8	An Act relating to school reports; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section 3-151.1, which relates to high school
9	graduation rates; modifying calculation of the four- year and extended-year adjusted cohort graduation
10	rates; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section 1210.545, which relates to annual school reports; including
11	additional statewide measures for quality or success; excluding chronic absenteeism data from measures and
12	reports; expanding items to include in postsecondary opportunities; providing an effective date; and
13	declaring an emergency.

16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
17	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 3-151.1, is
18	amended to read as follows:
19	Section 3-151.1 A. For purposes of establishing a uniform and
20	accurate definition of high school graduation rate for school
21	districts and secondary schools in the state, the State Board of
22	Education shall adopt and implement a four-year adjusted cohort
23	graduation rate and an extended-year adjusted cohort graduation
24	rate. The Board shall utilize and report the four-year adjusted

1 cohort graduation rate and the extended-year adjusted cohort 2 graduation rate at the secondary school site, the school district 3 and the state level, and the graduation rates shall be reported in 4 the aggregate as well as disaggregated by subgroups as required in 5 the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 2001 (ESEA), P.L. No. 6 107-110, also known as the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

7 The Board shall use the four-year adjusted cohort graduation Β. rate for purposes of determining the high school graduation rate 8 9 indicator for the academic performance data calculation beginning with state and district report cards providing results of 10 11 assessments administered in the 2011-2012 school year. The Board shall use the four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate for 12 13 establishing the high school graduation rate for measuring alternate 14 year percentage growth targets as set forth in Section 3-151.2 of 15 this title beginning with the 2012-2013 school year.

16 С. The four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate shall be 17 defined as the number of students who graduate in four (4) years 18 with a standard high school diploma divided by the number of 19 students who entered high school four (4) years earlier, adjusted 20 for transfers. Students who transfer in and out of the school, 21 émigrés emigrate to another country, and deceased students shall not 22 be included in the adjusted cohort graduation rate. Students who 23 graduate in four (4) years shall include students who earn a 24 standard high school diploma at the end of their fourth year, before

1 the end of their fourth year, and during a summer session immediately following their fourth year. To remove a student from a 2 cohort, a school district shall confirm in writing or by electronic 3 means that a student has transferred out of the school site or 4 5 school district, has emigrated to another country, or is deceased. For a student who transfers out of a school site or school district, 6 7 the written or electronic confirmation shall be official and document that the student has enrolled in another school site or 8 9 school district or in an educational program that culminates in a high school diploma recognized by a state or private higher 10 11 educational institution accredited or recognized by the Oklahoma 12 State Regents for Higher Education for purposes of admission to the 13 institution. Students who are not enrolled in a program which 14 culminates in the award of a credential recognized by a state or 15 private higher educational institution for purposes of admissions 16 shall not be included in the graduation rate calculation as set 17 forth in this subsection as a student who graduated in four (4) 18 years with a standard high school diploma but shall be included in 19 the number of students who entered high school four (4) years 20 earlier.

D. The extended-year adjusted cohort graduation rate shall be defined as the number of students who graduate in four (4) years or five (5) years with a high school diploma divided by the number of students who form the adjusted cohort for the four-year graduation

1 rate as calculated as provided for in subsection C of this section, 2 provided that the adjustments add to the cohort all students who transfer into the cohort by the end of the year of graduation being 3 4 considered and subtract students who transfer out, emigrate to 5 another country or are deceased by the end of that year. The extended-year adjusted cohort graduation rate shall be reported 6 7 separately from the four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate. 70 O.S. 2021, Section 1210.545, is SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 8

9 amended to read as follows:

10 Section 1210.545 A. Except as otherwise provided, as part of 11 the accountability system developed as provided for in Section 12 1210.541 of this title, the State Board of Education shall prepare 13 annual reports of the results of the Oklahoma School Testing Program 14 which describe student achievement in the state, and each school 15 site, pursuant to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 16 (ESEA) as reauthorized by P.L. No. 114-95, also known as the Every 17 Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), and any related federal regulations.

B. The annual report as required pursuant to subsection A of this section shall identify school sites as having one of the following grades for each indicator, separately, and by a single overview grade of all indicators, defined according to rules of the State Board of Education:

23 1. "A" means schools making excellent progress;
24 2. "B" means schools making above average progress;

3. "C" means schools making satisfactory progress;

2 4. "D" means schools making less than satisfactory progress; 3 and

4 5. "F" means schools failing to make adequate progress.

