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13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
14	SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
15	in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 19 of Title 5, unless there is
16	created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
17	A. As a condition of continued employment, every employee of
18	the state or a political subdivision of the state whose job
19	description requires that the employee be a member of the Oklahoma
20	Bar Association shall attend a seminar on the principles of
21	federalism at least once every two (2) years. The employee shall
22	receive continuing education credit for attending the seminar based
23	upon the criteria for receiving credit established by the Oklahoma

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Bar Association.

- 1 The curriculum for federalism seminars shall be developed by 2 the States' Rights Committee of the Oklahoma House of 3 Representatives, or any successor committee thereto, and shall
- include: 4

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- 1. Fundamental principles of federalism;
- 6 The sovereignty, supremacy, and jurisdiction of the 7 individual states, including their police powers;
 - The history and practical implementation of the Tenth Amendment to the United States Constitution;
 - 4. The authority and limits on the authority of the federal government as found in the United States Constitution;
 - The relationship between the state and federal governments;
 - 6. Methods of evaluating a federal law in the context of federalism;
 - 7. How and when challenges should be made to a federal law or regulation on the basis of federalism;
 - The separate and independent powers of the state that serve as a check on the federal government; and
 - 9. Any other issues relating to federalism that the States' Rights Committee considers necessary.
- 2.1 SECTION 2. This act shall become effective November 1, 2016.

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
