

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 149—ASSEMBLYWOMEN BRITTNEY MILLER  
AND ANDERSON

FEBRUARY 13, 2023

Referred to Committee on Education

SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to education.  
(BDR 34-76)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.  
Effect on the State: Yes.

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; creating the Office of the Inspector General of Education and the position of Inspector General of Education; setting forth the powers and duties of the Inspector General and employees of the Office; requiring certain persons and governmental entities to cooperate with and provide assistance to the Inspector General in carrying out those duties; prohibiting retaliation against certain persons who make a lawful complaint concerning fraud, waste, abuse or corruption within a person or governmental entity that receives public money related to education; prohibiting certain acts to deter or prevent the Inspector General or an employee of the Office from performing his or her duty; imposing increased penalties for certain acts of assault or battery on the Inspector General or an employee of the Office; providing penalties; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel’s Digest:**

1 Existing law creates the Division of Internal Audits of the Office of Finance  
2 within the Office of the Governor, which has various authority and duties related to  
3 performing audits of state agencies and investigating reports relating to abuse, fraud  
4 or waste with respect to public money received and used by certain agencies and  
5 contractors. (NRS 223.400, 353A.045-353A.100) This bill creates the Office of the  
6 Inspector General of Education as an independent agency with authority to audit,  
7 investigate and review the performance of any person or governmental entity that  
8 receives public money related to education.



9       **Sections 2-9 and 31** of this bill define terms related to the Office of the  
10 Inspector General of Education. **Section 10** of this bill creates the Office of the  
11 Inspector General of Education, consisting of the Inspector General of Education  
12 and any person employed by the Office. **Section 10** also requires the Governor to  
13 appoint the Inspector General for a term of 4 years from a list of candidates  
14 submitted by the Legislative Commission and sets forth the qualifications required  
15 for appointment. **Section 11** of this bill requires the Inspector General to administer  
16 provisions of law governing the Office. **Section 12** of this bill: (1) requires the  
17 Inspector General to appoint a deputy inspector general and a special counsel, who  
18 are in the unclassified service of the State; and (2) authorizes the Inspector General,  
19 within the limits of available money, to employ such persons in the classified  
20 service of the State as he or she deems necessary to provide an appropriate staff for  
21 the Office and to enter into contracts with certain professionals for professional  
22 services related to the functions of the Office.

23       **Section 13** of this bill sets forth certain responsibilities and duties of the  
24 Inspector General, including: (1) establishing and maintaining a full-time program  
25 of auditing, investigation, inspection and performance review of each person or  
26 governmental entity that receives public money related to education; and (2)  
27 submitting a report to the Governor and the Director of the Legislative Counsel  
28 Bureau, on at least a quarterly basis or at the Governor's request, setting forth any  
29 findings, conclusions or recommendations relating to an audit, investigation,  
30 inspection or review conducted by the Inspector General.

31       **Section 14** of this bill requires the Inspector General to establish a toll-free  
32 telephone number to receive information relating to abuse, fraud and waste with  
33 respect to the use of public money related to education. **Section 15** of this bill: (1)  
34 requires each person or governmental entity that receives public money related to  
35 education, upon request of the Inspector General, to cooperate with and provide  
36 assistance to the Inspector General in carrying out his or her duties; and (2) makes  
37 any person who willfully prevents, impairs or prohibits the performance of the  
38 duties of the Inspector General guilty of a category E felony. **Section 16** of this bill  
39 authorizes the Inspector General to issue subpoenas.

40       **Sections 14, 17 and 29** of this bill provide for the confidentiality of: (1) any  
41 record maintained by the Inspector General during an investigation; and (2) the  
42 identity of any whistleblower. Otherwise, **section 17** requires a report of the  
43 Inspector General to be made available to the public annually. **Section 18** of this  
44 bill requires the Legislative Auditor to review at least once every 3 years a  
45 representative sample of the audits, investigations, inspections and reviews  
46 conducted by the Office of the Inspector General of Education to ensure  
47 conformance with professional standards. **Section 19** of this bill creates the Fund  
48 for the Office of the Inspector General of Education as a special revenue fund  
49 without reversion to the State General Fund.

