7 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. Sections 1 to 8 of this act shall be known and

- 2 may be cited as the Remedial Adult Education Innovation Act.
- 3 Sec. 2. The Legislature finds that:
- 4 (1) Nebraska faces many challenges in preparing an adult
- 5 workforce in which all individuals possess adequate basic skill
- 6 levels in reading, writing, and mathematics and computer skills;
- 7 (2) Currently many individuals struggle to attain the
- 8 <u>educational credentials and basic skills necessary for self-</u>
- 9 <u>sufficiency;</u>
- 10 <u>(3) The state must develop strategies and opportunities</u>
- 11 to increase the number of individuals who can attain a high school
- 12 diploma or a diploma of high school equivalency and are workforce-
- 13 ready upon receiving such diploma;
- 14 (4) The state must address the need for programs that
- 15 effectively help the increasing number of individuals lacking a high
- 16 <u>school education;</u>
- 17 (5) The state can address these needs by offering
- 18 multiple pathways to a high school diploma or a diploma of high
- 19 school equivalency, providing opportunities to assist more
- 20 <u>individuals in formulating and attaining their goals, and focusing on</u>
- 21 transition services to provide readiness for college and careers; and
- 22 (6) The state must ensure that computerized GED Testing
- 23 <u>Centers are compliant with national standards and responsive and</u>
- 24 accessible to all citizens attempting to earn a diploma of high
- 25 <u>school equivalency.</u>

1 Sec. 3. It is the intent of the Legislature that the

- 2 <u>Remedial Adult Education Innovation Act:</u>
- 3 (1) Create a framework for success in attaining basic
- 4 <u>educational skills;</u>
- 5 (2) Fill in educational gaps for individuals who lack the
- 6 reading, writing, and mathematics skills and the work-readiness
- 7 skills needed by today's workforce;
- 8 (3) Support communities through focused community college
- 9 <u>efforts to assist adults in attaining a high school diploma or a</u>
- 10 <u>diploma of high school equivalency;</u>
- 11 (4) Create new opportunities and multiple pathways to
- 12 <u>allow individuals to secure meaningful employment and become employed</u>
- in industries across the state;
- 14 <u>(5) Effectively prepare the State of Nebraska to provide</u>
- 15 <u>computerized GED Testing Centers by January 2014, increase the</u>
- 16 <u>completion rate of adults seeking to earn a diploma of high school</u>
- 17 equivalency, and increase the number of individuals whose basic
- 18 skills levels make them college-ready and career-ready; and
- 19 (6) Address basic educational skill deficiencies across
- 20 the entire continuum of services from low-level literacy through all
- 21 <u>levels of adult basic education.</u>
- 22 Sec. 4. It is the intent of the Legislature to
- 23 appropriate \$XXX each fiscal year from the Education Innovation Fund
- 24 to the State Department of Education. The department shall use such
- 25 funds to provide reimbursement of expenses to programs which will

1 effectively assist citizens to achieve adequate education levels and

- 2 allow community colleges to carry out the purposes of the Remedial
- 3 Adult Education Innovation Act by increasing the capacity of
- 4 community colleges to deliver high-quality remedial adult education.
- 5 Funding priority shall be given to community college programs that
- 6 include adult education skill building, multiple pathways for
- 7 attainment of a high school diploma or a diploma of high school
- 8 equivalency, occupational training opportunities, and GED testing
- 9 services.
- 10 Sec. 5. The State Department of Education shall adopt and
- 11 promulgate rules and regulations to develop a process for applying
- 12 for, evaluating applications for, and providing reimbursements as
- 13 provided in the Remedial Adult Education Innovation Act. Such rules
- 14 and regulations shall include, but not be limited to, provisions that
- 15 <u>institutions requesting reimbursement of expenses shall maintain GED</u>
- 16 training and testing programs that:
- 17 (1) Provide for successful implementation by January 2014
- 18 of computerized GED Testing Centers which comply with GED Testing
- 19 Service standards and provide open access to individuals across the
- 20 state;
- 21 (2) Lead to the attainment of a high school diploma or a
- 22 diploma of high school equivalency for participants; and
- 23 (3) Provide for both academic and support services needed
- 24 for participants' educational and employment success.
- 25 Sec. 6. <u>Each program receiving reimbursement pursuant to</u>

