- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact chapter 43-40.1 of the North Dakota Century Code.
- 2 relating to the occupational therapy licensure compact.

### 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 4 **SECTION 1.** Chapter 43-40.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:
- 6 **43-40.1-01. Purpose.**

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- The purpose of this compact is to facilitate interstate practice of occupational therapy
   with the goal of improving public access to occupational therapy services. The practice
   of occupational therapy occurs in the state where the patient is located at the time of
   the patient encounter. The compact preserves the regulatory authority of states to
   protect public health and safety through the current system of state licensure.
- 12 <u>2. This compact is designed to:</u>
- 13 <u>a. Increase public access to occupational therapy services by providing for the</u>
   14 <u>mutual recognition of other member state licenses;</u>
  - b. Enhance the states' ability to protect the public's health and safety;
- 16 <u>c. Encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating multistate</u>
   17 <u>occupational therapy practice;</u>
- 18 <u>d. Support spouses of relocating military members;</u>
- e. Enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative, and disciplinary information
   between member states;
- f. Allow a remote state to hold a provider of services with a compact privilege in
   that state accountable to that state's practice standards; and
- g. Facilitate the use of telehealth technology to increase access to occupational
   therapy services.

# 1 <u>43-40.1-02. Definitions.</u>

- 2 As used in this compact:
- 3 <u>1. "Active duty military" means full-time duty status in the active uniformed service of the</u>
- 4 <u>United States, including members of the national guard and reserve on active duty</u>
- 5 orders under 10 U.S.C. chapter 1209 and 10 U.S.C. chapter 1211.
- 6 <u>2.</u> "Adverse action" means any administrative, civil, equitable, or criminal action
- 7 permitted by a state's laws which is imposed by a licensing board or other authority
- 8 against an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant, including actions
- 9 <u>against an individual's license or compact privilege, including censure, revocation,</u>
- suspension, probation, monitoring of the licensee, or restriction on the licensee's
- 11 <u>practice.</u>
- 12 <u>3.</u> "Alternative program" means a nondisciplinary monitoring process approved by an
- 13 <u>occupational therapy licensing board.</u>
- 14 <u>4.</u> "Compact privilege" means the authorization, which is equivalent to a license, granted
- by a remote state to allow a licensee from another member state to practice as an
- occupational therapist or practice as an occupational therapy assistant in the remote
- 17 <u>state under its laws and rules. The practice of occupational therapy occurs in the</u>
- member state where the patient is located at the time of the patient encounter.
- 19 <u>5.</u> "Continuing education" means a requirement, as a condition of license renewal, to
- 20 provide evidence of participation in, or completion of, educational and professional
- 21 <u>activities relevant to practice or area of work.</u>
- 22 6. "Current significant investigative information" means investigative information a
- 23 <u>licensing board, after an inquiry or investigation that includes notification and an</u>
- opportunity for the occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant to respond,
- if required by state law, has reason to believe is not groundless and, if proved true,
- would indicate more than a minor infraction.
- 27 <u>T. "Data system" means a repository of information about licensees, including license</u>
- status, investigative information, compact privileges, and adverse actions.
- 29 8. "Encumbered license" means a license in which an adverse action restricts the
- practice of occupational therapy by the licensee or the adverse action has been
- reported to the national practitioner data bank.

