SUMMARY OF BILL: Exempts Tennessee and all its political subdivisions from the observance of daylight saving time if the Commissioner of the Department of Transportation (TDOT) certifies in writing to the Speakers of the Senate and the House of Representatives that the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, and North Carolina have exempted themselves from the provisions of U.S.C. § 260 (pertaining to observance of daylight saving time) and the General Assembly, by joint resolution, confirms the receipt of the certification. Should such exemption be certified, the exemption from daylight saving time would begin on the first day of January following compliance with the abovementioned requirements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Assumptions:

- Daylight saving time is the practice of advancing clocks during summer months to increase evening daylight time.
- Exempting Tennessee and its political subdivisions from the observance of daylight saving time if certain conditions are met will not significantly impact operations of the state or local government.