1 the Remedial Adult Education Innovation Act shall report annually to

- 2 the department. The report shall give a description of the operation
- 3 of the program for which reimbursement funds were provided and shall
- 4 <u>include information on the following:</u>
- 5 (1) The number of high school diplomas or diplomas of
- 6 high school equivalency awarded pursuant to such program in the
- 7 preceding twelve months;
- 8 (2) The number of participants in the program who moved
- 9 successfully through the continuum of literacy skill levels offered
- 10 by the program;
- 11 (3) The number of participants completing the program who
- 12 <u>secured entry-level career path employment in the preceding twelve</u>
- 13 months; and
- 14 (4) The number of participants completing the program who
- 15 went on to postsecondary education or additional career training
- 16 <u>during the preceding twelve months.</u>
- 17 Sec. 7. (1) Each institution that provides GED training
- 18 and testing shall receive a designated amount from the State
- 19 Department of Education for each participant enrolled in its GED
- 20 program as follows:
- 21 (a) Each such institution shall receive one reimbursement
- 22 payment for each student who enrolls in its GED program;
- 23 (b) Each such institution shall receive one reimbursement
- 24 payment for each enrolled student upon the student's initial
- 25 <u>examination for a GED; and</u>

1 (c) Each institution shall receive one reimbursement

- 2 payment for each walk-in GED student not in the program who takes the
- 3 <u>GED examination</u>.
- 4 (2) An institution shall receive no additional
- 5 reimbursement for any student who fails his or her first GED
- 6 <u>examination and requires additional training and testing.</u>
- 7 Sec. 8. <u>Each institution that provides GED training and</u>
- 8 testing shall be eligible to receive a one-time payment in state
- 9 matching funds for acquisition and upgrade of computerized GED
- 10 Testing Center equipment and software, for each computerized GED
- 11 <u>Testing Center operated by such institution, in order to come into</u>
- 12 compliance with national standards which take effect in 2014.
- 13 Sec. 9. Section 9-812, Reissue Revised Statutes of
- 14 Nebraska, is amended to read:
- 9-812 (1) All money received from the operation of
- 16 lottery games conducted pursuant to the State Lottery Act in Nebraska
- 17 shall be credited to the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund, which
- 18 fund is hereby created. All payments of the costs of establishing and
- 19 maintaining the lottery games shall be made from the State Lottery
- 20 Operation Cash Fund. In accordance with legislative appropriations,
- 21 money for payments for expenses of the division shall be transferred
- 22 from the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the State Lottery
- 23 Operation Cash Fund, which fund is hereby created. All money
- 24 necessary for the payment of lottery prizes shall be transferred from
- 25 the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the State Lottery Prize

1 Trust Fund, which fund is hereby created. The amount used for the

- 2 payment of lottery prizes shall not be less than forty percent of the
- 3 dollar amount of the lottery tickets which have been sold.
- 4 (2) Beginning October 1, 2003, a portion of the dollar
- 5 amount of the lottery tickets which have been sold on an annualized
- 6 basis shall be transferred from the State Lottery Operation Trust
- 7 Fund to the Education Innovation Fund, the Nebraska Opportunity Grant
- 8 Fund, the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, the Nebraska State Fair
- 9 Board, and the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund. The dollar amount
- 10 transferred pursuant to this subsection shall equal the greater of
- 11 (a) the dollar amount transferred to the funds in fiscal year 2002-03
- 12 or (b) any amount which constitutes at least twenty-two percent and
- 13 no more than twenty-five percent of the dollar amount of the lottery
- 14 tickets which have been sold on an annualized basis. To the extent
- 15 that funds are available, the Tax Commissioner and director may
- 16 authorize a transfer exceeding twenty-five percent of the dollar
- 17 amount of the lottery tickets sold on an annualized basis.
- 18 (3) Of the money available to be transferred to the
- 19 Education Innovation Fund, the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund, the
- 20 Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, the Nebraska State Fair Board, and
- 21 the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund:
- 22 (a) The first five hundred thousand dollars shall be
- 23 transferred to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund to be used as
- 24 provided in section 71-817;
- 25 (b) Nineteen and three-fourths percent of the money

1 remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses and the

- 2 initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be
- 3 transferred to the Education Innovation Fund;
- 4 (c) Twenty-four and three-fourths percent of the money
- 5 remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses and the
- 6 initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be
- 7 transferred to the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund;
- 8 (d) Forty-four and one-half percent of the money
- 9 remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses and the
- 10 initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be
- 11 transferred to the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund to be used as
- 12 provided in the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act;
- (e) Ten percent of the money remaining after the payment
- 14 of prizes and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the
- 15 Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the
- 16 Nebraska State Fair Board if the most populous city within the county
- 17 in which the fair is located provides matching funds equivalent to
- 18 ten percent of the funds available for transfer. Such matching funds
- 19 may be obtained from the city and any other private or public entity,
- 20 except that no portion of such matching funds shall be provided by
- 21 the state. If the Nebraska State Fair ceases operations, ten percent
- 22 of the money remaining after the payment of prizes and operating
- 23 expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers
- 24 Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the General Fund; and
- 25 (f) One percent of the money remaining after the payment

