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13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
14	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.508D,
15	as amended by Section 2, Chapter 171, O.S.L. 2012 (70 O.S. Supp.
16	2020, Section 1210.508D), is amended to read as follows:
17	Section 1210.508D A. Contingent on the provision of
18	appropriated funds designated for the Reading Sufficiency Act,
19	school districts may be allocated monies for each enrolled
20	kindergarten student or first-, second- and third-grade student of
21	the current school year, including any student who has been retained
22	in the third grade pursuant to Section 1210.508C of this title, who
23	is found to be in need of remediation or intervention in reading.
24	The allocation shall be distributed to each school district upon

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approval of the reading sufficiency plan for the school district by the State Department of Education and the submittal of a child-count report to the Department that details the number of students identified as needing remediation or intervention in reading. To determine a per-student allocation amount, the total amount of funds available for allocation each year shall be divided by the total number of students in the state identified as in need of remediation or intervention in reading as provided for in Section 1210.508C of this title. Each school district shall be allocated an amount equal to the per-student allocation amount multiplied by the number of identified students enrolled in the school district.

- B. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules for the administration of reimbursements. Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, districts receiving more than Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) pursuant to subsection A of this section shall spend no less than ten percent (10%) to provide professional development for teachers teaching prekindergarten through grade five. The professional development shall include training in the science of how students learn to read as well as instructional materials required for implementation.
- C. By June 30, 2022, the Department shall approve and publish a list of professional development programs that are evidence-based and directly address the cognitive science of how students learn to

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    read for which districts are permitted to use the funds received
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    under this section.
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        C. D. If a teacher attends and completes a professional
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    development institute in elementary reading approved by the Oklahoma
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    Commission for Teacher Preparation during the summer or when school
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    is not in session, the teacher may receive a stipend equal to the
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    amount of the cost for a substitute teacher, based on the amount of
    funds allocated.
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
