# A BILL

- 1 FOR AN ACT relating to education; to adopt the Twenty-First Century
- 2 Developmental Education Act.
- 3 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as

- 2 the Twenty-First Century Developmental Education Act.
- 3 Sec. 2. The Legislature finds that:
- 4 (1) Nebraska faces many challenges in preparing a
- 5 workforce where all individuals possess adequate basic skills in
- 6 reading, writing, mathematics, science, and computer technology;
- 7 (2) Currently many individuals struggle in school and the
- 8 workplace because they do not possess the basic skills necessary to
- 9 get a job or enroll in occupational training programs that allow them
- 10 to earn a self-sustaining wage;
- 11 (3) School systems offering instruction in grades
- 12 <u>kindergarten through twelve are seeing many of their students drop</u>
- 13 <u>out of school before earning a high school diploma;</u>
- 14 (4) Many of the state's four-year colleges and
- 15 <u>universities are advising students whose basic skills are below</u>
- 16 <u>college level to enroll in developmental education classes at</u>
- 17 community colleges, since four-year colleges and universities offer
- 18 few, if any, developmental education services;
- 19 (5) The state must develop strategies and practices to
- 20 increase the number of individuals who attain the necessary basic
- 21 skills to enable them to enroll in college-level occupational
- 22 <u>training programs;</u>
- 23 (6) Building capacity to address these needs includes
- 24 offering multiple options and services to effectively support
- 25 <u>students seeking to enter college-level occupational training;</u>

(7) A developmental education initiative at the community 1 2 college level will have far-reaching effects that will effectively prepare individuals in the State of Nebraska to train for and be 3 4 hired for jobs at the forefront of today's economy; 5 (8) Such an initiative will build a stronger framework to 6 address basic skills deficiencies across the entire spectrum of 7 services from elementary, middle school, and high school education, 8 adult education, developmental education, community colleges, and 9 four-year colleges and universities; and 10 (9) Such an initiative will offer multiple options in 11 terms of class offerings and support services for individuals 12 entering postsecondary education without college level basic skills. 13 Sec. 3. It is the intent of the Legislature to: (1) Bolster the community colleges' ability to lead 14 statewide efforts to provide Nebraska residents with the basic 15 16 reading, writing, mathematics, science, and computer technology skills needed to enroll and succeed in college-level occupational 17 training opportunities; and 18 (2) Provide funds for community college programs that 19 20 offer a continuum of services, including adult education and 21 developmental education services, occupational training, industry 22 credentialing, degrees at the certificate and associate levels, and

transfer options to four-year colleges and universities.

Initiative is created. The purposes of the initiative are to:

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(1) Create effective developmental education systems

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employment opportunities;

2 focusing on student success; 3 (2) Fill in educational gaps for individuals lacking 4 reading, writing, mathematics, science, and computer skills needed by 5 today's workforce; 6 (3) Support communities through focused community college 7 efforts to strengthen developmental education course offerings and 8 services to assist students to enter and be successful in college-9 <u>level occupational training; and</u> 10 (4) Create new opportunities and options to encourage and support individuals in their pursuit to attain adequate basic skills 11 12 and move into meaningful career pathway training and employment. 13 Sec. 5. The Twenty-First Century Developmental Education 14 Initiative shall: 15 (1) Provide an efficient array of developmental education 16 offerings and services to ensure that individuals have the reading, writing, mathematics, science, and computer technology skills to gain 17

(2) Strengthen and better organize the continuum of basic skills offerings by closely aligning adult education course objectives, outcomes, and instruction with developmental education course objectives, outcomes, and instruction in order to help students move more rapidly through basic skills development and allow students to pass over some developmental courses otherwise required;

1	(3) Expand the use of contextualized curriculum and
2	career pathways training to allow more students to enroll
3	simultaneously in developmental education courses and occupational
4	skills courses, leading to increased student success and retention;
5	(4) Offer students more options in terms of the methods
6	for acquiring basic skills, including, but not limited to,
7	traditional, modular, online, and hybrid methods; and
8	(5) Utilize academic and support services to provide
9	students with multiple avenues of support in traditional, modular,
10	online, and hybrid developmental courses, linking services so staff
11	and faculty can provide a comprehensive range of instructional and
12	support services and maintain a team approach to service delivery.
13	Sec. 6. The Twenty-First Century Developmental Education
14	Initiative shall be developed by the community colleges, in
15	coordination with the Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary
16	Education. The initiative shall include, but not be limited to:
17	(1) An efficient system offering a coordinated continuum
18	of basic skills education in reading, writing, mathematics, science,
19	and computer technology;
20	(2) Coordinated curriculum and outcomes, laddering
21	instruction to result in student attainment of college-level basic
22	skills that allow individuals to successfully enter college-level
23	occupational training or the workforce;
24	(3) Contextualized curriculum that allows students to see
25	relevance of basic skills proficiency within their chosen career

- 2 (4) Effective student support services that encourage
- 3 <u>retention and success.</u>
- 4 Sec. 7. The Twenty-First Century Developmental Education
- 5 Initiative shall develop methods of analyzing and reporting data to
- 6 determine the following with respect to students served by the
- 7 <u>initiative:</u>
- 8 (1) Attainment of college-level skills in reading,
- 9 writing, mathematics, science, and computer technology;
- 10 (2) Successful transition into college-level occupational
- 11 <u>training;</u>
- 12 <u>(3) Successful completion of college-level coursework</u>
- 13 other than occupational training; and
- 14 (4) Successfully securing entry-level career path
- 15 <u>employment</u>.
- 16 Sec. 8. It is the intent of the Legislature to
- 17 appropriate xxx from the General Fund per fiscal year to the State
- 18 Department of Education to pay community colleges for tuition for up
- 19 to thirty semester credit hours or forty-five quarter credit hours of
- 20 developmental education for Nebraska residents who are sixteen years
- 21 of age or older and test below college level on the ACT Compass
- 22 college-placement test to carry out the Twenty-First Century
- 23 <u>Developmental Education Act. The department shall by rule and</u>
- 24 regulation develop a process for applying for and evaluating
- 25 <u>applications for such payments.</u>