1 of prizes and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the

- 2 Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the
- 3 Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund to be used as provided in section
- 4 71-817.
- 5 (4)(a) The Education Innovation Fund is created. At least
- 6 seventy-five percent of the lottery proceeds allocated to the
- 7 Education Innovation Fund shall be available for disbursement.
- 8 (b) For fiscal year 2010-11, the Education Innovation
- 9 Fund shall be allocated as follows: The first one million dollars
- 10 shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund
- 11 the Excellence in Teaching Act, and the amount remaining in the
- 12 Education Innovation Fund shall be allocated, after administrative
- 13 expenses, for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to
- 14 sections 79-1336 and 79-1337.
- 15 (c) For fiscal year 2011-12, the Education Innovation
- 16 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first two hundred twenty-
- 17 five thousand dollars shall be transferred to the Excellence in
- 18 Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Attracting Excellence to Teaching
- 19 Program; (ii) the next three million three hundred sixty-five
- 20 thousand nine hundred sixty-two dollars shall be distributed to
- 21 school districts as grants pursuant to the Early Childhood Education
- 22 Grant Program; (iii) the next two million one hundred seventy-five
- 23 thousand six hundred seventy-three dollars shall be distributed to
- 24 local systems as grants for approved accelerated or differentiated
- 25 curriculum programs for students identified as learners with high

ability pursuant to section 79-1108.02; (iv) the next four hundred 1 2 ninety-one thousand five hundred forty-one dollars shall be used by 3 the State Department of Education for the development of 4 integrated early childhood, elementary, secondary, and postsecondary 5 student information system; (v) the next four hundred fifty thousand 6 dollars shall fund the Center for Student Leadership and Extended 7 Learning Act; (vi) the next one hundred fourteen thousand six hundred 8 twenty-nine dollars shall fund the multicultural education program 9 created under section 79-720; (vii) the next one hundred twenty-three thousand four hundred sixty-eight dollars shall be used by the 10 department to employ persons to investigate and prosecute alleged 11 12 violations as provided in section 79-868; (viii) up to the next one 13 hundred sixty thousand dollars shall be used by the department to 14 implement section 79-759; and (ix) the amount remaining shall be 15 allocated, after administrative expenses, for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. 16 17 (d) For fiscal year 2012-13, the Education Innovation Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first forty-five thousand 18 19 dollars shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund 20 to fund the Attracting Excellence to Teaching Program; (ii) the next three million three hundred sixty-five thousand nine hundred sixty-21 two dollars shall be distributed to school districts as grants 22 23 pursuant to the Early Childhood Education Grant Program; (iii) the next two million one hundred seventy-five thousand six hundred 24 25 seventy-three dollars shall be distributed to local systems as grants

for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs for 1 students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to section 2 3 79-1108.02; (iv) the next one hundred eight thousand one hundred 4 thirty-six dollars shall be used by the department for 5 development of an integrated early childhood, elementary, secondary, and postsecondary student information system; (v) the next four 6 7 hundred fifty thousand dollars shall fund the Center for Student 8 Leadership and Extended Learning Act; (vi) the next one hundred 9 fourteen thousand six hundred twenty-nine dollars shall be used by the department to fund the multicultural education program created 10 11 under section 79-720; (vii) the next one hundred twenty-three 12 thousand four hundred sixty-eight dollars shall be used by the 13 department to employ persons to investigate and prosecute alleged violations as provided in section 79-868; (viii) up to the next one 14 15 hundred sixty thousand dollars shall be used by the department to implement section 79-759; (ix) the next twenty-seven thousand two 16 17 hundred dollars shall be used to fund the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children; (x) the next two 18 19 hundred thousand dollars shall be used to provide grants to establish 20 bridge programs pursuant to sections 79-1189 to 79-1195; and (xi) the amount remaining shall be allocated, after administrative expenses, 21 22 for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 23 79-1336 and 79-1337. (e) For fiscal year 2013-14, the Education Innovation 24 25 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars

shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund 1 2 the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) the next allocation shall be 3 distributed to local systems as grants for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs 4 for students identified 5 learners with high ability pursuant to section 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal 6 7 year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate 8 pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) the next allocation shall be used by the State Department of Education for the integrated early 9 10 childhood, elementary, secondary, and postsecondary information system in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in 11 12 the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic 13 allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iv) the next 14 allocation shall fund the Center for Student Leadership and Extended 15 Learning Act in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the 16 prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (v) the next allocation 17 18 shall be used by the department to fund the multicultural education program created under section 79-720 in an aggregated amount up to 19 20 the amount used in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased 21 by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (vi) 22 the next allocation shall be used by the department to employ persons 23 to investigate and prosecute alleged violations as provided in 24 section 79-868 in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the 25 prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable

growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (vii) up to the next one 1 2 hundred sixty thousand dollars shall be used by the department to implement section 79-759; (viii) the next two hundred thousand 3 dollars shall be used to provide grants to establish bridge programs 4 5 pursuant to sections 79-1189 to 79-1195; and—(ix) the next XXX 6 dollars shall be used to reimburse expenses pursuant to the Remedial 7 Adult Education Innovation Act; and (x) the amount remaining shall be 8 allocated, after administrative expenses, for distance education 9 equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. (f) For fiscal year 2014-15, the Education Innovation 10 11 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars 12 shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund 13 the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) the next allocation shall be 14 distributed to local systems as grants for approved accelerated or 15 differentiated curriculum programs for students identified 16 learners with high ability pursuant to section 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal 17 year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate 18 pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) the next allocation shall be used 19 20 by the State Department of Education for the integrated early 21 childhood, elementary, secondary, and postsecondary student 22 information system in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in 23 the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iv) the next 24 25 allocation shall fund the Center for Student Leadership and Extended

Learning Act in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the 1 2 prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (v) the next allocation 3 4 shall be used by the department to fund the multicultural education 5 program created under section 79-720 in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased 6 7 by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (vi) 8 the next allocation shall be used by the department to employ persons 9 to investigate and prosecute alleged violations as provided in 10 section 79-868 in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable 11 12 growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (vii) the next two hundred 13 thousand dollars shall be used to provide grants to establish bridge 14 programs pursuant to sections 79-1189 to 79-1195; and (viii) the next 15 XXX dollars shall be used to reimburse institutions pursuant to the 16 Remedial Adult Education Innovation Act; and (ix) the amount remaining shall be allocated, after administrative expenses, for 17 distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 18 79-1336 and 79-1337. 19 20 (g) For fiscal year 2015-16, the Education Innovation Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars 21 shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund 22 23 the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) the next allocation shall be distributed to local systems as grants for approved accelerated or 24 25 differentiated curriculum programs for students identified

learners with high ability pursuant to section 79-1108.02 in an 1 2 aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal 3 year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) the next allocation shall be used 4 5 by the State Department of Education for the integrated early 6 elementary, secondary, and postsecondary childhood, 7 information system in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in 8 the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iv) the next 9 allocation shall fund the Center for Student Leadership and Extended 10 Learning Act in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the 11 12 prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable 13 growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (v) the next allocation 14 shall be used by the department to fund the multicultural education program created under section 79-720 in an aggregated amount up to 15 the amount used in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased 16 by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (vi) 17 18 the next allocation shall be used by the department to employ persons 19 to investigate and prosecute alleged violations as provided in 20 section 79-868 in an aggregated amount up to the amount used in the 21 prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; and (vii) the next XXX 22 23 dollars shall be used to reimburse institutions pursuant to the Remedial Adult Education Innovation Act; and (viii) the amount 24 remaining shall be allocated, after administrative expenses, for 25

1 distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections

- 2 79-1336 and 79-1337.
- 3 (h) For fiscal year 2016-17 and each fiscal year
- 4 thereafter, the Education Innovation Fund shall be allocated, after
- 5 administrative expenses, for education purposes as provided by the
- 6 Legislature.
- 7 (5) Any money in the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund,
- 8 the State Lottery Operation Cash Fund, the State Lottery Prize Trust
- 9 Fund, or the Education Innovation Fund available for investment shall
- 10 be invested by the state investment officer pursuant to the Nebraska
- 11 Capital Expansion Act and the Nebraska State Funds Investment Act.
- 12 (6) Unclaimed prize money on a winning lottery ticket
- 13 shall be retained for a period of time prescribed by rules and
- 14 regulations. If no claim is made within such period, the prize money
- 15 shall be used at the discretion of the Tax Commissioner for any of
- 16 the purposes prescribed in this section.
- 17 Sec. 10. Original section 9-812, Reissue Revised Statutes
- 18 of Nebraska, is repealed.
- 19 Sec. 11. Since an emergency exists, this act takes effect
- 20 when passed and approved according to law.
