WHEREAS, prior to garnering the PEN/Diamonstein-Spielvogel Award, the collection was duly honored as the winner of the 2022 Southern Book Prize and named a Best Reviewed Book of 2021, *Country Living* Best Book of Fall, *Garden & Gun* Recommended Read for Fall, Literary Hub Most Anticipated Book of 2021, and Indie Next Selection for September 2021; and

WHEREAS, in addition to *Graceland, At Last*, Margaret Renkl is the author of *Late Migrations: A Natural History of Love and Loss* (2019) and a contributing opinion writer for *The New York Times*, where her essays appear each Monday; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Renkl was born and raised in rural Alabama and holds degrees from Auburn University and the University of South Carolina; she has been a resident of Nashville for almost thirty-five years and is currently an MFA Visiting Writer at Vanderbilt University; and

WHEREAS, Margaret Renkl is one of the Volunteer State's most noteworthy citizens; her career is a testament to the possibilities that lie at the confluence of talent, hard work, integrity, and devotion; now, therefore,
