A RESOLUTION

- Designating May 17, 2023, as "Pennsylvania Girls' Wrestling Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Pennsylvania has a rich history of and unrivaled
- 4 passion for wrestling as a high school sport; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Girls' wrestling has been the fastest-growing high
- 6 school sport in the country over the past five years; and
- 7 WHEREAS, According to the nonprofit organization Wrestle Like
- 8 a Girl, Pennsylvania high school girls' wrestling increased
- 9 approximately 100% over the same five-year time period; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The number of female wrestlers in this Commonwealth
- 11 has grown from 229 in the 2019-2020 wrestling season to well
- 12 over 1,000 in the 2022-2023 wrestling season; and
- WHEREAS, There are currently 32 states that have officially
- 14 sanctioned girls' wrestling; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Currently, the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic
- 16 Association (PIAA) does not recognize girls' wrestling as an
- 17 official sport but has labeled it as an emerging sport; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The PIAA previously expressed that at least 100

- 1 girls' wrestling teams must organize before they can officially
- 2 sanction the sport and create a State championship for girls'
- 3 wrestling; and
- 4 WHEREAS, SanctionPA formed to help this Commonwealth's girl
- 5 wrestlers reach the PIAA 100-team marker; and
- 6 WHEREAS, SanctionPA is a grassroots effort by wrestling
- 7 leaders in this Commonwealth to work toward establishing girls'
- 8 wrestling as a sanctioned sport in Pennsylvania; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Wrestle Like A Girl, USA Wrestling, Pennsylvania USA
- 10 Wrestling, the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Association, the
- 11 National Wrestling Coaches Association, the National High School
- 12 Coaches Association and the Pennsylvania Chapter of the National
- 13 Wrestling Hall of Fame have all participated as positive
- 14 collaborators in the grassroots effort; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The grassroots sanction movement achieved their
- 16 initial goal of 100 girls' wrestling programs to be approved by
- 17 their respective schools on February 14, 2023, with the addition
- 18 of Pennridge High School in Bucks County; and
- 19 WHEREAS, The first girls' wrestling program approved in this
- 20 Commonwealth occurred at J.P. McCaskey High School in Lancaster
- 21 County; and
- 22 WHEREAS, To date, there are 108 girls' wrestling programs
- 23 approved by their respective schools across this Commonwealth;
- 24 and
- 25 WHEREAS, The PIAA plans to hold the third and final vote on
- 26 the application to approve girls' wrestling as a PIAA sponsored
- 27 sport on May 17, 2023; and
- 28 WHEREAS, The Statewide champions of the likely final
- 29 unsanctioned girls' wrestling season included: Valarie Solorio
- 30 (Canonsburg), Jayleah Pletz (Shillington), Journie Rodriguez

- 1 (Lancaster), Sierra Chiesa (West Springfield), Aubre Krazer
- 2 (Easton), Jordyn Fouse (Roaring Spring), Haylie Jaffe (Kennett
- 3 Square), Zoey Haines (Orrtanna), Leyna Rumpler (Wexford), Gabby
- 4 Reid (Stroudsburg), Alyssa Favara (Johnstown), Caroline Hattala
- 5 (Quakertown) and Brenda Banks (Lansford); and
- 6 WHEREAS, Participation in wrestling on a high school level
- 7 leads to invaluable opportunities to compete and succeed at the
- 8 collegiate level and later on in life; therefore be it
- 9 RESOLVED, That the Senate designate May 17, 2023, as
- 10 "Pennsylvania Girls' Wrestling Day" in Pennsylvania; and be it
- 11 further
- 12 RESOLVED, That the Senate acknowledge the efforts of
- 13 SanctionPA to help establish girls' wrestling as a sanctioned
- 14 sport by the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association.
