16	SECTION 1. Section 22-2E-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2011,
17	Chapter 10, Section 4, as amended) is amended to read:

22	A. All public schools shall be graded annually by
23	the department.
24	B. Except as otherwise provided in this section,
25	the department shall assign a letter grade of A, B, C, D or F

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1 to each public school pursuant to criteria established by 2 department rules, after input from the secretary's superintendents' council, that include as a minimum a 3 combination of the following factors in a public school's 4 5 grade: for elementary and middle schools: 6 (1)7 (a) student proficiency, including achievement on the New Mexico standards-based assessments; 8 9 (b) student growth in reading and mathematics; [and] 10 (c) growth of the lowest twenty-fifth 11 12 percentile of students in the public school in reading and mathematics; and 13 (d) student unexcused absences; and 14 for high schools: (2) 15 (a) student proficiency, including 16 achievement on the New Mexico standards-based assessments; 17 student growth in reading and (b) 18 19 mathematics; 20 (c) growth of the lowest twenty-fifth percentile of students in the high school in reading and 21 mathematics; [and] 22 (d) additional academic indicators such 23 as high school graduation rates, growth in high school 24 graduation rates, advanced placement and international 25 .205784.1 - 2 -

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baccalaureate courses, dual enrollment courses and SAT and ACT
 scores; and

(e) student unexcused absences.

C. The New Mexico standards-based assessments used
for rating a <u>public</u> school are those administered annually to
students in grades three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine
and eleven pursuant to Section 22-2C-4 NMSA 1978.

D. A public school that actively enforces the provisions of the Compulsory School Attendance Law within the limits of its resources shall not be graded on the results of standards-based assessments of students who had eight or more unexcused absences in the school year.

 $[\underline{\vartheta},\underline{\cdot}]$ <u>E</u>. In addition to any rights a parent may have pursuant to federal law, the parent of a student enrolled in a public school rated F for two of the last four years has the right to transfer the student in the same grade to any public school in the state not rated F or the right to have the student continue schooling by means of distance learning offered through the statewide or a local cyber academy. The school district or charter school in which the student is enrolled is responsible for the cost of distance learning.

 $[E_{-}]$ <u>F</u>. The department shall ensure that a local school board or, for a charter school, the governing body of the charter school is prioritizing resources of a public school rated D or F toward proven programs and methods linked to .205784.1

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1 improved student achievement until the public school earns a 2 grade of C or better for two consecutive years. $[F_{\cdot}]$ <u>G.</u> The school options available pursuant to 3 the A-B-C-D-F Schools Rating Act are in addition to any 4 remedies provided for in the Assessment and Accountability Act 5 for students in schools in need of improvement or any other 6 7 interventions prescribed by the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. 8 9 [G.] H. When reporting a school's grade, the department shall include student data disaggregated by 10 ethnicity, race, limited English proficiency, students with 11 12 disabilities, poverty and gender; provided that ethnicity and race shall be reported using the following categories: 13 14 (1) Caucasian, non-Hispanic; Hispanic; (2) 15 African American: (3) 16 (4) American Indian or Alaska Native; 17 18 (5) Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander; 19 (6) Asian; 20 (7) two or more races; and other; provided that if the sample of (8) 21 students in any category enumerated in Paragraphs (1) through 22 (7) of this subsection is so small that a student in the sample 23 may be personally identifiable in violation of the federal 24 Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the report 25 .205784.1