50       **Section 20** of this bill makes it a category E felony to retaliate against certain  
51 persons who file a lawful complaint concerning fraud, waste, abuse or corruption  
52 within any person or governmental entity that receives public money related to  
53 education.

54       **Sections 21-24** of this bill require certain state agencies and local governments  
55 to provide the Inspector General of Education with certain financial reports.

56       **Section 25** of this bill allows a parent or legal guardian of a pupil enrolled in a  
57 charter school, a pupil who is at least 18 years of age enrolled in a charter school, a  
58 member of the governing body of a charter school or an employee of a charter  
59 school to file a complaint relating to that charter school directly with the Inspector  
60 General if the complaint relates to allegations of fraud, financial mismanagement or  
61 financial malfeasance.

62       Existing law provides that a person commits a gross misdemeanor if he or she  
63 uses any threat, force or violence to prevent an executive or administrative officer



64 from performing his or her duties. (NRS 197.090) **Section 26** of this bill makes it a  
65 category E felony for a person to use any threat, force or violence to prevent the  
66 Inspector General or any employee of the Office from performing his or her duties.

67 **Sections 27 and 28** of this bill provide that the increased penalty for assault or  
68 battery of an officer applies to an assault or battery of the Inspector General or an  
69 employee of the Office. (NRS 200.471, 200.481)

70 **Section 30** of this bill makes the Inspector General and investigators employed  
71 by the Office category II peace officers.

72 Existing law requires the head of each state agency to periodically review and  
73 report to the Director of the Office of Finance whether the agency's system of  
74 internal accounting and administrative control is in compliance with the uniform  
75 system of internal accounting and administrative control adopted by the Director  
76 for state agencies. Existing law further requires the Director to submit a report on  
77 the status of internal accounting and administrative controls in state agencies to  
78 certain persons. (NRS 353A.020) **Section 32** of this bill requires the Director to  
79 provide certain reports to the Inspector General.

80 **Section 33** of this bill requires the Governor to appoint the Inspector General of  
81 Education on or before December 1, 2023.

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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** Title 34 of NRS is hereby amended by adding  
2 thereto a new chapter to consist of the provisions set forth as  
3 sections 2 to 20, inclusive, of this act.

4 **Sec. 2.** *As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise*  
5 *requires, the words and terms defined in sections 3 to 9, inclusive,*  
6 *of this act have the meanings ascribed to them in those sections.*

7 **Sec. 3.** *Except as otherwise provided in this section,*  
8 *“governmental entity” means any agency, institution, board,*  
9 *commission, bureau, council, department, division, authority or*  
10 *other unit of government of this State or a local government. The*  
11 *term does not include the Nevada System of Higher Education.*

12 **Sec. 4.** *“Inspector General” means the Inspector General of*  
13 *Education appointed pursuant to section 10 of this act.*

14 **Sec. 5.** *“Local government” means every political*  
15 *subdivision and other local governmental entity in this State.*

16 **Sec. 6.** *“Office” means the Office of the Inspector General of*  
17 *Education created by section 10 of this act.*

18 **Sec. 7.** *“Person or governmental entity that receives public*  
19 *money related to education” includes, without limitation, any*  
20 *contractor, subcontractor or other third party who receives from a*  
21 *person or governmental entity public money for a purpose related*  
22 *to education in this State.*

23 **Sec. 8.** *“Public money related to education” includes any*  
24 *money received from the Federal Government or a governmental*



1 *entity that must be used by the recipient for some purpose related*  
2 *to education in this State.*

3 **Sec. 9.** *“Waste” means the squandering of money or*  
4 *resources, whether or not the activity is unlawful.*

5 **Sec. 10.** *1. The Office of the Inspector General of*  
6 *Education is hereby created. The Office of the Inspector General*  
7 *of Education consists of the Inspector General of Education*  
8 *appointed pursuant to subsection 2 and any person employed by*  
9 *the Office.*

