A RESOLUTION

- Urging the Congress of the United States to raise income limits for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and either
- 3 extend or make permanent Emergency Allotments.
- 4 WHEREAS, The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
- 5 is a federally funded, state-administered program in which
- 6 eligible participants receive an Electronic Benefits Transfer
- 7 card which they can use to directly purchase food for their
- 8 household; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Nearly 1 million Pennsylvania households, or about
- 10 1.8 million Pennsylvanians, use SNAP; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Approximately two-thirds of SNAP beneficiaries
- 12 nationwide are families with children, and approximately one-
- 13 third are households with older adults or people with
- 14 disabilities; and
- WHEREAS, SNAP helps families bridge temporary periods of
- 16 unemployment and economic hardship; and
- 17 WHEREAS, SNAP has led to a decrease of as much as 30% in food

- 1 insecurity nationwide; and
- 2 WHEREAS, SNAP supports the economy and the agriculture sector
- 3 as it allows people with low incomes to spend more money on
- 4 food; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, SNAP was responsible
- 6 for keeping nearly 8 million Americans above the poverty line,
- 7 3.6 million of whom were children; and
- 8 WHEREAS, SNAP benefits are determined in part by calculating
- 9 a recipient's total income; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Social Security payments are included as part of
- 11 income for determining SNAP benefits; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Social Security payments are tied to cost-of-living
- 13 increases as calculated by the Department of Labor's Consumer
- 14 Price Index; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Due to rising inflation over the past two years,
- 16 Social Security payments are rising by an average of \$140 per
- 17 month in 2023; and
- 18 WHEREAS, For the many SNAP participants on Social Security,
- 19 this means their monthly incomes are rising, which will lead to
- 20 an average decrease of \$40 per month in SNAP benefits; and
- 21 WHEREAS, For other SNAP participants, it means they will lose
- 22 access to the program altogether; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Robust expansions of SNAP at the start of the COVID-
- 24 19 pandemic and maintained over the course of several years
- 25 helped prevent massive increases in nationwide food insecurity;
- 26 and
- 27 WHEREAS, This expansion was called Emergency Allotments and
- 28 increased SNAP payments from once to twice a month; and
- 29 WHEREAS, Congress ended funding for Emergency Allotments in
- 30 December 2022; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Funding for Emergency Allotments was originally
- 2 supposed to end when the Federal COVID-19 Public Health
- 3 Emergency Declaration ended; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The ending of Emergency Allotments starting March
- 5 2023 will contribute to between a \$100 to \$175 decrease in
- 6 monthly benefits for SNAP households; and
- 7 WHEREAS, The stoppage of this vital lifeline comes at a time
- 8 when Pennsylvanians are still struggling with the effects of the
- 9 COVID-19 pandemic and economic uncertainty; and
- 10 WHEREAS, It is vitally important that vulnerable
- 11 Pennsylvanians do not go hungry; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The United States Congress has the power to prevent
- 13 a national tragedy of millions of hungry Americans, including
- 14 right here in this Commonwealth, by raising the income limits
- 15 for SNAP and continuing Emergency Allotments; therefore be it
- RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the Congress
- 17 of the United States to raise the income limits for the
- 18 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program and either extend or
- 19 make permanent the Emergency Allotments.
