A RESOLUTION

Recognizing the month of June 2023 as "LGBTQ+ Pride Month" in 1 Pennsylvania in celebration of past, present and future 2 LGBTQ+ accomplishments and contributions to this Commonwealth 3 and in commemoration of the 54th anniversary of the Stonewall 5 Inn demonstrations. 6 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth was founded on the principles of 7 fairness and tolerance; and 8 WHEREAS, Pennsylvanians have repeatedly shown a strong belief in the principles of fairness and tolerance with service 9 10 defending their principles in wars and in debates, 11 demonstrations and countless other acts of democracy; and 12 WHEREAS, Many lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBTQ+) Pennsylvanians and their allies play a significant role in this 13 Commonwealth's economic, cultural, spiritual and political 14 15 development, while working tirelessly to maintain and promote 16 their culture and history; and 17 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth has been the site of many pivotal 18 moments in LGBTQ+ history and has been the location of activism

vital to the growing tolerance and acceptance of the LGBTQ+

- 2 WHEREAS, In May 1965, borrowing a strategy made famous by the
- 3 African-American civil rights movement of the time, a group of
- 4 gender-variant individuals of color organized a sit-in to
- 5 protest discrimination toward LGBTQ+ individuals at Dewey's
- 6 restaurant lunch counter in Philadelphia, recognized as one of
- 7 the first demonstrations launched with the goal of protecting
- 8 the dignity of LGBTQ+ people; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The "Annual Reminders" protests held in front of the
- 10 Liberty Bell, which occurred every Independence Day between 1965
- 11 and 1969, drew national attention to the LGBTQ+ community's
- 12 struggle for liberty and equality; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Dewey's restaurant lunch counter and "Annual
- 14 Reminders" demonstrations, in conjunction with other activities
- 15 across the United States, greatly contributed toward the growing
- 16 acceptance and inclusion of LGBTQ+ Americans into their
- 17 respective communities; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The State government has traditionally been on the
- 19 forefront of LGBTQ+ recognition, regardless of which political
- 20 party was in control; and
- 21 WHEREAS, The Honorable Milton Shapp, former Governor of
- 22 Pennsylvania, founded the Council for Sexual Minorities, which
- 23 was the first governmental body in the nation to examine the
- 24 needs and issues of the LGBTQ+ community; and
- 25 WHEREAS, In 1975, Governor Shapp issued the first Statewide
- 26 executive order in the nation recognizing LGBTQ+ equality; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Governor Shapp's successor, the Honorable Richard
- 28 Thornburgh, became the first Republican in the nation to issue a
- 29 Statewide proclamation recognizing LGBTQ+ equality in 1979; and
- 30 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth remains committed to promoting

- 1 LGBTQ+ inclusion and quality of life, as the home of the oldest
- 2 continually published magazine devoted to LGBTQ+ issues, the
- 3 Philadelphia Gay News, and the nation's second most affordable
- 4 LGBTQ+ elder housing complex, the John C. Anderson Apartments;
- 5 and
- 6 WHEREAS, The month of June is recognized worldwide as "LGBTQ+
- 7 Pride Month," in recognition of the Stonewall Inn demonstrations
- 8 in New York City which took place 54 years ago on June 28, 1969,
- 9 and is widely credited as a catalyst for the national civil
- 10 rights movement for the LGBTQ+ community; and
- 11 WHEREAS, On this 54th anniversary of the Stonewall Inn
- 12 demonstrations we remember how on June 28, 1969, the New York
- 13 City Police Department began conducting a targeted routine raid
- 14 of the establishment, which was known to welcome LGBTQ+
- 15 community members; and
- 16 WHEREAS, An uprising began against the oppressive police
- 17 forces seeking to infringe upon LGBTQ+ community members'
- 18 immutable civil rights, with patrons, activists and community
- 19 members conducting a protest which lasted several days; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Within the following years the Gay Liberation Front
- 21 and Gay Activists Alliance were created, and in 1970, the first
- 22 gay pride parades were held across the United States in New
- 23 York, San Francisco and Chicago, in commemoration of the
- 24 anniversary of the protests and as a celebration of equality and
- 25 empowerment within the movement; and
- 26 WHEREAS, "LGBTQ+ Pride Month" highlights the work, struggles,
- 27 accomplishments and challenges of LGBTQ+ people in this
- 28 Commonwealth and beyond; and
- 29 WHEREAS, This celebration of diversity fits perfectly within
- 30 the long and unique story of this Commonwealth and our nation's

- 1 constant quest for the equal treatment of all residents; and
- 2 WHEREAS, "LGBTQ+ Pride Month" celebrations contribute to a
- 3 welcoming atmosphere and add greatly to the social and economic
- 4 health and well-being of this Commonwealth; therefore be it
- 5 RESOLVED, That the Senate recognize the month of June 2023 as
- 6 "LGBTQ+ Pride Month" in Pennsylvania in celebration of LGBTQ+
- 7 accomplishments and contributions to this Commonwealth as we
- 8 commemorate the 54th anniversary of the Stonewall Inn
- 9 demonstrations and make a strong recommitment to fight for
- 10 LGBTQ+ equality.
