It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 31-18-8 of the General Laws in Chapter 31-18 entitled

2 "Pedestrians" is hereby amended to read as follows:

3 31-18-8. Due care by drivers Due care by drivers -- "Frank's law". – (a)

4 Notwithstanding other provisions of this chapter or the provisions of any local ordinance, every

driver of a vehicle shall exercise due care to avoid colliding with any pedestrian or any person

propelling a human-powered vehicle upon any roadway, shall give an audible signal when

7 necessary, and shall exercise proper precaution upon observing any child or any obviously

8 confused, intoxicated, or incapacitated person. In addition, the driver of a vehicle overtaking a

bicycle or other human-powered vehicle must pass the bicycle or other human-powered vehicle at

a safe distance of not less than three feet (3') between the vehicle and the human-powered

vehicle. In the event the driver cannot maneuver his or her vehicle three feet (3') away from the

bicyclist, he or she must slow his or her vehicle to ten (10) miles per hour below the posted speed

limit.

(b) Violations of this section are subject to a fine of eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) and/or

ten (10) days of community service, and/or a suspension of his or her driver's license for ten (10)

EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

AN ACT

RELATING TO MOTOR AND OTHER VEHICLES -- PEDESTRIANS AND BICYCLES

This act would require that motor vehicle operators who overtake a bicycle or other human-powered vehicle do so at a safe distance of not less then three feet (3'), or if unable to do so to slow down to ten (10) miles per hour below the posted speed limit. Violators would be subject to fines, community service and/or suspension of driver's license.

This act would take effect upon passage.
