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12	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
13	SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
14	in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 7320 of Title 63, unless there
15	is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
16	For the purpose of prohibiting step therapy requirements for
17	certain prescription drugs to treat advanced metastatic cancer and
18	associated conditions.
19	As used in this section:
20	1. "Associated conditions" means the symptoms or side effects
21	associated with advanced metastatic cancer or its treatment and
22	which, in the judgment of the health care practitioner, will further
23	jeopardize the health of a patient if left untreated;
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2. "Advanced metastatic cancer" means cancer that has spread
 from the primary or original site of the cancer to nearby tissues,
 lymph nodes, or other areas or parts of the body.

4 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 5 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 7321 of Title 63, unless there 6 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. A health benefit plan that provides coverage for advanced
metastatic cancer and associated conditions may not require, before
the health benefit plan provides coverage of a prescription drug
approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, that the
enrollee:

Fails to successfully respond to a different drug; or
 Proves a history of failure of a different drug.

B. This section applies only to a drug, the use of which is:
1. Consistent with best practices for the treatment of advanced
metastatic cancer or an associated condition;

Supported by peer-reviewed, evidence-based literature; and
 Approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration.
 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2023.
