RELATING TO INSURANCE -- ACCIDENT AND SICKNESS INSURANCE POLICIES

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 27-18 of the General Laws entitled "Accident and Sickness Insurance
- 2 Policies" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:
- 3 <u>27-18-95. Glucagon hypoglycemia medications.</u>
- 4 (a) The Rhode Island general assembly recognizes that glucagon auto-injectors are life-
- 5 saving medications that must be administered quickly to be effective. Such administration is often

6 done by persons who are not health care professionals, and is done in an emergency situation.

- 7 Accordingly, it is in the best interests of the people of the state to promote the widespread
- 8 availability of glucagon that does not require reconstitution. Hypoglycemia, or low blood glucose,
- 9 is a barrier to diabetes control, leads to worse clinical outcomes, stress, increased cost of care and
- 10 polypharmacy. For unconscious patients, and those unable to ingest oral glucose, glucagon in the

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SECTION 5. This act shall take effect upon passage.

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EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

AN ACT

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1 This act would require, commencing January 1, 2025, group health plans and health 2 insurance issuers that provide prescription benefits to cover at least one type of glucagon auto-3 injector, nasal spray, or formulation which does not require reconstitution to treat hypoglycemia 4 with two (2) glucagon auto-injectors every plan year. No copayment or deductible would be 5 required to obtain prescribed glucagon medications. 6 This act would take effect upon passage.

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