10 *2. The Governor shall appoint the Inspector General of*  
11 *Education for a term of 4 years, and until a successor is appointed*  
12 *and qualified, from a list of three candidates submitted by the*  
13 *Legislative Commission. The Inspector General may be*  
14 *reappointed, and the Legislative Commission shall include the*  
15 *incumbent Inspector General on its list of candidates, unless the*  
16 *Legislative Commission determines that the incumbent should not*  
17 *be recommended for reappointment for cause, including, without*  
18 *limitation, inefficiency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. A*  
19 *vacancy in the position must be filled in the same manner as the*  
20 *original appointment.*

21 *3. The Inspector General may be removed from office only by*  
22 *impeachment for misdemeanor or malfeasance in office. The*  
23 *Inspector General shall be deemed to be a state officer for the*  
24 *purposes of NRS 283.140 to 283.290, inclusive.*

25 *4. The Inspector General must have the demonstrated ability*  
26 *to administer a major governmental agency in the field of*  
27 *auditing, investigations or inspections or performance reviews of*  
28 *governmental programs and agencies, including, without*  
29 *limitation:*

30 *(a) Experience in accounting, auditing, financial analysis,*  
31 *law, management analysis, public administration, investigation,*  
32 *criminal justice administration or any other closely related field;*

33 *(b) Certification as a Certified Fraud Examiner by the*  
34 *Association of Certified Fraud Examiners, Inc., or its successor*  
35 *organization, and as a Certified Inspector General by the*  
36 *Association of Inspectors General, or its successor organization,*  
37 *not later than 18 months after appointment as the Inspector*  
38 *General; and*

39 *(c) Continued status as a Certified Inspector General by the*  
40 *Association of Inspectors General, or its successor organization,*  
41 *while in office.*

42 *5. The Inspector General is not in the classified or*  
43 *unclassified service of the State and:*



1 (a) Shall devote his or her entire time and attention to the  
2 business of his or her office and shall not engage in any other  
3 gainful employment or occupation.

4 (b) Is ineligible for elective public office under the government  
5 and laws of this State.

6 **Sec. 11.** The Inspector General shall administer this chapter  
7 and all other provisions of law relating to the functions of the  
8 Office.

9 **Sec. 12.** 1. The Inspector General:

10 (a) Shall appoint a deputy inspector general and a special  
11 counsel. The deputy inspector general and special counsel are in  
12 the unclassified service of the State.

13 (b) May, within the limits available money, employ such other  
14 persons he or she deems necessary to provide an appropriate staff  
15 for the Office, including, without limitation, auditors,  
16 administrative staff and investigators. Any such person employed  
17 pursuant to this paragraph is in the classified service of the State.

18 2. The Inspector General may enter into contracts for the  
19 services of certified public accountants, qualified management  
20 consultants or other professional experts necessary to  
21 independently perform the functions of the Office, within the  
22 limits of money available for that purpose.

23 **Sec. 13.** 1. The Inspector General shall:

24 (a) Establish and maintain a full-time program of auditing,  
25 investigation, inspection and performance review of each person  
26 or governmental entity that receives public money related to  
27 education to provide increased accountability and oversight of  
28 public money related to education and to assist in improving  
29 operations and deterring and identifying fraud, waste, abuse and  
30 corruption; and

31 (b) Upon request by the Governor, but not less often than  
32 quarterly, submit a report to the Governor and to the Director of  
33 the Legislative Counsel Bureau for transmittal to the Legislature  
34 setting forth any findings and conclusions relating to an audit,  
35 investigation, inspection or review specified in subsection 2 and  
36 any suggested corrective or remedial actions, including, without  
37 limitation, increased oversight, carrying out or modifying any  
38 controls for internal management, termination of employment or  
39 referral to appropriate administrative and prosecutorial agencies.

40 2. The Inspector General may:

41 (a) Engage in prevention activities, including, without  
42 limitation, the review of legislation, rules, regulations, policies and  
43 procedures of a person or governmental entity that receives public  
44 money related to education.



1 (b) Review the reliability and validity of the information  
2 provided through performance measures and standards of a  
3 person or governmental entity that receives public money related  
4 to education.

5 (c) Conduct a review of the performance measurement system  
6 of any person or governmental entity that receives public money  
7 related to education.

8 (d) Audit the economy, efficiency and effectiveness of the  
9 operations and functions of any person or governmental entity  
10 that receives public money related to education.

