

House Bill 4014

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Pre-session filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Economic Recovery and Prosperity for Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS))

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Extends deadline for submission of final report based on study of system development charges required under section 1, chapter 544, Oregon Laws 2021 (Enrolled House Bill 3040).

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to a date change for a report of the system development charges study; amending section
3 1, chapter 544, Oregon Laws 2021; and declaring an emergency.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** Section 1, chapter 544, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

6 **Sec. 1.** (1)(a) The Housing and Community Services Department, in consultation with the De-
7 partment of Land Conservation and Development, the Department of Environmental Quality, the
8 Department of Revenue and the Oregon Business Development Department, shall conduct a com-
9 prehensive study of system development charges as defined in ORS 223.299.

10 (b) The scope of the study shall include:

11 (A) The role that system development charges play as both cost drivers for market-rate housing
12 and sources of revenue for infrastructure needed for housing;

13 (B) The full range of factors that contribute to system development charge fee rates; and

14 (C) All types of market-rate housing, including single-family, multifamily and manufactured
15 housing.

16 (c)(A) The Housing and Community Services Department shall consult with local governments,
17 special districts, developers, realtors and other persons as needed in conducting the study and en-
18 sure opportunities for input from other stakeholders and the general public.

19 (B) The Housing and Community Services Department may contract with a third party to com-
20 plete the study, or any portion of the study.

21 (C) State and local public agencies shall comply with reasonable requests from the Housing and
22 Community Services Department, or from a third party conducting the study or any portion of the
23 study under contract with the Housing and Community Services Department, for information in
24 furtherance of the study required under this section.

25 (2) The study shall address, at a minimum, the following:

26 (a) The history and role of system development charges in supporting residential development,
27 including:

28 (A) The methodologies used for setting fees, including differences in methodologies and rates for
29 communities of different sizes and growth rates, stated separately for urban and rural communities.

30 (B) Which entities, whether public or private, bear the cost of system development charges and

1 the degree to which costs are passed on to homebuyers.

2 (C) The impact of system development charges on overall housing costs and affordability and the
3 equity of housing development.

4 (D) How system development charges compare to other housing cost drivers, including, but not
5 limited to, the costs of land, labor and materials, utility rates, the costs of infrastructure and costs
6 associated with regulatory compliance.

7 (E) The cost of carrying system development charge interest according to the size and nature
8 of the development and the potential cost savings to private parties of deferring system development
9 charge fee payments.

10 (F) The cost to public agencies of deferring system development charge fee payments, including
11 potential unintended consequences of deferred payments and the need for remedies to address non-
12 compliance.

13 (G) The potential costs and benefits to the public from system development charge fee payment
14 deferrals and the transfer of carrying costs.

15 (b) How the availability of funding for capital improvements as defined in ORS 223.299, including
16 federal, state, local and private sources, has affected system development charge fee rates.

17 (c) How the effects of Ballot Measures 5 and 50 on ad valorem property tax rates affect rate
18 setting for system development charge fees.

19 (d) The costs of providing capital improvements as defined in ORS 223.299 needed for housing.

20 (e) The costs to public agencies of providing services needed for planning, inspecting and issuing
21 permits for housing and how the costs affect system development charge fee rates.

22 (f) With respect to transparency, the degree to which:

23 (A) Public entities provide the public with sufficient information to understand system develop-
24 ment charges, including how fee rates are set and how fee revenue is used, and whether the infor-
25 mation is easily accessible and understandable.

26 (B) Private entities provide clear explanations to customers regarding the purposes and costs
27 of system development charges.

28 (3) The Housing and Community Services Department shall submit, in the manner provided in
29 ORS 192.245, to the interim legislative committees related to housing and economic recovery and
30 prosperity:

31 (a) A preliminary report, no later than December 31, 2021; and

32 (b) A final report, no later than [June 1,] **December 15, 2022.**

33 **SECTION 2. This 2022 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
34 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2022 Act takes effect**
35 **on its passage.**

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
