3 BY REQUEST OF THE OFFICE OF BUDGET AND PROGRAM PLANNING

5 A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT APPROPRIATING MONEY FROM THE HISTORIC  
6 PRESERVATION GRANT PROGRAM ACCOUNT TO THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR HISTORIC  
7 PRESERVATION PROJECTS; AUTHORIZING GRANTS FROM THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION GRANT  
8 PROGRAM ACCOUNT; PLACING CONDITIONS ON GRANTS AND FUNDS; PROVIDING AN  
9 APPROPRIATION; AMENDING SECTIONS 22-3-1305 AND 22-3-1306, MCA; AMENDING SECTION 1(2),  
10 CHAPTER 467, LAWS OF 2021; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND A TERMINATION DATE."

11  
12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

13  
14 **SECTION 1. SECTION 22-3-1305, MCA, IS AMENDED TO READ:**

15 **"22-3-1305. Historic preservation grant program -- proposals -- recommendations.** (1) There is a  
16 historic preservation grant program established within the department of commerce. A Except as provided in  
17 subsection (6), a person, association, or representative of a governing unit seeking a historic preservation grant  
18 under this section must submit a grant proposal to the department by March 1 of the year preceding the  
19 convening of a regular legislative session.

20 (2) The department shall review all proposals for historic preservation grants in consultation with  
21 the tourism advisory council and the state historical preservation office before they are submitted to the  
22 legislature.

23 (3) Consistent with the rules adopted in accordance with 22-3-1306, the department shall make  
24 recommendations to the legislature on each proposal submitted to the department.

25 (4) The department's recommendations to the legislature are advisory.

26 (5) The department shall present its recommendations to the appropriations committee of the  
27 legislature by the 15th day of a regular legislative session.

28 (6) The legislature may appropriate funds for a qualifying historic preservation grant in addition to

1 those recommended by the department of commerce."

3 **SECTION 2. SECTION 22-3-1306, MCA, IS AMENDED TO READ:**

4 **"22-3-1306. Priorities for funding -- rulemaking.** (1) The department of commerce shall make  
5 recommendations for grants awarded under the historic preservation grant program to ~~public or private~~ eligible  
6 entities for the preservation of historic sites, historical societies, or history museums in the state.

7 (2) Projects funded under this section must provide that a significant portion of the facility be open  
8 to public access and use. Projects that confer only a private benefit are not eligible.

9 (3) The recommendations must be based on competitive criteria created by the department, as  
10 guided by the legislature. The criteria may include:

11 (a) the degree of economic stimulus or economic activity, including job creation and work creation  
12 for Montana contractors and service workers;

13 (b) the purpose of the project, including whether it provides features that establish or enhance  
14 security, climate control, or fire protection for museums or address infrastructure, maintenance, or building code  
15 issues;

16 (c) the timing of the project, including access to matching funds, if needed, and approval of permits  
17 so that work can be completed without delay;

18 (d) the historic or heritage value related to the state of Montana;

19 (e) the successful track record or experience of the organization directing the project; ~~and~~

20 (f) the expected ongoing economic benefit to the state as a result of the project completion;

21 (g) the degree of local contribution to the project; and

22 (h) the anticipated public benefit, including the extent the site or building will be open to the public  
23 and the degree of immediate facility use after project completion.

24 ~~(2)(4)~~ (4) The department of commerce shall adopt rules necessary to implement the historic  
25 preservation grant program. In adopting rules, the department shall look to the rules adopted for the Montana  
26 coal endowment program, the cultural and aesthetic grant program, and other similar state programs. To the  
27 extent feasible, the department shall make the rules compatible with those other programs."

11 appropriated to the department of commerce ~~\$8,501,314~~ \$10,968,044 for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023,

12 from the historic preservation grant program account established in 22-3-1307 to finance projects authorized in

13 subsection (2).

3           (3)     Funding for the projects in subsection (2) will be provided in the order of priority as long as  
4 there are sufficient funds available from the amount that was deposited into the historic preservation grant  
5 program account during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023. The funds in this subsection must be awarded for  
6 the projects and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set out in subsection (2) subject to the conditions set  
7 forth in ~~[section 3]~~ [SECTION 7]. However, any of the projects listed in subsection (2) that have not completed the  
8 conditions described in ~~[section 3(1)]~~ [SECTION 7(1)] by September 1, 2024, must be reviewed by the next  
9 regular legislature to determine if the authorized grant should be withdrawn.

10           (4)     If sufficient funds are available, this section constitutes a valid obligation of funds to the grant  
11 projects listed in subsection (2) for purposes of encumbering the funds in the historic preservation grant  
12 program account established in 22-3-1307 for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, pursuant to 17-7-302. A  
13 grant recipient's entitlement to receive funds is dependent on the grant recipient's compliance with the  
14 conditions described in ~~[section 3]~~ [SECTION 7] and on the availability of funds.

15           (5)     The legislature, pursuant to 22-3-1305, authorizes the grants for the projects listed in  
16 subsection (2).

