1 ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 515 By: Stanislawski of the Senate 2 and 3 Rogers of the House 4 5 [Oklahoma School Testing Program - annual 6 accountability reports - effective date -7 emergency] 8 9 10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA: AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.545, as 11 SECTION 1. 12 last amended by Section 10, Chapter 360, O.S.L. 2016 (70 O.S. Supp. 13 2016, Section 1210.545), is amended to read as follows: Section 1210.545. A. 1. Except as otherwise provided, as part 14 15 of the accountability system developed as provided for in Section 1210.541 of this title, the State Board of Education shall prepare 16 annual reports of the results of the Oklahoma School Testing Program 17 which describe student achievement in the state and each school 18 site. 19 2. The Board shall study and may recommend revisions to the 20 Legislature to the calculation metrics of all components of the 21 school report cards to ensure that the evaluation system is clear, 22 transparent, statistically trustworthy, credible, and aligned with 23 the state assessment system. The Board shall seek certification 24

1 from the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education that 2 recommended revisions, if adopted, will improve the clarity, 3 transparency, statistical trustworthiness, credibility τ and alignment of the evaluation system. The State Regents shall provide 4 5 the Board a detailed description of the certification process and results, including a list of any deficiencies the State Regents find 6 7 with the study or the resulting recommendations. The Board shall issue a report by December 31, 2015, and submit a copy of the report 8 9 to the Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the 10 President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the 11 House of Representatives, and the Minority Leader of the Senate. 12 The Board shall prescribe the design and content of the reports, 13 which shall include, without limitation, descriptions of the performance of all schools participating in the Oklahoma School 14 15 Testing Program and all of the major student populations as determined by the Board, and shall also include the median scores of 16 all eligible students who scored at or in the lowest twenty-fifth 17 percentile of the state in the previous school year. 18 The confidentiality of individual student records shall be preserved as 19 required by law. 20

B. The annual report as required pursuant to subsection A of this section shall identify school sites as having one of the following grades, defined according to rules of the State Board of Education:

1. "A" means schools making excellent progress;
 2. "B" means schools making above average progress;
 3. "C" means schools making satisfactory progress;
 4. "D" means schools making less than satisfactory progress;
 5 and

5. "F" means schools failing to make adequate progress.

7 C. Each school that has students who are tested and included in 8 the school grading system as provided for in this section shall 9 receive a school grade, except as follows:

10 1. A school shall not receive a school grade if the number of 11 students tested and included in the school grading system is less 12 than the minimum sample size necessary for statistical reliability 13 and prevention of the unlawful release of personally identifiable 14 student data. The State Board of Education is directed to establish 15 the lowest minimum sample size necessary to meet the requirements of 16 this paragraph;

2. A school that serves any combination of students in
kindergarten through grade three which does not receive a school
grade because the students are not tested and included in the school
grading system shall receive the school grade designation of a
feeder pattern school identified by the State Department of
Education and verified by the school district. A school feeder
pattern exists if at least sixty percent (60%) of the students in

the school serving a combination of students in kindergarten through
 grade three are scheduled to be assigned to the graded school; and

3 3. The academic performance of students who are enrolled full4 time in an online program that is offered by a school district or
5 charter school that is not the district of residence or is not
6 located in the district of residence of the student shall be
7 reported separately by the school district or charter school and
8 shall not be included when determining the grade of the school site
9 or charter school.

D. The grade of a school shall be based on a combination of: 1. Fifty percent (50%) on whole school performance, as measured by allocating one point for each student who scores proficient or advanced on the assessments administered under Section 1210.508 of this title and alternative test scores administered to students divided by the number of students taking the assessments;

Twenty-five percent (25%) on whole school growth, as
 measured by allocating one point for each student who improves
 proficiency levels or improves substantially within a proficiency
 level on assessments administered under Section 1210.508 of this
 title divided by the number of students taking the assessments; and

3. Twenty-five percent (25%) on growth in the bottom quartile of students, as measured by allocating one point for each student in the bottom quartile who improves proficiency levels or improves substantially within a proficiency level on assessments administered

under Section 1210.508 of this title divided by the number of
 students taking the assessments.

