FISCAL NOTE

HB 2007 - SB 2676

February 10, 2018

SUMMARY OF BILL: Adds to the certification requirements for bounty hunters in Tennessee and requires bounty hunters to complete eight hours of annual continuing education. Expands the conditions that disqualify a person from retaining their certification as a bounty hunter and requires bounty hunters from another state to meet an equivalent of certification and training in order to engage in the practice of bounty hunting in Tennessee.

ESTIMATED FISCAL IMPACT:

Increase State Expenditures – \$4,700/One-Time \$57,700/Recurring

Assumptions:

- Tennessee Code Annotated § 40-11-318 sets forth guidelines for bounty hunting.
- The proposed legislation changes the requirements of bounty hunters in this state and requires them to annually participate in eight hours of continuing education.
- The proposed legislation requires bounty hunters not certified in Tennessee to complete training that would sufficiently meet the training requirements imposed on bounty hunters certified in Tennessee.
- The proposed legislation requires the Department of Commerce and Insurance (DCI) to approve a curriculum for bounty hunter training courses with regard to a bounty hunter carrying a weapon as defined in the proposed legislation as well as a bounty hunter using a canine for bounty hunting purposes.
- The proposed legislation will require one administrative assistant position to manage these duties within the DCI.
- The total one-time increase in state expenditures is estimated to be \$4,700 (\$1,200 for computer setup for new position + \$2,000 for office space landscaping for new position + \$1,500 for certification program development).
- The recurring increase in state expenditures is estimated to be \$57,687 (\$40,400 salary + \$2,541 benefits + \$3,091 FICA + \$7,255 insurance + \$4,400 miscellaneous).
- The proposed legislation requires the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) to conduct a review of bounty hunting certification and qualification in all other states in order to determine which state requirements satisfy the minimum requirements set forth in the proposed legislation.

• The proposed legislation will not significantly alter the current policies or operations of the AOC and any impact can be accommodated within their existing resources.
