NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 19 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 2001 of Title 64, unless there 20 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 2.1 The Commissioners of the Land Office shall consult with the Α. 22 Oklahoma Conservation Commission and the Oklahoma State University 23 Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources to identify 24 acreages and recommend an action plan designed to remove or

1 eradicate all harmful woody species on land owned by and leased by the Commissioners of the Land Office. "Harmful woody species" means a tree or shrub species that is rapidly encroaching into adjoining 3 4 lands and is likely to cause harm to the environment or economy. 5 Harmful woody species include, but are not limited to, Juniperus virginiana (eastern red cedar), Juniperus scopulorum (Rocky Mountain 6 7 juniper), Juniperus monosperma (one-seed juniper), Juniperus pinchotii (redberry juniper), Juniperus ashei (ashe juniper), 8 9 Prosopis glandulosa (honey mesquite), and Tamarix ramosissima (salt 10 cedar).

This removal and eradication of these harmful woody species shall begin January 1, 2025 and will remove and eradicate twenty (20%) percent of the harmful and woody species each year on identified acreages through December 31, 2029. It being the intent to remove all of the harmful woody species on the identified acreages at the end of the five (5) year period.

B. The Commissioners of the Land Office may fund this removal and eradication program through donations from organizations, individuals, and corporations supporting improved habitat for wildlife or livestock production, as well as through grants from federal agencies, and from all other funding that is available to the Commissioners of the Land Office.

SECTION 2. This act shall become effective July 1, 2024.

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1	SECTION 3. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
2	of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
3	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
4	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
