**SUMMARY OF BILL AS AMENDED (012061):** Requires each law enforcement officer specifically assigned to the traffic division of a local law enforcement agency or its equivalent to undergo training on the proper testing procedures for use in investigating cases of suspected driving under the influence.

Beginning January 1, 2023, requires training on suspected driving under the influence to be included in the annual in-service training for law enforcement officers certified by the Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) Commission.

**FISCAL IMPACT OF BILL AS AMENDED:**

**NOT SIGNIFICANT**

Assumptions for the bill as amended:

- According to the POST Commission, training for investigating cases of suspected driving under the influence is currently provided during basic recruit school.
- Pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 38-8-111, all police officers are required to complete an in-service training course each calendar year appropriate to the officer's rank and responsibility at a school certified by the POST Commission.
- The POST Commission releases an annual memorandum to all law enforcement agency administrators detailing the mandatory topics that are required to be included in the 40-hour in-service training. Additional subjects outside of the mandated topics are at the discretion of the training agency.
- Any additional expenditures to local law enforcement agencies to include investigating suspected driving under the influence as a mandatory topic in annual training for officers is estimated to be minimal.
- This legislation will not result in a significant fiscal impact to state or local government.
