Mr. HUFFMAN (for himself and Mr. CURTIS) introduced the following bill;
which was referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce

A BILL

To direct the Consumer Product Safety Commission to promulgate a consumer product safety standard for certain gates, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Alex Gate Safety Act
5 of 2024”.

6 **SEC. 2. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY STANDARD FOR COV-**
7 **ERED GATES.**

8 (a) STANDARD REQUIRED.—

9 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after
10 the date of the enactment of this Act, the Commis-

1 sion shall promulgate, in accordance with section
2 553 of title 5, United States Code, a final consumer
3 product safety standard for covered gates that in-
4 cludes the requirements described in paragraph (2).

5 (2) REQUIREMENTS DESCRIBED.—The require-
6 ments described in this paragraph for a covered gate
7 are the following:

8 (A) The covered gate meets the safety-re-
9 lated standards of ASTM F900–24, ASTM
10 F1184–23e1, or ASTM F2200–24, as applica-
11 ble to the relevant category of covered gate.

12 (B) The covered gate does not fall more
13 than 45 degrees from the vertical plane when
14 the gate is detached from the supporting hard-
15 ware.

16 (C) The covered gate is balanced and does
17 not move under its own weight.

18 (D) The covered gate has positive stops.

19 (E) The manufacturer of the covered gate
20 provides consumers with specified notification
21 concerning the installation, operation, and
22 maintenance of the gate, including the best
23 technical and performance information related
24 to the safety of the gate and assembly and in-
25 stallation instructions that clearly outline the

1 proper procedure for all required assembly and
2 proper installation and tuning of the gate.

3 (F) If the covered gate has rolling wheels
4 that are easily accessible by consumers, such
5 wheels are guarded or covered.

6 (G) If the covered gate has an operator or
7 similar system, the gate meets the safety-re-
8 lated standards of ANSI/CAN/UL 325.

9 (3) CPSC DETERMINATION OF SCOPE.—In pro-
10 mulgating a consumer product safety standard
11 under paragraph (1), the Commission shall deter-
12 mine the types of covered gates that are subject to
13 the standard and ensure that such covered gates are
14 within the jurisdiction of the Commission.

15 (b) REVISION OF VOLUNTARY STANDARDS.—If an
16 organization revises a voluntary standard that has been
17 adopted, in whole or in part, as a consumer product safety
18 standard under this section, the organization shall notify
19 the Commission of the revision. The revised voluntary
20 standard shall be considered to be adopted by the Commis-
21 sion, effective on the date that is 180 days after the date
22 on which the organization notifies the Commission of the
23 revision (or such later date specified by the Commission
24 in the Federal Register) unless, not later than 90 days
25 after the date on which the organization notifies the Com-

1 mission of the revision, the Commission notifies the orga-
2 nization that the Commission has determined that the re-
3 vision does not improve the safety of the covered gates
4 to which the standard applies and that the Commission
5 is retaining the existing consumer product safety stand-
6 ard. Not later than 90 days before the date on which a
7 revised voluntary standard is considered to be adopted by
8 the Commission under this subsection, the Commission
9 shall publish in the Federal Register notice that such re-
10 vised voluntary standard will be considered to be so adopt-
11 ed on such date.

12 (c) FUTURE RULEMAKING.—At any time after the
13 promulgation of a consumer product safety standard
14 under subsection (a), the Commission may initiate a rule-
15 making, in accordance with section 553 of title 5, United
16 States Code, to modify such standard, if the Commission
17 determines that a modification would further reduce the
18 risk of injury associated with covered gates.

19 (d) TREATMENT OF STANDARDS.—Any consumer
20 product safety standard promulgated under subsection (a)
21 (including any modification of such standard under sub-
22 section (c)) or revised voluntary standard considered to
23 be adopted by the Commission under subsection (b) shall
24 be treated as a consumer product safety rule promulgated

1 under section 9 of the Consumer Product Safety Act (15
2 U.S.C. 2058).

3 **SEC. 3. EDUCATION AND AWARENESS CAMPAIGN.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 2 years after the
5 date of the enactment of this Act, the Commission shall
6 undertake a national campaign to promote awareness and
7 educate the public about the dangers associated with cov-
8 ered gates, including the dangers of detached or falling
9 covered gates, and methods (including low-cost methods)
10 to prevent covered gates from causing death or injury, in-
11 cluding safety standards relating to covered gates and best
12 practices for design, installation, inspection, maintenance,
13 and improvement of covered gates.

14 (b) REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out the campaign
15 required by subsection (a), the Commission shall employ,
16 at a minimum, the following:

17 (1) Educational materials designed for covered
18 gate manufacturers, contractors, retailers, and serv-
19 ice companies.

20 (2) Educational materials designed for con-
21 sumers, owners, and operators of covered gates.

22 (3) Educational materials designed for building
23 officials and local educational agencies to support
24 the updating and enforcement of building codes for

1 new and existing buildings with respect to the safety
2 of covered gates.

3 (c) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 3 years
4 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Commis-
5 sion shall submit to Congress a report that contains a
6 summary of actions taken by the Commission in the cam-
7 paign required by subsection (a).

8 **SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.**

9 In this Act:

10 (1) BUILDING OFFICIAL.—The term “building
11 official” means any State, Tribal, territorial, or local
12 official who is responsible for proposing modifica-
13 tions to building codes, participating in adopting
14 building codes, interpreting building code require-
15 ments, overseeing building code enforcement activi-
16 ties, or otherwise administering building codes.

17 (2) COMMISSION.—The term “Commission”
18 means the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

19 (3) COVERED GATE.—The term “covered gate”
20 means—

21 (A) an automatic vehicular gate;

22 (B) a manual vehicular gate; and

23 (C) any other gate that is more than 48
24 inches wide or more than 84 inches high.

1 (4) LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCY.—The term
2 “local educational agency” has the meaning given
3 such term in section 8101 of the Elementary and
4 Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801).

5 (5) MANUFACTURER.—The term “manufac-
6 turer” has the meaning given such term in section
7 3(a) of the Consumer Product Safety Act (15 U.S.C.
8 2052(a)).

9 (6) POSITIVE STOPS.—The term “positive
10 stops” means an immovable component that, by the
11 placement of the component, physically impedes the
12 motion of a covered gate.

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
