SENATE RESOLUTION

PROCLAIMING MAY 5, 2010, AS "CHARTER PUBLIC SCHOOL DAY" IN THE STATE OF RHODE ISLAND

1	WHEREAS, Since the 1995 passage of Rhode Island's Charter Public Schools enabling
2	legislation, 13 start-up institutions have been established serving over 3,400 students from 31
3	communities; and
4	WHEREAS, Charter Public Schools are independent public schools of choice that are
5	free to be more innovative and are accountable for student achievement; and
6	WHEREAS, Today, Rhode Island Charter Public Schools primarily serve urban areas
7	and face challenges of poverty at a higher than average rate. Yet, these schools continue to be
8	among the strongest in the state; and
9	WHEREAS, Charter Public Schools provide an alternative public education to students
10	who desire a different learning environment than that provided by traditional public schools.
11	Charters provide Rhode Island parents and students their only public school choice option; and
12	WHEREAS, Charter Public Schools are designed to deliver programs tailored to
13	education excellence and community need; and
14	WHEREAS, There is a growing unmet demand for Rhode Island Charter Public Schools
15	as evidenced by a waiting list of over 4,500 students; and
16	WHEREAS, Because they are public schools of choice, Charter Schools are held to the
17	highest level of accountability-consumer demand; now, therefore be it
18	RESOLVED, That this Senate of the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations
19	hereby proclaims May 5, 2010, as "Charter Public School Day" in Rhode Island, and recognizes

- 1 the achievement of our 13 Charter Public Schools; and be it further
- 2 RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State be and he hereby is authorized and directed to
- 3 transmit duly certified copies of this resolution to the Principals/Directors of Rhode Island's 13
- 4 Charter Public Schools.