11 (e) Audit, inspect, investigate and review the activities, records,  
12 procurements, grants, agreements and other financial  
13 arrangements undertaken by a person or governmental entity that  
14 receives public money related to education.

15 (f) Recommend remedial actions to be taken by any person or  
16 governmental entity that receives public money related to  
17 education to overcome or correct operating or maintenance  
18 deficiencies or inefficiencies identified by the Office.

19 (g) Establish a program for receiving, reviewing and  
20 investigating any complaint submitted to the Inspector General  
21 concerning any fraud, waste, abuse or corruption by a person or  
22 governmental entity that receives public money related to  
23 education.

24 (h) Conduct civil, criminal and administrative investigations.

25 (i) Conduct joint investigations and projects with other  
26 oversight or law enforcement agencies.

27 (j) Provide information and evidence relating to criminal acts  
28 to appropriate law enforcement agencies.

29 (k) Refer matters for further civil, criminal and administrative  
30 action to appropriate administrative and prosecutorial agencies.

31 (l) Identify any other governmental entity that is responsible  
32 for auditing, investigating, inspecting or reviewing the operation  
33 and management of a person or governmental entity that receives  
34 public money related to education and coordinate with such  
35 governmental entities to share information and avoid any  
36 duplicative activities.

37 (m) Issue public reports.

38 (n) Adopt regulations to carry out the provisions of this  
39 chapter.

40 (o) Perform any other task relating to his or her duties as he or  
41 she determines necessary.

42 **Sec. 14. 1. The Inspector General shall:**

43 (a) Establish a toll-free telephone number at which a person  
44 may confidentially report to the Office information relating to  
45 fraud, waste, abuse or corruption with respect to the use of public



1 *money related to education by a person or governmental entity;*  
2 *and*

3 *(b) Create a written notice that:*

4 *(1) Clearly identifies the telephone number established*  
5 *pursuant to paragraph (a); and*

6 *(2) Contains a statement directing any person with*  
7 *information relating to fraud, waste, abuse or corruption with*  
8 *respect to the use of public money related to education to report*  
9 *the information to the Office.*

10 *2. The written notice created pursuant to subsection 1 must*  
11 *be posted conspicuously:*

12 *(a) In each public building of a governmental entity that*  
13 *receives or distributes public money related to education; and*

14 *(b) On the Internet website maintained by the Office.*

15 *3. Upon receipt of information from a person reporting*  
16 *fraud, waste, abuse or corruption with respect to the use of public*  
17 *money related to education by a person or governmental entity, the*  
18 *Office must perform a review and prepare a report of its findings.*  
19 *The report is a public record and:*

20 *(a) Must include, without limitation, an explanation of:*

21 *(1) The purpose of the review; and*

22 *(2) Any resolution or corrective action taken by the Office*  
23 *that resulted from the review.*

24 *(b) Must not include the identity of the person who reported*  
25 *the information.*

26 *4. Except as otherwise provided in this section, any*  
27 *information reported to the Office at the telephone number*  
28 *established pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 1, including,*  
29 *without limitation, the identity of the person who reported the*  
30 *information, is confidential.*

31 *5. The Office shall not disclose information that is*  
32 *confidential pursuant to this section except:*

33 *(a) Pursuant to NRS 239.0115;*

34 *(b) For the purpose of carrying out any duty of the Office or*  
35 *for the purpose of assisting the Director of the Office of Finance*  
36 *or Administrator of the Division of Internal Audits of the Office of*  
37 *Finance in carrying out any duty of the Director or Administrator;*

38 *(c) Upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction;*  
39 *or*

40 *(d) To the appropriate administrative and prosecutorial*  
41 *agencies.*

42 **Sec. 15.** *1. Upon request by the Inspector General, each*  
43 *person or governmental entity that receives public money related*  
44 *to education shall cooperate with and provide assistance to the*  
45 *Inspector General in carrying out the provisions of this chapter*



1 *and shall ensure that the premises, equipment, employees, books,*  
2 *papers, contracts, correspondence and other records of the person*  
3 *or governmental entity are available for use by the Inspector*  
4 *General in carrying out those provisions.*

