INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, JANUARY 23, 2013

A RESOLUTION

- 1 Recognizing January 11, 2013, as "National Human Trafficking 2 Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 4 hereby enacts as follows:
- 5 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth has a tradition of advancing
- 6 fundamental human rights; and
- WHEREAS, It is imperative to eliminate human trafficking,
- 8 including early or forced marriage, commercial sexual
- 9 exploitation, forced labor, labor obtained through debt bondage,
- 10 involuntary servitude, slavery and slavery by descent; and
- 11 WHEREAS, To combat human trafficking in this Commonwealth and
- 12 globally, the people of Pennsylvania and State and local
- 13 governments must be aware of the realities of human trafficking
- 14 and must be dedicated to stopping this contemporary

- 1 manifestation of slavery; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Efforts shall be made to actively oppose all
- 3 individuals, groups, organizations and nations who support,
- 4 advance or commit acts of human trafficking and to work to end
- 5 human trafficking around the world through education; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Victims of human trafficking need support in order
- 7 to escape and to recover from the physical, mental, emotional
- 8 and spiritual trauma associated with their victimization; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Human traffickers use many physical and
- 10 psychological techniques to control their victims, including the
- 11 use of violence or threats of violence against the victim or the
- 12 victim's family, isolation from the public, isolation from the
- 13 victim's family and religious or ethnic communities, language
- 14 and cultural barriers, shame, control of the victim's
- 15 possessions, confiscation of passports and other identification
- 16 documents and threats of arrest, deportation or imprisonment if
- 17 the victim attempts to reach out for assistance or to leave; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Although laws to prosecute perpetrators of human
- 19 trafficking and to assist and protect victims of human
- 20 trafficking have been enacted in the United States, awareness of
- 21 the issues surrounding human trafficking by those people most
- 22 likely to come into contact with victims is essential for
- 23 effective enforcement because the techniques that traffickers
- 24 use to keep their victims enslaved severely limit self-
- 25 reporting; and
- 26 WHEREAS, The effort by individuals, businesses, organizations
- 27 and governing bodies to promote the observance of "National
- 28 Human Trafficking Awareness Day" on January 11 of each year
- 29 represents one of the many examples of the ongoing commitment to
- 30 raise awareness of and to actively oppose human trafficking;

- 2 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives support the goals
- 3 and ideals of observing "National Human Trafficking Awareness
- 4 Day" on January 11, 2013, and all other efforts to raise
- 5 awareness of and opposition to human trafficking; and be it
- 6 further
- 7 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize January
- 8 11, 2013, as "National Human Trafficking Awareness Day" in
- 9 Pennsylvania.