E. In addition to the components outlined in subsection D of this section, the following bonus points shall be considered in determining the grade of a school site:

6 1. For schools comprised of high school grades:

- a. five points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for
 the <u>four-year and five-year</u> high school graduation
 rate <u>rates</u> of the school, as defined by rules adopted
 by the Board,
- 11 b. one point
- (1) five points for meeting the criteria for an "A" 12 13 for performance or participation of students in College Board Advanced Placement courses, 14 15 International Baccalaureate courses, concurrent enrollment courses, Advanced International 16 17 Certificate of Education courses, SAT tests administered by the College Board, the American 18 College Test or the achievement of students on 19 national industry certification, as measured by 20 dividing the number of students participating by 21 the total enrollment of the high school, as 22 defined by rules adopted by the Board, and 23

For schools comprised of elementary school grades, ten 19

20 points for meeting the criteria for an "A" for attendance, as 21 defined by rules adopted by the Board.

F. Student test data used in determining school grades shall include:

4 2. For schools comprised of high school grades, the data listed
5 in paragraph 1 of this subsection, and the following data as the
6 State Department of Education determines the data are valid and
7 available:

- a. the <u>four-year and five-year</u> high school graduation
 9 rate <u>rates</u> of the school as calculated by the
 10 Department,
- the participation rate of all eligible students 11 b. 12 enrolled in the school in College Board Advanced Placement courses whether taught at a high school, a 13 technology center school_{τ} or a regional site of the 14 Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics, 15 International Baccalaureate courses, concurrent 16 enrollment courses, Advanced International Certificate 17 of Education courses, courses or sequence of courses 18 leading to national industry certification identified 19 pursuant to rules adopted by the Board, courses or 20 sequence of courses granted cooperative college 21 alliance credit taken at a technology center school_{τ} 22 that meets the requirements to be eligible for federal 23 student financial aid and science, technology, 24

engineering and mathematics courses taken at a
 regional site of the Oklahoma School of Science and
 Mathematics,

- c. the aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
 in the school in College Board Advanced Placement
 courses whether taught at a high school, a technology
 center school, or a regional site of the Oklahoma
 School of Science and Mathematics, International
 Baccalaureate courses, and Advanced International
 Certificate of Education courses,
- 11d.earning of college credit by all eligible students12enrolled in the school in concurrent enrollment13programs as provided for in Section 628.13 of this14title and in cooperative college alliance courses15taken at a technology center school that meet the16requirements to be eligible for federal student17financial aid,
- e. earning of a national industry certification
 identified pursuant to rules adopted by the Board,
 f. the aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
 in the school in reading, mathematics, and other
 subjects as measured by the SAT test administered by

the College Board and the ACT,

| 17 | of this section. Grades shall be assigned based on the following |
| 18 | scale: |

The annual report shall identify the performance of each school as having improved, remained the same \overline{r} or declined. 13 This school improvement rating shall be based on a comparison of the 14

15 student and school performance data of the current year to the 16 previous year data. Schools that improve at least one grade level 17 are eligible for school recognition as established by the Board 18 through the accountability system developed pursuant to Section 19 1210.541 of this title.

I. The State Department of Education shall annually develop, in collaboration with school districts and the Office of Educational Quality and Accountability, a school site report card to be delivered to parents throughout each school district. The report card shall include the grade for the school, information regarding

1 school improvement, an explanation of school performance as 2 evaluated in accordance with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as reauthorized and amended by P.L. No. 114-95, 3 also known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), and indicators 4 5 of return on investment. The report card for each school site shall be published annually by the Department on its website, and every 6 school district shall provide the school site report card to the 7 parent or quardian of each student enrolled in the school site. 8 Ιn 9 order to provide information regarding school performance for school 10 site report cards issued during the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 school 11 year, the Department shall include an explanation of the changes to 12 the statewide system of student assessments as required in Section 1210.508 of this title and how the transition in assessments may 13 impact school performance. The Department shall issue school site 14 15 report cards using the 2016-2017 school year assessment data that is available. 16

J. The Legislature may factor in the performance of schools in calculating any performance-based funding policy that is provided to public school districts.

20 K. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules to 21 implement the provisions of this section. <u>The rules shall include</u> 22 <u>the following provisions:</u>

23 <u>1. The baseline performance target shall be the same for all</u>