5 2. *A person who willfully prevents, impairs or prohibits the*  
6 *Inspector General from initiating, carrying out or completing any*  
7 *audit, investigation, inspection or review is guilty of a category E*  
8 *felony and shall be punished as provided in NRS 193.130.*

9 **Sec. 16.** 1. *In carrying out the provisions of this chapter,*  
10 *the Inspector General may subpoena the attendance of witnesses*  
11 *or the production of books, papers and documents,*  
12 *notwithstanding any claim of privilege.*

13 2. *If any person refuses to obey a subpoena issued by the*  
14 *Inspector General, the Inspector General may present a petition to*  
15 *the district court of the county in which the person resides or the*  
16 *governmental entity is located, setting forth the facts, and*  
17 *thereupon the court, in a proper case, shall issue its subpoena to*  
18 *the person requiring his or her attendance before the court to*  
19 *testify or to produce books, papers and documents.*

20 3. *Any person failing or refusing to obey the subpoena of a*  
21 *district court may be proceeded against in the same manner as for*  
22 *a refusal to obey any other court order.*

23 **Sec. 17.** 1. *Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2,*  
24 *the Inspector General shall make public an annual report of*  
25 *audits, investigations, inspections and reviews conducted by the*  
26 *Office after such audits, investigations, inspections or reviews are*  
27 *concluded.*

28 2. *A report made public pursuant to subsection 1 must not*  
29 *include:*

30 (a) *The personal identifying information of an original source*  
31 *without his or her written consent; or*

32 (b) *Any information deemed privileged or confidential by law.*

33 3. *As used in this section:*

34 (a) *“Original source” means a person who:*

35 (1) *Voluntarily discloses to the Inspector General any*  
36 *information on which the allegations or transactions for an audit,*  
37 *investigation, inspection or review are based before the public*  
38 *disclosure of the information; or*

39 (2) *Has knowledge of information that is independent of*  
40 *and materially adds to any allegations or transactions which are*  
41 *publicly disclosed and who voluntarily provides such information*  
42 *to the Inspector General.*

43 (b) *“Personal identifying information” has the meaning*  
44 *ascribed to it in NRS 205.4617.*





1     **Sec. 18. 1. Audits, investigations, inspections and reviews**  
2 *conducted by the Office must conform to professional standards,*  
3 *including, without limitation, standards promulgated by the*  
4 *Association of Inspectors General or its successor organization.*

5     **2. The Legislative Auditor shall, on or before July 1, 2026,**  
6 *and at least once every 3 years thereafter, prepare and make*  
7 *public a report reviewing a representative sample of the audits,*  
8 *investigations, inspections and reviews performed by the Office for*  
9 *that time period for conformance with the professional standards*  
10 *described in subsection 1.*

11     **Sec. 19. 1. The Fund for the Office of the Inspector**  
12 *General of Education is hereby created in the State Treasury as a*  
13 *special revenue fund to be administered by the Office. All money*  
14 *received by the Office must be deposited in the Fund. The money*  
15 *in the Fund does not revert to the State General Fund at the end*  
16 *of any fiscal year, and the balance in the Fund must be carried*  
17 *forward to the next fiscal year.*

18     **2. The interest and income earned on the money in the Fund,**  
19 *after deducting any applicable charges, must be credited to the*  
20 *Fund. All claims against the Fund must be paid as other claims*  
21 *against the State are paid.*

22     **3. The money in the Fund may be used only to pay the costs**  
23 *of carrying out programs or laws administered by the Office.*

24     **Sec. 20. A person who willfully discharges, demotes,**  
25 *suspends, threatens, harasses or discriminates against an*  
26 *employee, contractor or agent as a result of a lawful complaint of*  
27 *the employee, contractor or agent concerning any fraud, waste,*  
28 *abuse or corruption within any person or governmental entity that*  
29 *receives public money related to education is guilty of a category E*  
30 *felony and shall be punished as provided in NRS 193.130.*

31     **Sec. 21. NRS 385A.400 is hereby amended to read as follows:**

32     **385A.400 1.** The State Board shall, on or before January 15  
33 of each year, prepare for the immediately preceding school year a  
34 single annual report of accountability that includes, without  
35 limitation the information prescribed by NRS 385A.400 to  
36 385A.520, inclusive.

