SUMMARY—Requires the Department of Business and Industry to conduct a study related to disparities and unlawful discrimination in the awarding of certain contracts by the State or a local government. (BDR S-892)

EXPLANATION - Matter in bolded italics is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to government contracts; requiring the Department of Business and Industry to conduct a study relating to disparities and unlawful discrimination on the basis of race or gender in the awarding of purchasing and public works contracts by the State or a local government; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law creates the Department of Business and Industry. (NRS 232.510) This bill requires the Department to conduct a study to determine whether and to what extent disparities and unlawful discrimination on the basis of race or gender exist with respect to the awarding of contracts by the State or a local government for the procurement of goods and services for public works.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** 1. The Department of Business and Industry created by NRS 232.510 shall conduct a study to determine whether and to what extent disparities and unlawful discrimination on the basis of race or gender exist with respect to the awarding of contracts by the State or a local government:
- (a) For the procurement of goods and services pursuant to chapters 332 and 333 of NRS; and

(b) For public works pursuant to chapter 338 of NRS.2. The Department shall submit a report of its findings, including, without limitation, any recommendations for legislation, to the Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau for transmittal to the 81st Session of the Nevada Legislature.

Sec. 2. This act becomes effective on July 1, 2019.
