12	THE PER DIEM AND MILEAGE ACT; CHANGING THE RATES OF PER DIEM
13	REIMBURSEMENT FOR IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL FOR CERTAIN
14	PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES.
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16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
17	SECTION 1. Section 10-8-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1971,
18	Chapter 116, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:

21	A. "attend" means the act of being present, either
22	physically or through a virtual platform that is approved by
23	the entity responsible for determining attendance;
24	$[A_{\bullet}]$ <u>B.</u> "secretary" means the secretary of finance
25	and administration;
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1 [B.] C. "employee" means any person who is in the 2 employ of any state agency, local public body or public post-3 secondary educational institution and whose salary is paid 4 either completely or in part from public money, but does not 5 include jurors or jury commissioners; [C.] D. "governing board" means the board of 6 7 regents of any institution designated in Article 12, Section 11 8 of the constitution of New Mexico or designated in Chapter 21, 9 Article 14 NMSA 1978, or the board of any institution 10 designated in Chapter 21, Articles 13, 16 and 17 NMSA 1978; 11 [D.] E. "local public body" means all political 12 subdivisions of the state and their agencies, instrumentalities 13 and institutions, except public post-secondary educational 14 institutions; 15  $[\underline{E_{\cdot}}]$  <u>F</u>. "state agency" means the state or any of 16 its branches, agencies, departments, boards, instrumentalities 17 or institutions, except public post-secondary educational 18 institutions: 19 [F.] G. "public post-secondary educational 20 institution" means any institution designated in Article 12, 21 Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico and any 22 institution designated in Chapter 21, Articles 13, 14, 16 and 23 17 NMSA 1978; and 24 [G.] H. "public officer" or "public official" means 25 every elected or appointed officer of the state, local public

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1 body or any public post-secondary educational institution. 2 "Public officer" or "public official" includes members of 3 advisory boards appointed by any state agency, local public 4 body or public post-secondary educational institution." Section 10-8-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1963, 5 SECTION 2. Chapter 31, Section 3, as amended) is amended to read: 6 7 "10-8-4. PER DIEM AND MILEAGE RATES--IN LIEU OF 8 PAYMENT. --9 Α. Notwithstanding any other specific law to the 10 contrary and except as provided in Subsection I of this 11 section, every nonsalaried public officer shall receive either 12 reimbursement pursuant to the provisions of Subsection K or L 13 of this section or [up to ninety-five dollars (\$95.00)] per 14 diem expenses [(1)] in the following amounts for [each] a board 15 or committee meeting attended; provided that the officer shall 16 not receive per diem expenses for more than one board or committee meeting that occurs on the same day; or [(2)] for 17 18 each day spent in discharge of official duties for travel 19 within the state but away from the officer's home: 20 [Nonsalaried public officers who travel to attend a board 21 or committee meeting may elect to be reimbursed per diem under 22 either Paragraph (1) or (2) of this subsection] 23 (1) forty-five dollars (\$45.00) if the officer 24 physically attends the board or committee meeting for less than 25 four hours or the officer attends a virtual meeting of any .218490.3SA

Every salaried public officer or employee who is 5 traveling within the state but away from the officer's or 6 7 employee's home and designated post of duty on official 8 business shall receive either reimbursement pursuant to the 9 provisions of Subsection K or L of this section or 10 [(1) up to eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) per 11 diem expenses for each day spent in the discharge of official 12 duties for a salaried public officer or employee of a local 13 public body or state agency. If the secretary finds that a per 14 diem allowance of eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) is inadequate 15 for reimbursement of expenses in any municipality of this 16 state, the secretary may authorize the reimbursement of per 17 diem for travel to the municipality not to exceed one hundred 18 thirty-five dollars (\$135); or 19 (2) up to eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) per 20 diem expenses for each day spent in the discharge of official 21 duties for a salaried public officer or employee of a public 22 post-secondary educational institution. If the governing board 23 finds that a per diem allowance of eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) 24 is inadequate for reimbursement of expenses in any municipality 25 of this state, the governing board may authorize the

12	rates available for lodging, meals and incidentals as
13	determined by the United States general services administration
14	for that period of time. For a salaried public officer or
15	employee of a local public body or state agency, expenses shall
16	be substantiated in accordance with rules promulgated by the
17	secretary of finance and administration, and the secretary may
18	promulgate rules defining what constitutes out-of-state travel
19	for the purposes of the Per Diem and Mileage Act. For a public
20	officer or employee of a public post-secondary educational
21	institution, expenses shall be substantiated in accordance with
22	rules promulgated by the governing board of that public post-
23	secondary educational institution, and the governing board may
24	promulgate rules defining what constitutes out-of-state travel
25	for the purposes of the Per Diem and Mileage Act.

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1 D. Every public officer or employee shall receive 2 up to the internal revenue service standard mileage rate set 3 January 1 of the previous year for each mile traveled in a privately owned vehicle or eighty-eight cents (\$.88) a mile for 4 5 each mile traveled in a privately owned airplane if the travel 6 is necessary to the discharge of the officer's or employee's 7 official duties and if the private conveyance is not a common 8 carrier; provided, however, that only one person shall receive 9 mileage for each mile traveled in a single privately owned 10 vehicle or airplane, except in the case of common carriers, in 11 which case the person shall receive the cost of the ticket in 12 lieu of the mileage allowance.

E. The per diem and mileage or per diem and cost of tickets for common carriers paid to salaried public officers or employees is in lieu of actual expenses for transportation, lodging and subsistence.

F. In addition to the in-state per diem set forth in this section, the department of finance and administration, by rule, may authorize a flat subsistence rate in the amount set by the legislature in the general appropriation act for commissioned officers of the New Mexico state police in accordance with rules promulgated by the department of finance and administration.

G. In lieu of the in-state per diem set in Subsection B of this section, the department of finance and .218490.3SA

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administration may, by rule, authorize a flat monthly subsistence rate for certain employees of the department of transportation, provided that the payments made under this subsection shall not exceed the maximum amount that would be paid under Subsection B of this section.

H. Per diem received by nonsalaried public officers for travel on official business or in the discharge of their official duties, other than attending a board or committee meeting, and per diem received by public officers and employees for travel on official business shall be prorated in accordance with rules of the department of finance and administration or the governing board.

I. The provisions of Subsection A of this section do not apply to payment of per diem expense to a nonsalaried public official of a municipality for attendance at board or committee meetings held within the boundaries of the municipality.

J. In addition to any other penalties prescribed by law for false swearing on an official voucher, it shall be cause for removal or dismissal from office.

K. With prior written approval of the secretary or the secretary's designee or the local public body, a nonsalaried public officer of a state agency or local public body, a salaried public officer of a state agency or local public body or a salaried employee of a state agency or local .218490.3SA