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1 "Executive committee" means a group of directors elected or appointed to act on 2 behalf of, and within the powers granted to them by, the commission. 3 <u>10.</u> "Home state" means the member state that is the licensee's primary state of 4 residence. 5 <u>11.</u> "Impaired practitioner" means an individual whose professional practice is adversely 6 affected by substance abuse, addiction, or other health-related condition. 7 12. "Investigative information" means information, records, or documents received or 8 generated by an occupational therapy licensing board pursuant to an investigation. 9 <u>13.</u> "Jurisprudence requirement" means the assessment of an individual's knowledge of 10 the laws and rules governing the practice of occupational therapy in a state. 11 <u>14.</u> "Licensee" means an individual who currently holds an authorization from the state to 12 practice as an occupational therapist or as an occupational therapy assistant. 13 15. "Member state" means a state that has enacted this compact. 14 <u>16.</u> "Occupational therapist" means an individual who is licensed by a state to practice 15 occupational therapy. 16 "Occupational therapy", "occupational therapy practice", and the "practice of <u>17.</u> 17 occupational therapy" mean the care and services provided by an occupational 18 therapist or an occupational therapy assistant as provided under the member state's 19 statutes and regulations. 20 <u>18.</u> "Occupational therapy assistant" means an individual who is licensed by a state to 21 assist in the practice of occupational therapy. 22 19. "Occupational therapy compact commission" or "commission" means the national 23 administrative body whose membership consists of all states that have enacted this 24 compact. 25 "Occupational therapy licensing board" or "licensing board" means the agency of a <u>20.</u> 26 state that is authorized to license and regulate occupational therapists and 27 occupational therapy assistants. 28 21. "Primary state of residence" means the state in which an occupational therapist or 29 occupational therapy assistant who is not active duty military declares a primary 30 residence for legal purposes as verified by a driver's license, federal income tax

28		<u>hea</u>	Ith and safety of the remote state's citizens. The licensee may be ineligible for a
29		com	pact privilege in any state until the specific time for removal has passed and all
30		fine	s are naid

1	<u>6.</u>	If a home state license is encumbered, the licensee loses the compact privilege in any
2		remote state until:
3		a. The home state license is no longer encumbered; and
4		b. Two years have elapsed from the date on which the home state license is no
5		longer encumbered in accordance with subdivision a.
6	<u>7.</u>	If an encumbered license in the home state is restored to good standing, the licensee
7		must meet the requirements of subsection 1 to obtain a compact privilege in any
8		remote state.
9	<u>8.</u>	If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is removed, the licensee may lose
10		the compact privilege in any other remote state until:
11		a. The specific period of time for which the compact privilege was removed has
12		ended;
13		b. All fines have been paid and all conditions have been met;
14		c. Two years have elapsed from the date of completing the requirements under
15		subdivisions a and b; and
16		d. The compact privileges are reinstated by the commission, and the compact data
17		system is updated to reflect reinstatement.
18	<u>9.</u>	If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is removed due to an erroneous
19		charge, privileges must be restored through the compact data system.
20	<u>10.</u>	If the requirements of subsection 8 have been met, the licensee must meet the
21		requirements in subsection 1 to obtain a compact privilege in a remote state.
22	<u>43-4</u>	0.1-05. Obtaining a new home state license by virtue of compact privilege.
23	<u>1.</u>	An occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant may hold a home state
24		license, which allows for compact privileges in member states, in only one member
25		state at a time.
26	<u>2.</u>	If an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant changes primary state of
27		residence by moving between two member states:
28		a. The occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant shall file an
29		application for obtaining a new home state license by virtue of a compact
30		privilege, pay all applicable fees, and notify the current and new home state in
31		accordance with applicable rules adopted by the commission.

Active duty military personnel or their spouses. 2 Active duty military personnel, or their spouses, shall designate a home state where the 3 individual has a current license in good standing. The individual may retain the home state 4 designation during the period the service member is on active duty. Subsequent to designating 5 a home state, the individual only shall change their home state through application for licensure 6 in the new state or through the process described in section 43-40.1-05. 7 43-40.1-07. Adverse actions. 8 A home state has exclusive power to impose adverse action against an occupational 9 therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's license issued by the home state. 10 2. In addition to the other powers conferred by state law, a remote state may: 11 Take adverse action against an occupational therapist's or occupational therapy 12 assistant's compact privilege within that member state. 13 Issue a subpoena for hearings and investigations that require the attendance and b. 14 testimony of witnesses as well as the production of evidence. A subpoena issued 15 by a licensing board in a member state for the attendance and testimony of 16 witnesses or the production of evidence from another member state must be 17 enforced in the latter state by any court of competent jurisdiction, according to the 18 practice and procedure of that court applicable to subpoenas issued in 19 proceedings pending before the court. The issuing authority shall pay any witness 20 fees, travel expenses, mileage, and other fees required by the service statutes of 21 the state in which the witnesses or evidence are located. 22 For purposes of taking adverse action, the home state shall give the same priority and 3. 23 effect to reported conduct received from a member state as it would if the conduct had 24 occurred within the home state. In so doing, the home state shall apply its own state 25 laws to determine appropriate action. 26 <u>4.</u>