17           ~~(6)~~     (A) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (6)(B), A GRANT RECIPIENT SHALL ENTER INTO A DEFINITIVE,  
18 BINDING CONTRACT WITH A QUALIFIED CONTRACTOR TO CONSTRUCT THE PROJECT PRIOR TO SEPTEMBER 30 OF THE  
19 EVEN-NUMBERED YEAR PRECEDING THE NEXT REGULARLY SCHEDULED LEGISLATIVE SESSION. IF THE GRANT RECIPIENT  
20 FAILS TO MEET THE DEADLINE, ANY OBLIGATION TO THE GRANT RECIPIENT WILL CEASE, AND THE FUNDS WILL REVERT TO  
21 THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION GRANT PROGRAM ACCOUNT ESTABLISHED IN 22-3-1307 FOR USE IN THE NEXT BIENNIUM.

22           (B) A GRANT RECIPIENT WHO FAILS TO MEET THE CONTRACT DEADLINE FOR EITHER OF THE FOLLOWING  
23 REASONS MAY REQUEST ONE 2-YEAR EXTENSION, DURING WHICH THE PROJECT MUST BE PLACED UNDER CONTRACT OR  
24 ANY OBLIGATION TO THE GRANT WILL CEASE:

25           (i) THE PROJECT WAS DAMAGED BY FIRE OR ANOTHER FORM OF CASUALTY; OR

26           (ii) THE GRANT RECIPIENT FAILED TO FIND A QUALIFIED CONTRACTOR TO CONSTRUCT THE PROJECT AND  
27 DILIGENTLY PURSUED ALL REASONABLE AVENUES TO FIND A QUALIFIED CONTRACTOR.

28           ~~(6)(7)~~     Grant recipients ~~must~~ SHALL complete all of the conditions described in ~~[section 3(1)]~~ [SECTION

1 7(1)] by September 30, 2026, or any obligation to the grant recipient will cease.

2

3 NEW SECTION. SECTION 5. SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS. IN THE EVENT THAT THE TOTAL COST OF A  
4 PROJECT EXCEEDS THE AMOUNT OF THE GRANT AND MATCHING FUNDS, THE GRANT RECIPIENT IS FULLY RESPONSIBLE  
5 FOR FUNDING THE COST OVERRUN. A SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION MAY NOT BE GRANTED TO COMPLETE THE  
6 PROJECT.

7

8 NEW SECTION. Section 6. Approval of grants -- completion of biennial appropriation. (1) The  
9 legislature, pursuant to 22-3-1305, authorizes grants for the projects identified in ~~[section 4(2)]~~ [SECTION 4(2)].

10 (2) The authorization of these grants completes a biennial appropriation from the historic  
11 preservation grant program account established in 22-3-1307.

12 (3) Grants to entities from prior bienniums are reauthorized for completion of contract work.

13

14 NEW SECTION. Section 7. Condition of grants -- disbursement of funds. (1) The disbursement of  
15 grant funds for the projects specified in ~~[section 4(2)]~~ [SECTION 4(2)] is subject to completion of the following  
16 conditions:

17 (a) The grant recipient shall document that other matching funds required for the completion of the  
18 project are firmly committed.

19 (b) The grant recipient must have a project management plan that is approved by the department  
20 of commerce.

21 (c) The grant recipient must be in compliance with the auditing and reporting requirements  
22 provided for in 2-7-503 and have established a financial accounting system that the department can reasonably  
23 ensure conforms to generally accepted accounting principles. Tribal governments shall comply with auditing  
24 and reporting requirements provided for in 2 CFR 200.

25 (d) The grant recipient shall satisfactorily comply with any conditions described in the application  
26 (project) summaries section of the Montana historic preservation grant program 2025 biennium report to the  
27 68th legislature.

28 (e) The grant recipient shall satisfy other specific requirements considered necessary by the



1 department of commerce to accomplish the purpose of the project as evidenced by the application to the  
2 department.

3 (f) The grant recipient shall execute a grant agreement with the department of commerce.

4 (2) Recipients of Montana historic preservation grant program funds are subject to the  
5 requirements of the department of commerce as described in the most recent edition of the Montana Historic  
6 Preservation Grant Program Project Administration Manual adopted by the department through the  
7 administrative rulemaking process.

8  
9 **NEW SECTION. Section 8. Other powers and duties of the department of commerce.** (1) The  
10 department of commerce must disburse grant funds on a reimbursement basis as grant recipients incur eligible  
11 project expenses.

12 (2) If actual project expenses are lower than the projected expense of the project, the department  
13 may, at its discretion, reduce the amount of grant funds provided to grant recipients in proportion to all other  
14 project funding sources.

15  
16 **NEW SECTION. Section 9. Notification to tribal governments.** The secretary of state shall send a  
17 copy of [this act] to each federally recognized tribal government in Montana.

18  
19 **NEW SECTION. Section 10. Effective date.** [This act] is effective July 1, 2023.

20  
21 **NEW SECTION. SECTION 11. TERMINATION. [SECTION 1] TERMINATES JUNE 30, 2025.**