37     **2.** A separate reporting for a group of pupils must not be made  
38 pursuant to NRS 385A.400 to 385A.520, inclusive, if the number of  
39 pupils in that group is insufficient to yield statistically reliable  
40 information or the results would reveal personally identifiable  
41 information about an individual pupil. The Department shall use the  
42 mechanism approved by the United States Department of Education  
43 for the statewide system of accountability for public schools for  
44 determining the minimum number of pupils that must be in a group  
45 for that group to yield statistically reliable information.



1 3. The annual report of accountability must:  
2 (a) Be prepared in a concise manner; and  
3 (b) Be presented in an understandable and uniform format and,  
4 to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents can  
5 understand.

6 4. On or before January 15 of each year, the State Board shall  
7 provide for public dissemination of the annual report of  
8 accountability by posting a copy of the report on the Internet  
9 website maintained by the Department.

10 5. Upon the request of the Governor, the Attorney General, *the*  
11 *Inspector General of Education appointed pursuant to section 10*  
12 *of this act*, the Committee, the Bureau, the Board of Regents of the  
13 University of Nevada, the board of trustees of a school district, the  
14 State Public Charter School Authority, a college or university within  
15 the Nevada System of Higher Education, the governing body of a  
16 charter school or a member of the general public, the State Board  
17 shall provide a portion or portions of the annual report of  
18 accountability.

19 **Sec. 22.** NRS 387.013 is hereby amended to read as follows:

20 387.013 The State Controller shall, each quarter, prepare a  
21 complete financial report of the State Permanent School Fund. A  
22 copy of this report must be submitted to the State Treasurer , ~~and~~  
23 ~~to~~ the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau  
24 ~~and the Inspector General of Education appointed pursuant to~~  
25 *section 10 of this act.*

26 **Sec. 23.** NRS 387.303 is hereby amended to read as follows:

27 387.303 1. Not later than November 1 of each year, the board  
28 of trustees of each school district shall submit to the Superintendent  
29 of Public Instruction , ~~and~~ the Department of Taxation *and the*  
30 *Inspector General of Education appointed pursuant to section 10*  
31 *of this act* a report which includes the following information:

32 (a) For each fund within the school district, including, without  
33 limitation, the school district's general fund and any special revenue  
34 fund which receives state money, the total number and salaries of  
35 licensed and nonlicensed persons whose salaries are paid from the  
36 fund and who are employed by the school district in full-time  
37 positions or in part-time positions added together to represent full-  
38 time positions. Information must be provided for the current school  
39 year based upon the school district's final budget, including any  
40 amendments and augmentations thereto, and for the preceding  
41 school year. An employee must be categorized as filling an  
42 instructional, administrative, instructional support or other position.

43 (b) The school district's actual expenditures in the fiscal year  
44 immediately preceding the report.



1 (c) The school district's proposed expenditures for the current  
2 fiscal year.

3 (d) The schedule of salaries for licensed employees in the  
4 current school year and a statement of whether the negotiations  
5 regarding salaries for the current school year have been completed.  
6 If the negotiations have not been completed at the time the schedule  
7 of salaries is submitted, the board of trustees shall submit a  
8 supplemental report to the Superintendent of Public Instruction upon  
9 completion of negotiations or the determination of an arbitrator  
10 concerning the negotiations that includes the schedule of salaries  
11 agreed to or required by the arbitrator.

12 (e) The number of employees who received an increase in salary  
13 pursuant to NRS 391.161, 391.162 or 391.163 for the current and  
14 preceding fiscal years. If the board of trustees is required to pay an  
15 increase in salary retroactively pursuant to NRS 391.161, the board  
16 of trustees shall submit a supplemental report to the Superintendent  
17 of Public Instruction not later than February 15 of the year in which  
18 the retroactive payment was made that includes the number of  
19 teachers to whom an increase in salary was paid retroactively.

20 (f) The number of employees eligible for health insurance within  
21 the school district for the current and preceding fiscal years and the  
22 amount paid for health insurance for each such employee during  
23 those years.

24 (g) The rates for fringe benefits, excluding health insurance,  
25 paid by the school district for its licensed employees in the  
26 preceding and current fiscal years.
