used in Title 42 United States Code, Section
1396b(w)(7)(A)(iv), as amended, and as such qualifies as a class of health care
services recognized in federal Public Law 102-234, the Medicaid Voluntary
Contribution and Provider Specific Tax Amendment of 1991.

24 2. Beginning July 1, 2008, each provider of services of intermediate care 25 facilities for the intellectually disabled shall, in addition to all other fees and 26 taxes now required or paid, pay assessments on their net operating revenues for 27 the privilege of engaging in the business of providing services of the intermediate 28 care facilities for the intellectually disabled or developmentally disabled in this 29 state.

30 3. Each facility's assessment shall be based on a formula set forth in rules
31 and regulations promulgated by the department of mental health.

32 4. For purposes of determining rates of payment under the medical33 assistance program for providers of services of intermediate care facilities for the

intellectually disabled, the assessment imposed pursuant to this section on net operating revenues shall be a reimbursable cost to be reflected as timely as practicable in rates of payment applicable within the assessment period, contingent, for payments by governmental agencies, on all federal approvals necessary by federal law and regulation for federal financial participation in payments made for beneficiaries eligible for medical assistance under Title XIX of the federal Social Security Act.

5. Assessments shall be submitted by or on behalf of each provider of services of intermediate care facilities for the intellectually disabled on a monthly basis to the director of the department of mental health or his or her designee and shall be made payable to the director of the department of revenue.

6. In the alternative, a provider may direct that the director of the department of social services offset, from the amount of any payment to be made by the state to the provider, the amount of the assessment payment owed for any month.

49 7. Assessment payments shall be deposited in the state treasury to the 50credit of the "Intermediate Care Facility Intellectually Disabled Reimbursement Allowance Fund", which is hereby created in the state treasury. All investment 5152earnings of this fund shall be credited to the fund. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any unexpended balance in the 5354intermediate care facility intellectually disabled reimbursement allowance fund 55at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the general revenue fund but shall 56accumulate from year to year. The state treasurer shall maintain records that show the amount of money in the fund at any time and the amount of any 5758investment earnings on that amount.

59 8. Each provider of services of intermediate care facilities for the intellectually disabled shall keep such records as may be necessary to determine 60 the amount of the assessment for which it is liable under this section. On or 61before the forty-fifth day after the end of each month commencing July 1, 2008, 62 each provider of services of intermediate care facilities for the intellectually 63 disabled shall submit to the department of social services a report on a cash basis 64 that reflects such information as is necessary to determine the amount of the 65 66 assessment payable for that month.

9. Every provider of services of intermediate care facilities for the
intellectually disabled shall submit a certified annual report of net operating
revenues from the furnishing of services of intermediate care facilities for the

70 intellectually disabled. The reports shall be in such form as may be prescribed 71 by rule by the director of the department of mental health. Final payments of the 72 assessment for each year shall be due for all providers of services of intermediate 73 care facilities for the intellectually disabled upon the due date for submission of 74 the certified annual report.

10. The director of the department of mental health shall prescribe by
rule the form and content of any document required to be filed pursuant to the
provisions of this section.

11. Upon receipt of notification from the director of the department of mental health of a provider's delinquency in paying assessments required under this section, the director of the department of social services shall withhold, and shall remit to the director of the department of revenue, an assessment amount estimated by the director of the department of mental health from any payment to be made by the state to the provider.

84 12. In the event a provider objects to the estimate described in subsection 11 of this section, or any other decision of the department of mental health 85 86 related to this section, the provider of services may request a hearing. If a hearing is requested, the director of the department of mental health shall 87 provide the provider of services an opportunity to be heard and to present 88 evidence bearing on the amount due for an assessment or other issue related to 89 90 this section within thirty days after collection of an amount due or receipt of a request for a hearing, whichever is later. The director shall issue a final decision 91 92within forty-five days of the completion of the hearing. After reconsideration of 93 the assessment determination and a final decision by the director of the 94 department of mental health, an intermediate care facility for the intellectually disabled provider's appeal of the director's final decision shall be to the 95administrative hearing commission in accordance with sections 208.156 and 96 97 621.055.

98 13. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, appeals 99 regarding this assessment shall be to the circuit court of Cole County or the 100 circuit court in the county in which the facility is located. The circuit court shall 101 hear the matter as the court of original jurisdiction.

102 14. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect or in any way limit 103 the tax-exempt or nonprofit status of any intermediate care facility for the 104 intellectually disabled granted by state law.

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15. The director of the department of mental health shall promulgate

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106 rules and regulations to implement this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority 107 delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is 108 109 subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers 110 vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the 111 effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held 112unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed 113or adopted after August 28, 2008, shall be invalid and void. 114 16. The provisions of this section shall expire on September 30, [2016] 115