5 C. Each school that has students who are tested and included in 6 the school grading system as provided for in this section shall 7 receive a school grade, except as follows:

8 1. A school shall not receive a school grade if the number of 9 students tested and included in the school grading system is less 10 than the minimum sample size necessary for statistical reliability 11 and prevention of the unlawful release of personally identifiable 12 student data. The State Board of Education is directed to establish 13 the lowest minimum sample size necessary to meet the requirements of 14 this paragraph; and

2. The academic performance of students who are enrolled fulltime in an online program that is offered by a school district or charter school that is not the district of residence or is not located in the district of residence of the student shall be reported separately by the school district or charter school and shall not be included when determining the grade of the school site or charter school.

D. The State Board of Education may adopt alternate systems of accountability for statewide virtual charter schools, alternative education programs as defined in Section 1210.568 of this title, and

schools serving only grades prekindergarten or kindergarten through
 two.

E. The grade of a school shall be based on a multimeasures approach to accountability in accordance with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) as reauthorized by P.L. No. 114-95, also known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and any federal regulations that include, but are not limited to, the following indicators:

9 1. Statewide assessments, including the establishment of10 student performance bands;

11 2. Graduation rates for high schools;

Statewide academic measures for elementary and middle
 schools;

14 4. English language proficiency for English learners; and 15 5. At least one additional statewide measure of school quality 16 or student success, including, but not limited to, school climate; 17 school safety_{τ}; student engagement_{τ} which may include, but not be 18 limited to, percentage of students enrolled in community service 19 learning, computer science, fine arts, physical education, and 20 health; educator engagement_{τ}; and/or advanced coursework and 21 postsecondary readiness. Chronic absenteeism shall not be included 22 as any statewide measure of school quality or student success. 23 F. Of the indicators included in subsection E of this section, 24 not less than seventy percent (70%) of the overview grade must be

1 given to indicators 1, 2, 3 and 4 and, in the aggregate, with not 2 more than thirty percent (30%) of the grade given to indicator 5.

G. Further, the grade of an elementary or middle school site
shall include, but not be limited to, a measure of status for
English language arts (ELA), math and science, growth in ELA and
math, and English Language Proficiency Assessment (ELPA) progress,
and chronic absenteeism.

The grade of a high school site shall include, but not be 8 Η. 9 limited to, a measure of status for English language arts (ELA), 10 math and science status, English Language Proficiency Assessment 11 (ELPA) progress, graduation rate, chronic absentecism, and 12 postsecondary opportunities. For purposes of this section 13 postsecondary opportunities shall include Advanced Placement, 14 International Baccalaureate, dual and concurrent enrollment, scoring 15 Silver Level or above on American College Testing (ACT) WorkKeys, 16 internships, mentorships and apprenticeships, military readiness as 17 evidenced by being accepted for enlistment into any branch of the 18 military within the first year after high school graduation or 19 earning a military-readiness score on the Armed Services Vocational 20 Aptitude Battery (ASVAB), and industry certifications. The Board 21 shall adopt a time line for moving from completion of such 22 opportunities to crediting achievement of such opportunities. 23 The annual report shall identify the performance of each I. 24 school as having improved, remained the same, or declined. This

1 school improvement rating shall be based on a comparison of the 2 student and school performance data of the current year to the 3 previous year data.

4 The State Department of Education shall annually develop a J. 5 school site report card to be delivered to parents throughout each school district. The report card shall be in accordance with the 6 7 requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 8 (ESEA), as reauthorized and amended by P.L. No. 114-95, also known 9 as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) and includes the grade for 10 the school, information regarding school improvement, an explanation 11 of school performance, and indicators of return on investment. The 12 report card for each school site shall be published annually by the 13 Department on its website, and every school district shall provide 14 the school site report card to the parent or quardian of each 15 student enrolled in the school site. In order to provide 16 information regarding school performance for school report cards 17 issued during the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 school year, the 18 Department shall include an explanation of the changes to the 19 statewide system of student assessments as required in Section 20 1210.508 of this title and how the transition in assessments may 21 impact school performance. The Department shall issue school report 22 cards using the 2016-2017 school year assessment data that is 23 available.

1 The Legislature may factor in the performance of schools in Κ. 2 calculating any performance-based funding policy that is provided to 3 public school districts. 4 The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules to L. 5 implement the provisions of this section. 6 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 2024. 7 SECTION 4.