4. The home state shall complete any pending investigation of an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who changes primary state of residence during the course of the investigation. The home state, where the investigation was initiated may take appropriate action and shall promptly report the conclusion of the investigation to the occupational therapy compact commission data system. The occupational therapy

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1 compact commission data system administrator shall promptly notify the new home 2 state of any adverse action. 3 <u>5.</u> A member state, if otherwise permitted by state law, may recover from the affected 4 occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant the cost of an investigation 5 and disposition of a case resulting from any adverse action taken against that 6 occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant. 7 A member state may take adverse action based on the factual findings of the remote 8 state, provided the member state follows its own procedures for taking the adverse 9 action. 10 7. Joint investigations: 11 In addition to the authority granted to a member state by its respective state 12 occupational therapy laws and regulations or other applicable state law, any 13 member state may participate with other member states in joint investigations of 14 licensees. 15 <u>b.</u> Member states shall share any investigative, litigation, or compliance materials in 16 furtherance of any joint or individual investigation initiated under the compact. 17 <u>8.</u> If an adverse action is taken by the home state against an occupational therapist's or 18 occupational therapy assistant's license, the occupational therapist's or occupational 19 therapy assistant's compact privilege in all other member states must be deactivated 20 until all encumbrances have been removed from the state license. All home state 21 disciplinary orders that impose adverse action against an occupational therapist's or 22 occupational therapy assistant's license must include a statement that the 23 occupational therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's compact privilege is 24 deactivated in all member states during the pendency of the order. 25 If a member state takes adverse action, the member state shall promptly notify the 9. 26 administrator of the data system. The administrator of the data system shall promptly 27 notify the home state of any adverse action by a remote state.

- The commission shall exercise its rulemaking powers pursuant to the criteria set forth

Failure to 7 provide service of process to the commission renders a judgment or order void 8 as to the commission, this compact, or adopted rules. 9 Default, technical assistance, and termination. <u>2.</u> 10 If the commission determines a member state has defaulted in the performance 11 of its obligations or responsibilities under this compact or the adopted rules, the 12 commission shall: 13 (1) Provide written notice to the defaulting state and other member states of the 14 nature of the default, the proposed means of curing the default, and any 15 other action to be taken by the commission; and 16 (2) Provide remedial training and specific technical assistance regarding the 17 default. 18 <u>b.</u> If a state in default fails to cure the default, the defaulting state may be 19 terminated from the compact upon an affirmative vote of a majority of the 20 member states, and all rights, privileges, and benefits conferred by this compact 21 may be terminated on the effective date of termination.     - 5. This compact may be amended by the member states. An amendment to this compact may not become effective and binding on any member state until the amendment is enacted into the laws of all member states.

## 43-40.1-13. Construction and severability.

This compact must be liberally construed to effectuate the purposes of the compact. The provisions of this compact are severable and if any phrase, clause, sentence, or provision of this compact is declared to be contrary to the constitution of any member state or of the United States or the applicability thereof to any government, agency, individual, or circumstance is held invalid, the validity of the remainder of this compact and the applicability of this compact to any government, agency, individual, or circumstance are not affected thereby. If this compact is held contrary to the constitution of any member state, the compact remains in full force and effect as to the remaining member states and in full force and effect as to the member state affected as to all severable matters.

# 1 43-40.1-14. Binding effect of compact and other laws.

- A licensee providing occupational therapy in a remote state under the compact
   privilege shall function within the laws and regulations of the remote state.
- This compact does not prevent the enforcement of any other law of a member state
   which is not inconsistent with the compact.
- 6 3. A law in a member state in conflict with the compact is superseded to the extent of the conflict.
- 4. Any lawful actions of the commission, including all rules and bylaws adopted by the
   commission, are binding on the member states.
- 5. All agreements between the commission and the member states are binding in
   accordance with the terms of the agreement.
